MORE CHALLENGE AND HIGHER EXPECTATIONS

- GCSEs are more challenging and require students to demonstrate far more knowledge and understanding as well as increased breadth
- Subjects assessed at end of Y11, more exam papers
- Coursework has gone from almost all subjects (some practical-based subjects remain)
- A-levels have increased in challenge too
- From 2018, a Grade 4 is considered a 'standard pass', and a Grade 5 a 'strong pass'.
- Students who do not achieve a Grade 4 or above in English Language and Maths must continue to study in Sixth Form/College and 'resit'






WHAT IS GCSEPOD?

"Your child's attendance in Year 7 to 11 has a direct impact on their GCSE results"

All students should be aiming for 97% attendance or higher

By missing lessons as a result of low attendance, a student will:

- Miss being taught new subject knowledge
- Miss recapping subject knowledge to make sure they 'get it'
- Miss key tests and assessments to test what they do and don't know
- Start to fall behind their peers and reduce their chances of achieving well in their GCSEs
- Struggle to make the transition between years because they won't have secured all subject knowledge from the year before
