Letter from Mr Williams

Dear parents and carers

As we reach the end of the first half-term, I want to thank you all once again for your support at this challenging time. Particular thanks to those of you whose children we have had to ask to self-isolate as a result of being in close contact with a positive case in school – and even more so in those cases where it has already happened more than once. We don't underestimate the impact all this has on families. My wife and I are on tenterhooks every time our phones go at that moment, worried it will be the dreaded call from our children's school telling us that they will need to self-isolate, and I know many of you feel the same.

However, many times I have said this over the past six months, my thanks to you all are very sincere and I think the way we have stuck together as a community has been exceptional. I've no doubt this will continue – and we will need it to because there are very few signs of the situation easing any time soon.

Similarly, I must say again how incredible the students have been this term and how well they have responded to the extra things we have asked of them. To give one small example, they have adjusted to the new rules on mobile phones remarkably quickly and with the absolute minimum of fuss. We have another newsletter due out shortly after the break and you will see from that just how many exciting and commendable things students have been getting up to. In so many respects, school is continuing as normal; we have even re-started a number of extra-curricular activities recently and hope to be able to open up even more after the break.

In terms of the Covid situation, since my last update a couple of weeks ago we have definitely seen an increase in cases and this is obviously of some concern. On the other hand, the number of cases is still very much in line with infection rates in the community more generally and is low overall (we have ten 'live' cases out of 1950 students at the time of writing and two members of staff). Equally important, we still haven't seen much evidence that the virus is actually being transmitted within school – in most of the positive cases we have had since September, we are pretty confident that the virus was caught from a friend or family member outside the school setting. That said, as I keep saying, these things can change very quickly and we remain on high alert!

As regards processes for asking students to self-isolate, you will have gathered that our approach has been evolving since September. We started the year expecting to be given detailed advice from the DfE or Public Health England in the event of any positive cases, but this never materialised. For the first 2–3 cases, we therefore adopted a fairly cautious approach while waiting for advice (though still less cautious than many schools who are still sending whole year group bubbles home when there is one positive case). Since then, in the absence of direction from central government, a more localised approach has been taken and we are instead working with Warrington Borough Council whenever we do need support. As Chair of the Warrington secondary headteachers association (WASCL), I sit on a small planning group with senior leaders from WBC and we meet twice a week to review everything relating to Covid and Warrington schools. I must say that I have found the support from WBC to have been excellent throughout this period; they are working very hard and, in my view, have been consistently willing to apply common sense in making decisions.

In general terms, our approach has now evolved such that we are focusing on trying hard to avoid sending students home unless we are very confident they have been in close contact with a positive case for a decent length of time, especially if that contact has been indoors. At the same time, we are watching very

carefully for evidence that it is spreading beyond these close contacts and remain ready to send larger groups of students home as a precaution if necessary. This process is obviously very far from perfect, but so far it seems to be working and we are managing to find a good balance between keeping people safe and keeping things as normal as possible.

I realise that most of this letter has been about one topic again and I cannot wait for the time when I don't need to write to you about Covid but, in the meantime, thank you all again and have a lovely half-term.

Covid rules

<u>Please</u>, <u>please</u> make sure that you and your family follow the rules around self-isolation in the event that someone in your household has Covid symptoms or if you are asked to self-isolate. Sadly, we are aware of a few instances of people ignoring these rules; for example, allowing their children out to play with others when they should be isolating, or sending children into school while someone else in the household is still waiting for the result of a Covid test. In at least one case, other people's children have had to self-isolate because one family had not followed these self-isolation rules. We shall leave you to draw your own conclusions about the nature of these actions and instead simply ask you to consider what a difficult position this puts us in as a school when we are told about them.

To be clear, these cases are a small minority. In general, we cannot speak highly enough of the patience and understanding being shown by parents and students when people do need to self-isolate.
