3G PITCH OPENED

The sun was shining as Lymm High School officially opened its 3G Pitch.

ymm High's FIFAstandard third generation (3G) pitch was officially opened on Wednesday by two professional footballers: ex-Everton and Scotland international David Weir and ex-student Ellie Fletcher who currently plays for Blackburn Rovers (see p. 28). The professional footballers were joined at the socially-distanced event by local football team representatives: Gavin Laidlaw from Lymm Rovers and Julia Johnson from Lymm Piranhas. Other invited attendees that also contributed towards the project included Kate Harrison from The Lane

End Group, Kirsty James from Lymm High PTA, and Liz Green, Chair of Governors. The invited guests stood in the sunshine and watched Year 10 girls and boys play football on the pitch before the opening ceremony. Ellie Fletcher even had a kick around herself!

The Premier League, the FA and the Government's Football Foundation awarded Lymm High a grant of over £500,000 to help it install the full-sized, floodlit pitch.

The school and its supporters raised over £100,000. Thanking all the fundraisers and the overwhelming community support, Mr Williams said he was delighted to be finally opening the state-of-the-art sports facility, which will be used by Lymm High students during the school day and the community of Lymm and its surrounding area during evenings and weekends.

Lymm Rovers and Piranhas have already been using the 3G Pitch for training and matches,



and both organisations were thanked for their professionalism and kind donations towards reaching the £100,000 total. However, the irony of opening the sporting facility the day before it is closed to the community because of the second Lockdown was not lost on Mr Williams.

"We are thrilled to be officially opening the pitch after what seems like years of planning", he said, "but it seems rather poignant to be closing it to the community from tomorrow as a result of the latest lockdown. On the other hand, perhaps this just serves to underline the fact that this is a facility that will serve the community for many years to come – long after any lockdown has passed."

The date was also significant as it marked three years to the day since Mr Hampton, Mr Hayes, Mr Chinea and Mr Mason took part in a sponsored climb of Mount Snowdon to help raise funds for the school's 'Pitch In'

initiative. Other activities included summer fairs, PTA events, school Balls, whole-school Santa dashes and the annual Founders' Day activities. Students also held and organised a number of events in school, competing within their Halls to raise funds. There were also a number of dinners, raffles and prize draws, and Mr





Williams thanked local businesses for all their support in donating items. Local contracting developers The Lane End Group were the initiative's major corporate sponsor. "Today is all about thanking those organisations, businesses

and individuals that helped us reach our goal. Obviously, we are very grateful to the Premier

League, the FA and the Government's Football Foundation for the grant, without which this wouldn't have been possible, but we could not have achieved this without the generous and continued support of parents and the wider Lymm

community either", said Mr Williams. "We always knew the bid was a very strong one, built as it was on the strong reputation of our own PE department but also that of Lymm Rovers and Lymm Piranhas junior football clubs – both very well-run clubs with large numbers of boys and girls taking part on a regular basis.

Lots of people in school have done lots of work to make this happen but I particularly want to thank Patrick Hendrie and Helena Headon. It's still been a long, and sometimes difficult, process, but we are so pleased to be opening our 3G pitch at last and are incredibly grateful to everyone for their support."


Kooth.com spoke to students about how to stay mentally healthy. The key tips are to keep learning, stay active, stay connected to others, take notice of the world around you, and get plenty of sleep.

If students are feeling down, upset, angry or worried more often than usual or for a few weeks at a time rather than just the odd day here or there, they are encouraged to talk to someone. There are lots of people here at school who can help: Form Tutors, Heads of Year, Student Services, or any member of staff that students feel comfortable talking to. If a student doesn't feel able to talk to someone face to face, then

Lymm High's 'Tell us' service can be used to email any concerns or worries (see p.21).

Another option is to go to Kooth.com and speak to someone on their online chat or messaging service.

Kooth.com's take home message from the assemblies was "Please, don't struggle on your own, and don't feel you have to just live with feeling bad. Reach out and we can get you the help you need to feel better."





CELEBRATING OUR LIBRARY

Throughout October we celebrated International School Libraries Month by highlighting the availability of our well-stocked school library.

nown as the ILC (Independent Learning Centre), the library is staffed every day by professional librarians who are available to answer any student enquiries.

In keeping with social distancing, access to the ILC for students from each year group is staggered, as follows:

"Some students are already using the ILC, but with 40 study spaces available for each session we would love to see more", said Ms Timson, the ILC Manager. During their session students can get help from ILC staff, access computers and the colour

printer for their school work, or request books to borrow from the school collection.

For students who are self-isolating or prefer to browse books from home, the ILC has a full library catalogue, which can be accessed at http://

u012275.microlibrarian.net or by downloading the iMLS app. The site has a quick and easy search box in the top right-hand corner of the home page.



Students who prefer to log-in to their individual accounts using their library barcode as both username and password can also write reviews, reserve books, create virtual bookshelves, and much more!

Once students know which books they would like to borrow they can request books in person by speaking to library staff during their library access time. Alternatively, they can email lic@lymmhigh.org.uk with the author and title details so that the library staff can find and reserve the books ready for the student's next library visit. Up to three books can be borrowed for three school weeks (and renewed if necessary).

Free reading app

Students can also access Ebooks and Audiobooks through a free student reading app called Sora.

email and password to get started with their individual account.



Sora currently holds over 1600 titles that be accessed on a computer, tablet or smartphone either through <u>soraapp.com</u>, or by downloading the Sora app.

When logging onto the site for the first time students will be asked to put in their 'setup code' at the bottom of the screen. The setup code is 'uksecondary', and 'Lymm High School' should then be available from the dropdown list. The student just needs to type in their usual school

There are multiple copies of most book titles available on the site. Some of the more popular books might not be available due to high demand but they can be reserved while the student carries on browsing. Sometimes the most enjoyable books aren't the ones we look for but are discovered by accident so take some time to explore and try something new!

All books are free and can be borrowed for 14 days (and renewed if necessary). The formats and fonts of most books can be changed to suit individual reading needs and a dyslexia-friendly font is also available.

If this font is easier for you to read, you need to try Sora!

As an Assistant Headteacher, my job provides lots of variety – which is

fun!! I love the feeling of walking into work each day and not knowing what challenges lie ahead. Working in a large comprehensive school is a dynamic fast-paced environment, which is always changing and evolving. You have to be ready to adapt and resolve situations quickly with the best interest of our staff and students in mind, which I really

enjoy. I also relish the challenge of teaching Maths - a subject that often divides opinion! Nothing beats that feeling when your students learn something new and you can see them improve - who wouldn't want to be a part of that experience! The worst part of my job is seeing students not meeting their potential. As a teacher you are emotionally involved in a student's development and when they don't get it right, despite lots of help, support and guidance it can leave you asking why? However, I'm lucky to work with a really talented team of teachers and support staff at Lymm so these occasions are rare. The good times most definitely outweigh

Why did you enter the teaching profession?

When I was 20 years old, a period working at Briars Hey allowed me the chance to work with young adults with some of the most challenging pastoral and mental health needs of my career. It was a great experience before getting into teaching.

What degree course did you take?

What are the best and worst parts of the job?
