Remote learning

Aside from a few problems with Zoom log-ins in the first couple of days (and many thanks for your patience with this), the switch to remote learning seems to have gone as smoothly as we could have reasonably expected. Attendance to lessons has been exceptionally high and we have been really impressed by the organisation and attitude shown by students. Thank you also to the many of you who have been in touch to express appreciation to teachers for all their hard work at the moment.

I don't think it can be repeated too often, but I urge you as parents not to put too much pressure on yourselves regarding home learning. There will be days when it feels extremely difficult, if not impossible, to motivate your child. You may feel as if you are the only ones in that situation but, trust me: you are not! The fact is that there is no substitute for young people being in school and no form of remote learning can provide a truly adequate substitute. We recommend that you just focus on providing them with a quiet place from which to access lessons and gentle encouragement in keeping them going. It is tempting to forget, but it is not easy for the children to maintain 100% concentration all day long either.

Please also encourage your children to have cameras on during lessons – it makes a huge difference in helping teachers ensure students are fully engaged in learning.

Laptops + internet access

We have now telephoned anyone who told us in the most recent survey that their child does not have a suitable device to access remote lessons (n.b. a mobile phone isn't really suitable). Critical workers

We have been in touch with the parents of all vulnerable children and most are now in school but, again, please use this email address for anything related to vulnerable children.

Tutor time and lunch time changes

We have been really impressed with how students have attended their lessons and form times this week. Thank you for your support in ensuring your child has been logged on. Form time is an important part of the school week. Not only does it provide social interaction with other classmates, it ensures that contact is maintained with the student's form teacher for the dissemination of school information and the provision of pastoral support. In addition, students will receive a combination of assemblies and we will continue to run our Life programme sessions. For these reasons, form time remains compulsory for all students.

At the same time, in an effort to reduce the time spent each day sat at a computer screen (for both students and teachers), we are making some changes to form time and lunch breaks for all year groups for the periods of lockdown. These are:

For Years 7–11:

- There will be <u>no</u> form time on Tuesdays, Thursday and Fridays: Lunch will run from 12.10–1.20pm.
- On **Mondays and Wednesdays**, form time will operate from 12.45–1.20pm. On these days lunch will run from 12.10–12.45pm.

Students can access their form sessions by logging onto their form group Team on Microsoft Teams.

For Years 12 and 13:

- Year 12 students will have form time each Monday and Wednesday from 12.10–12.45pm.
- Year 13 students will have form time each Tuesday and Thursday from 12.10–12.45pm.

Sixth Form students can access their form sessions by logging onto their Year group Team on Microsoft Teams.

Summer exams

As I said in my letter to Year 11 and 13 students earlier this week, we do not yet know any details regarding the awarding of grades this summer. I wish we could say more about the exact process to be followed but all we know is that Ofqual are launching a consultation on Monday to run for two weeks and that we can expect some kind of plan to be announced by the end of February.

It does now seem clear that it will involve teacher assessment in some form or other. This means it is really important that students continue to engage with online lessons, take part in discussions and complete all work set. Please also be aware that it is highly likely that we will run formal assessments once we are all back in school to help inform any teacher judgements and that these assessments are likely to include topics studied during lockdown.

Bus pass reimbursements

For customers paying by direct debit instalments for the Under 21 annual Touch & Go bus pass, the lockdown announcement came after the January direct debit payment had already been made. Warrington's Own Buses is therefore pausing the next scheduled direct debit payment. Customers will still be able to use their passes to travel on buses, but there won't be any charge during February.

Customers who have paid for an annual Under 21 Touch & Go bus pass can request a refund for the month by completing <u>this form</u> by 12th February. Passes will still expire on the original end date, and again can continue to be used on buses to travel throughout the lockdown period, in line with Covid-19 journey restrictions.

We also know that most parents and carers will appreciate some indication of their child's progress. However, none of this means that any child needs to worry about doing them.

Year 11 Mock exam results

These will be issued as planned – we hope by the end of next week or, if not, soon after. It is really important to understand that mock exam results are absolutely not the only piece of evidence teachers will use if they do have to form judgments for exam boards. It is equally important to stress that we know many students will improve on their mock grades by the end of the course and that some students had to sit mocks remotely, sometimes in conditions that were far from ideal.
