Message from Mr Williams

Dear parents and carers

Starting with a huge positive this week, I mentioned in the last bulletin that Lymm High School has been accredited as a 'world class school', something we are very proud of. The story was featured in the Warrington Guardian and is well worth a read. The award really underlines what incredible young people we have here and what a great position the school is in at the moment. It provides a lovely end to a challenging year and sets us up very nicely for next year and beyond. Many thanks again to everyone involved in the bid, especially the students.

It has to be said that there have been some rather tired faces around school this week, but we are really looking forward to Sports Day and Founders' Day next week – both should be great events, especially given the sunshine that is forecast.

Covid Latest

I cannot, of course, write anything without mentioning Covid! Having come this far and weathered the storm very well, I have to say that this week has probably been the worst week we have had so far in terms of the number of cases. Year 10 and 12 have been especially affected and we have significant numbers of students (around a third) now isolating in each of these two year groups, despite our best efforts not to send students home unless absolutely necessary. Nearly all of the positive cases have been closely connected to social events outside of school and it is obvious to us that the latest variant is transmitting itself much more easily than previous ones. I would, therefore, recommend that you urge children to be sensible and relatively cautious if you do not want holidays to be too disrupted.

Looking further ahead, I'm sure that many of you will already be familiar with the latest set of rules from the government and what this means for **schools from September** but I thought it would be helpful to clarify the following key points (assuming nothing changes between now and then of course!). So, from September:

- Schools will be expected to have plans in places for any potential outbreak, which could mean the reinstatement of some measures. Otherwise...
- Bubbles will no longer be necessary. This means that we can return to our normal timetable, with a
 five-period day and tutor time at the start of the day. School will finish for all students at 3.10pm
 again
- Assemblies and other similar events will run as normal
- Face coverings will not be needed
- School will no longer have to undertake contact tracing in the event of a positive Covid case, with
 the NHS Track & Trace team now picking up this responsibility. (N.b. This officially starts from
 Monday, though we expect to continue helping the Track & Trace team for the final week of term.)
- We will be continuing to promote good hand and respiratory hygiene, as well as good ventilation where possible. Enhanced cleaning regimes will also be in place.
- Finally, and perhaps most significantly, students (i.e. anyone under 18) will no longer have to self-isolate if they are deemed to be a close contact. Instead, they will need to get a PCR test but will still be allowed to attend school unless the test comes back positive. To be clear, this does not come into operation until 16th August any identified close contacts for the rest of this term will still need to self-isolate for ten days.

As ever, I am conscious that people have different opinions on all this and so will just say that we are all very excited about the prospect of being back to normal and especially pleased that we ought not to be seeing significant numbers of students having to miss so much school any longer.

In the meantime, it is important that we all remember to follow the current rules. The most important of these is that **if anyone in your household shows any symptoms of Covid, they need to get a PCR test and self-isolate until they have the result** (n.b. lateral flow tests are not sufficient if you are showing Covid symptoms – it must be a PCR test).

Mass testing and start to new school year

Schools are expected to undertake mass testing of all students in school before the start of term (much as we did back in January). We will be sending a letter out in the next few days with the details and times for this, but we can say now that the following will apply:

- Term will start on Monday 6th September for Years 7 and 12 only
- All other year groups will start on Tuesday 7th September
- Students in Years 7, 8 and 11 will need to come into school at some point on Thursday 2nd
 September for a lateral flow test
- Students in Years **9, 10, 12 and 13** will need to come into school on **Friday 3**rd September for a lateral flow test

As I say, further details of this – especially times – will be provided next week. In the meantime, please do not panic if you have a holiday booked for the 2nd or 3rd September. We will make some, limited, provision available outside of these two days.

Apologies again to all those families affected by the need to self-isolate over the last couple of weeks, and best wishes to everyone.

Uniform expectations

Lymm High takes great pride in its uniform and the appearance of all students. Our high standards and expectations require all pupils to wear their full uniform correctly at all times. We therefore ask for your support in ensuring that all students are in the correct school uniform from September. This includes:

- Shoes no trainers/trainer-style footwear/no logos

- No hoodies
- No jewellery
- No piercings
- Discreet natural make-up: no false nails, no false eyelashes, clear nail varnish only, eyebrows should be natural
- Hair should be neat and conventional with no extreme styles. No haircuts shorter than a grade 2. Hair colour should be natural.

Pupil Premium

We have an unusually low number of students eligible for Pupil Premium this year in Year 7, especially those eligible for Free School Meals. In light of Covid, this is a little surprising and is out of sync with numbers in other year groups which have been increasing. If your child falls into any of these categories that we do not already know about, please can you get in touch with Mrs R Morris rmorris@lymmhigh.org.uk so we can ensure your child receives the additional support available to them.

The categories are:

- eligible for Free School Meals (or have been in the last 6 years)
- currently in Local Authority Care
- adopted from care
- under a 'Special Guardianship Order' (SGO)
- under a 'Child Arrangement Order'
- or has a parent serving in the UK Armed Forces (or who has done in the last 6 years).

UPPER SCHOOL

Year 11 Prom

This is still planned for Thursday 22nd July. Miss Taylor has sent a <u>letter</u> to all Year 11 parents informing them about the need for students to undertake Covid tests at school prior to the event, and for face masks to be worn during the evening.

Exams (for Year 10 and Sixth Form)

The DfE and Ofqual have launched a consultation process for exams in 2022. The consultation doesn't close until the middle of August and so it will be well into September before we get any final decisions, but it does offer some strong hints as to what they are currently thinking. The main points are that it looks as if:

- Exams will go ahead this year, though with adaptations to reflect the impact of the pandemic on candidates' learning.
- Some topics will become optional in GCSE English literature, history and ancient history, with a choice of content in GCSE geography.
- There will be advanced notice of content on the exams in the spring term for most other GCSEs, AS and A' Levels
- Some changes will be made to practical assessment in science subjects and art and design
- Exam aides / support materials (e.g. formula sheets) will be provided for exams in maths, physics and combined science exams.

Again, this is all very provisional at the moment and we will let you know as soon as anything is confirmed. However, we think it is very good news – the bottom line is that these changes ought to make life easier for teachers and students and should make a big difference in mitigating the effects of any learning lost this year.
