LIFE PROGRAMME

Extremism and radicalisation

This week in Life Programme in Form Time, both Year 12 and 13 will be looking at how the internet can encourage some vulnerable young adults to become involved in extremism, which may lead to terrorism activity. Schools already help to safeguard students from drug abuse, gangs, neglect and sexual exploitation. Radicalisation has a similarly devastating effect on young people, families and communities. Protecting students from the influence of extremist ideas is therefore an important part of a school's safeguarding role.

Young people are particularly vulnerable to radicalisation. Many teenagers look for answers to questions about identity, faith and belonging, and are in search of adventure and excitement. Extremist groups, whether Islamist or far-right, claim to offer the answers and promise vulnerable young people a sense of identity. Though instances are rare, even very young children may be exposed to extremism, both incide and outside the home.

Our school is a place that inspires and engages young minds. Our school believes in democracy and the laws of the country, where every individual has a voice that is heard and respected, no matter what their faith or belief. Our school values discussion, debate and learning from others. Our school believes that division belongs in mathematics, not the classroom. There is no place for extremism in our school.

Spanish study trip

On Wednesday, Year 12 and 13
Spanish students went into
Manchester to take part in a study
day presented by the celebrated
Carmen Herrero, Principal
Lecturer in Hispanic Studies at
Manchester Metropolitan
University, Director of FLAME
and co-founder of FILTA.

The study day addressed the themes of family, friendship, multilingual life, education, and



included some contextual information about Cuba (history, and past and present socio-political issues) through the medium of film.

The screening was followed by a series of exercises based on the film, including character studies, film genre analysis and discussion of the main themes; which are all relevant skills for students in preparation for the A2 exam.

Our students participated really well and found the experience to be thoroughly worthwhile.

Quantum on the clock

Can you explain quantum science or technology in a 3-minute video?



Physicist Richard Feynman once said "I can safely say that nobody really understands quantum mechanics". Can you help prove him wrong? This challenge for Year 12 and 13 students is to create a 3-minute video about any aspect of quantum science or technology that a High School student can understand. To apply:

- Create a 3-minute video on any aspect of quantum science or technology.
- Submit your video individually or in a team of up to four.
- Ensure the video is accurate. Mention in the video if the chosen topic is controversial or under debate.
- The video should not promote a particular company or organisation, though they can be mentioned as examples (e.g. who is implementing a quantum technology).
- The video can be in any format! It could be a single person or a group of people talking to the camera; a drama; visuals and animation; song, poetry or dance; or something else... all creativity is welcome.



Degree Apprenticeships

Degree apprenticeships give you the opportunity to attain a degree or professional qualification from some of the best universities and providers, whilst training in a top flight career. Your training is paid for by your employer and the government, so there is no cost to you. You will also be earning a salary from day one.

What is a degree apprenticeship?

Degree apprenticeships are exactly what they say - an apprenticeship programme that leads to a full degree-level qualification. This could be a bachelor's or master's degree, or an equivalent professional qualification.

Who are they for?

Degree apprenticeships can be for new recruits into apprenticeships (for example, those leaving school) or they can be for an existing employee who is looking to upskill or retrain in their job role.

How long do they take to complete?

Degree apprenticeships will typically take between 2 - 6 years to complete, depending on the level and programme. The apprentice will split their time between working and studying with a training provider.

How much do they cost?

The apprentice will not be required to pay towards the cost of the training, this will be funded by the employer and/or government. The apprentice will earn a salary throughout their apprenticeship, which means they are being paid to learn and will not incur student fees.



The UCAS site also hosts some higher and degree apprenticeship vacancies.

What happens if I don't finish the apprenticeship? Do I have to pay the fees back?

No, the apprentice will never be expected to pay back the apprenticeship training costs.

Do employers value degree apprentices as highly as they value a traditional degree?

Yes! Employers really value degree apprenticeships because you will be applying what you learn immediately in the workplace and helping to introduce and suggest new ideas and approaches.

Do apprentices get a social life?
Of course! You get the benefits of meeting new people at your workplace and through your training provider.
There are also many networks you can join as an apprentice to meet others as well as applying for an NUS Apprentice Extra Card to access fantastic discounts and benefits.

Is a degree apprenticeship a real degree?

Yes - it is exactly the same degree that you would study full-time, except it will be studied in a different way and your apprenticeship may also include additional qualifications and/or professional accreditation.

Do I apply to the employer or the university?

Firstly, you will need to secure an apprenticeship with an employer, and they will decide which training provider is best suited to the needs of their business. Depending on which training provider they are using, there could be additional applications or assessments that you will need to undertake.




