During Form time, groups around the school commemorated the loss of life both during the Holocaust and in genocides that have taken place since World War Two.



CYBER SAFETY

Lymm High School students urged to 'stop and think' to keep safe online.

ast month, Years 7–11 had assemblies about online hate from a Detective Constable in the Cyber Crime Team.

The students learnt that anything posted on social media, or sent to messaging groups, has a unique digital footprint, which is permanent.

A consequence of this permanent digital footprint was highlighted effectively by Detective Constable Andrew Kevan who told students about the case of a local teen who is currently serving a 2-year sentence in a Youth Offenders Institute.

The teenager had been found guilty of requesting inappropriate images, sharing them, and using bullying tactics to gain more images.

These digital images were able to be viewed and traced back to the student despite attempts to delete them from his phone.

"Every image has unique identifying characteristics or 'metadata' that provide information about when and where it was taken", Detective Constable Kevan told the students.

"This is why you need to stop and think before you send anything. Only by doing this, can you protect yourself", he said.



Rethinking online safety

Detective Constable Kevan played the audience an interview he had recorded with Trisha Prabhu: a 21-year-old innovator, social entrepreneur and inventor of the ReThinkTM App.

This patented technology is used as an effective way to detect and stop online hate, and was invented following Trisha's experience of being cyberbullied herself.

The App detects and stops online hate at the source, before the bullying occurs and before any damage is done.

"Research has shown that with ReThinkTM, adolescents change their mind 93% of the time and decide not to post an offensive

message", said Detective Constable Kevan.

Trisha Prabhu's ReThinkTM App has received worldwide acclaim. She has the esteemed distinction of showcasing and sharing the technology at the White House Science Fair at the invitation of President Obama.

For her advocacy, public service, and commitment to leading an anti-cyberbullying movement, she received the Anti-Bullying Champion Award from the International Princess Diana Awards, the Global Anti-Bullying Hero Award from Auburn University, and the Upstander Legacy Celebration Award from the Tyler Clementi Foundation.

Witches, wizards and Muggles from Years 7 to 11 gathered during lunch time to take part in magical crafts, bewitching quizzes and enchanting competitions.


The ILC was decorated with Potter paraphernalia and Hedwig watched over the event from his brown parcel perch!

ATTENDANCE MATTERS



A swe get back to some kind of normality following the Covid pandemic, the media has been focussing on student attendance at school. Figures from early March show that almost one in ten Year 11 pupils nationally are still absent from school [1]. This is almost 60% higher than the average for pre-pandemic Spring 2019. With just 2 months to go until the start of GCSE exams this is a worrying situation.

"At Lymm High, we know that excellent attendance is not just valuable, it's essential", says Assistant Headteacher Mr Thompson. This is because excellent attendance at school is directly linked to better exam performance, which should in turn lead to further learning opportunities, better job prospects and higher lifetime wages. As well as this, going to school helps students to develop friendships, provides exposure to cultural experiences, and helps them learn tolerance, empathy and social responsibility (See Box 1).

Lymm High has three
Attendance Officers, two in
main school – Paul Dooley and
Leanne Mitchell – and one in
the Sixth Form – Alex Lewis.
The role of an attendance
officer is to track student
attendance, monitor the health
and welfare of students, and to
enforce compulsory
attendance laws where
necessary. "Excellent

Excellent attendance at school means:

- Amazing exam results at GCSE and A' level
- Stronger bonds with friends
- Opportunities for extracurricular activities and trips
- Character development (become a better human being!)
- Preparation for life (e.g., Life Programme)
- Good habits for college, university and work
- Rewards
- Pastoral and academic support from staff

Box 1: Why is attendance so important?

attendance and punctuality play an extremely important part in helping students achieve their full potential at Lymm High School", according to Mr Dooley.

Registers are taken every lesson to monitor attendance, but the two crucial registers that impact a student's overall attendance figure are Registration and Period 4.

So why might students not want to attend school? We asked a selection of frequent absentees and came up with a list of the responses shown in Box 2. The important message

to get across to all of our students is that all of these supposed 'reasons' for non-attendance are not valid. All students need to be in school each day, on time, unless for a legitimate reason, such as illness, family funeral or unavoidable appointment. Where possible, we ask that appointments are made after school, at weekends or during

holidays.

Missing the odd hour, here or there, really adds up. A student at school only 90% of the time will miss 95 hours of teaching over the school year (*see Table 1*). In addition, did you know that when a student applies for Sixth Form, college, university or an apprentice-ship, school is always asked what the

student's attendance was?

- Minor ailment or illness
- Lack of morning routine at home
- Developing a habit of non-attendance
- Sibling is absent
- Feeling tired from a late night or weekend away
- Slightly 'under the weather'
- Friendship problem or bullying
- Not done homework
- Worried about a test or assessment
- Ill family member
- Having problems in a particular lesson or subject
- Avoiding social times in school
- A learning difficulty or finding reading difficult
- Thinking you deserve a day off
- Medical appointments during school day (or whole day)

What do we mean by excellent attendance at Lymm High School?

Excellent attendance at school means students being present 98% of the time and above. Good attendance is 96–97.9%. If a student's attendance drops to 90.1–95.9% then this needs to be improved. In the first instance, one of our Attendance Officers would flag the low attendance rate to the student's Head of Year who would follow up with parents.

Any student with an attendance rate of 90% or below would be a cause for concern. In these cases, parents would be invited to school to see how we can support the student to improve on their attendance rate.

Incentives and rewards to improve on attendance are already in operation and students regularly receive sweet treats, certificates and can get entered into a raffle for prizes.

How can parents help?

We know that parents and carers want the best for their child, just as we do as a school. To ensure that they fulfil their potential and go on to rewarding further education, apprenticeships or work, please encourage them to come to school each day. Not only will they reap the benefits listed in Box 1, they will be preparing themselves to be socially responsible citizens

who turn up on time and take pride in their work.

B ack in October Bookbuzz was launched to Year 7 students during lessons in the Independent Learning Centre (ILC). 

Most importantly, students are excited about getting the books they've chosen for themselves!


Pupils who finish reading their books are encouraged to return them to the ILC's 'Swap Box' where they can deposit them and choose another book to read.


Spending just 10 minutes a day reading and sharing stories with children can make a


World Book Day tokens will be distributed to all Year 7

students during form-time and students from other year groups can pick up a token from the ILC.


Each token can either be exchanged for one of the specially produced World Book Day books or as a £1 contribution to the price of any book or audiobook costing £2.99 or more.


risbee Golf wasn't the only inter-hall competition to take place in the last month.


WASTE NOT, WANT NOT


