SUMMER OF SUCCESS

t's hardly surprising that our A' Level students had high levels of nerves prior to receiving their results last month.

Not only did the 2021–2022 Year 13 students have two years of Covid disruption, they hadn't sat public examinations since their SATs in Year 6 at Primary School. This year group was the cohort that were unable to sit their GCSE exams in 2020. In addition. claims in the media stated that the exams would be subject to tougher marking this year following the previous teacherassessed results. As such, it was especially satisfying to see such a superb stream of results and lots of happy faces at Lymm High on Thursday 18th August.

Like-for-like, the results were even better than the excellent ones we were getting before the pandemic hit. Owen Longton, Jack Powell and Matthew Stow were the very top performers with four coveted A* grades each: a tremendous achievement!

Mrs Jennings, Head of Sixth Form, summed up the excellent results by saying: "They have done exceptionally well and we are incredibly proud of all of our students".

Placements secured

Media coverage before the exam results heightened anxiety further by focussing on potential problems with students securing places at university this year. Thankfully, this hasn't been the case for our students and almost all have confirmed places at the universities of their choice. This includes very high numbers going to the prestigious Russell Group universities. Jay Palombella and Owen Longton are heading off to Cam-

bridge University to study English and Engineering, respectively. Others have won much sought-after apprenticeships.

"It's important to stress how proud we are of *all* the students in this year group and just how many individual challenges were met", said Mr Williams.

"We've had a lot of very happy young people around the place today – and quite rightly so. They have worked so hard and showed so much resilience, maturity and good humour throughout the last couple of years that they thoroughly deserve all the success they have had. I am just so proud of all of them, as indeed I am of the staff who have worked so hard to help make all this happen."





GCSE Geniuses

Following the tremendous success of the Year 13 students, Year 11's GCSE results were equally as impressive and we saw lots of happy faces on Thursday 25th August. We are trying to be modest and are waiting for the official government data to be published in October before we share too much with parents. However, we expect this data to confirm

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that Lymm High is one of the very highest performing schools in the North West and indeed the whole country. To give just one statistic for now, over 49% of <u>all</u> GCSE grades were at 9–7 (i.e., the old A*– A).

Mrs Wagstaff, Head of Year 11, said: "Despite having so much disruption to

learning during the Covid pandemic, this cohort has performed exceptionally well and should be feeling incredibly proud of themselves".

The highest achievers of all were Thea Benson and Eve Kayll, both of whom registered absolutely perfect performances, with grade 9s in all ten of the subjects they entered. This is a truly extraordinary performance, especially given how many exams are involved and how challenging GCSEs are these days.

Ten students scored the top



grade 9 in nine of the nine or ten subjects they entered, 20 achieved grades 8 or 9 in at least nine different subjects, and a further 32 students gained at least nine grades 9–7 (i.e., equivalent to the old A* or A grades).

Excellent results

Commenting on the excellent results, Mr Williams said: "Lymm High School students have done brilliantly again. Huge credit must go to all those in Year 11 who have worked so hard to realise these results in the face of some really challenging circumstances. I am delighted for them."

Mr Williams also paid credit to the parents and carers who had the difficult task of keeping children focused and motivated throughout Year 10 and 11.

"However hard staff have worked (and they have worked harder than ever) results like these are always the product of a successful partnership between home and school. Everyone associated with the school can feel proud of what has been achieved."

Hall System Update

Mr Hayes was delighted to address the students in the first Hall assemblies of the year last week. The theme of the month for September is 'Leadership and participation' and this was a great opportunity to reinforce the importance of the Hall system, and outline opportunities where students can participate in extra-curricular activities.

This was seen as a priority given that these students had missed out on trips due to Covid.

Further participation opportunities were signposted in the assembly. In particular, students have been invited to contribute ideas regarding next month's key theme of 'Tolerance', where we will be embracing Black History Month. Students were also encouraged to attend our Enrichment Fayre, where they can sign up to a whole host of extra-curricular clubs and activities. There are certainly plenty of opportunities to get involved in and our staff are looking forward to welcoming students to the various clubs.

On Monday 12th September local photographer Andrew Collier visited us to run an after-school photography workshop.



All students thoroughly enjoyed the workshop, exploring many different areas of the school to find interesting architectural points to photograph.






















ROYAL NAVY COOKS

This University of Liverpool Maths Club is aimed at Year 10 up to Year 13, who are keen to experience challenging and enriching mathematics from beyond the school curriculum, and meet others with a similar interest.

he dates of this free monthly Maths session are:

The sessions take place on the University campus on a Saturday morning and are designed to be as interactive as possible. They are delivered mainly by academic staff and postgraduates from across the Faculty of Science and Engineering, with occasional invited speakers from research or industry.

This is an excellent opportunity for students to be introduced to a range of mathematical ideas, experience what it's like to learn mathematics in a university environment, explore topics linked to research and the university curriculum, and meet University of Liverpool staff

and students informally.



There is no dress code for Maths Club and school uniform is not necessary. Students need to bring along a pen, pencil, ruler and scientific calculator to all meetings. It's all About STEM

On Wednesday 28th September, 70 Year 7 students had the opportunity to take part in Shell's Energy Quest workshop.

The journey to inspire more young people about engineering starts in school and that's why Shell have been supporting and delivering this in-school programme since 2014. More than 215,000 students across the UK have had a chance to take part in this experience.

Our Year 7s unlocked their inner engineers as they explored sustainable energy sources to solve a real -life situation. Students were tasked with saving Coletta and her friend Ruby from a forest. They had to come up with a way to keep Coletta's phone charged and to shelter the girls until they got rescued, using only an orange, some coins and



resources from the woods.

Students learned from Vicky, our facilitator, about the importance of failure in any design process. Our students took this information onboard and dived straight in. With each failed attempt, the teams worked together to solve the problem and try again. Eventually, with a little bit of help and lots of great teamwork, we all managed to power the device and Coletta and Ruby could be found using the GPS tracker on her phone.

For Sadie Harrison's latest Open Water challenge, the Year 9 student tackled Lake Windermere, which is 10.5 miles long.


