ymm instrumentalists and singers once again took to St Peter's Church in Oughtrington on Monday 16th December to perform in the annual Christmas carol


service.

LHS MOCK ELECTION

Lib Dems win big in one election: the LHS school 'mock elections'

S tudents representing the Liberal Democrats won nearly a third of the 'seats' in the mock election organised by Lymm High School.

The Liberal Democrats might have suffered crushing disappointment in the general election, but the party cleaned up among the school student vote.

In the run-up to the general election, Lymm High School held its very own mock election with interesting results.

School candidate Joe Slater, representing the Liberal

Democrats won nearly a third of the 'seats' contested, with 552 votes overall.

Over 1598 individual voting slips were posted into the ballot boxes during the school's mock election and it was fantastic to see so many young people actively engage in politics and current affairs.

In second place were the Green Party with 418 votes.

And while the Conservative Party won a substantial majority in the real thing, this did not reflect in the student mock election result with neither of the main parties running in the general election gaining sufficient votes.


The idea of a mock election is for students to gain a hands-on insight into how an election works, by running for office, exploring manifestos, canvassing support, designing campaign posters and then casting their votes.

A mock election also provides a great opportunity for students to learn important skills such as public speaking, critical thinking and team working and, importantly, it also gets young people into the voting habit early.

Year 12 student wins prestigious Arkwright Scholarship

ymm High School student, Tom Antrobus, has been awarded an Arkwright Engineering Scholarship, the most prestigious scholarship of its type in the UK to inspire and nurture school-age students to be the country's future leaders of the Engineering Profession.

Tom was one of more than 400 of the country's most talented students to have been honoured at ceremonies that were held in London and Edinburgh on the 31st October.

As one of the UK's leading engineering programmes, the Scholarships are awarded to high-calibre 16 year old students through a rigorous selection process and support students through the two years of their A levels. Since its inception, more than 5,700 young people have passed through the scholarship programme, including award-winning BBC presenter Steph McGovern, who forged a career at Black & Decker before moving into business journalism.

This year more than 1,370 students aged between 15 and 16 years old applied, following nominations from their schools.

Scholars are selected for their potential as future engineering leaders by assessing their academic, practical and leadership skills in engineering disciplines. These are gauged through a selection process comprising of an assessed application form including a teacher's reference; a two-hour problem-solving



aptitude exam; and a university-based interview.

The scholarships support students through their sixth form studies and encourage them into top universities or higher apprenticeships while offering access to a range of enrichment experiences such as industry conferences, Connect Days, mentoring, residential courses and university VIP days.

We wish Tom huge congratulations on his achievement and being awarded such a prestigious scholarship and look forward to following his progress through the 6th Form.

The soup Kitchen was set up with the goal of providing a facility for vulnerable children to be cared for and fed where their parents are either absent or destitute. For some of these children, the only meal they receive is the one given for free at school.

The soup kitchen provides a meal for children at weekends and during the school holidays when most would go hungry.

More recently, the Soup kitchen has expanded and now provides a homework centre to help children with their studies outside of school hours.

Last year Afritwin help to fund a toilet block which was greatly received. However the fence surrounding the site of the Soup kitchen was also no longer fit for purpose. We're pleased to say Afritwin have funded a new one which now not only keeps the children safe, but keeps the local chickens, pigs and dogs out!

Y9 MATHS ROADSHOW

T he maths department were delighted to welcome members of the Liverpool Mathematics Society Outreach Team recently to facilitate a workshop for our Year 9 students.

The Fun Maths Roadshow has been designed to engage students with mathematical problem and puzzle solving.

Working in pairs or small teams, students were asked to apply their mathematical knowledge to previously unseen puzzles and challenges and over the period of an hour, were tasked to complete as many of these as possible.

The puzzles gave them an opportunity to exercise their logical thinking, apply number and reasoning skills and to collaborate efficiently within a team.

Students engaged positively with the opportunity to discuss the problems they were faced with and showed their competitive sides, striving to complete as many of the puzzles made available to them in the time frame!

ENGINEERING YOUR Future



Y ear 12 students visit 'Engineering Your Future' event at the Halliwell Jones stadium in Warrington. The group of students visited the Warrington stadium on Thursday 21st November where they attended a number of sessions led by professional engineers to find out about engineering career paths, what their jobs involve and how they ended up in their current roles.

Organised by All About STEM, the event is an annual showcase of what it means to become an engineer and to embark on a career in the engineering sector. During the day, students also took part in a series of workshops where they were tasked with finding solutions to problems such as building and costing flood defences, designing a bridge and building the electric circuit for a drone to direct it safely on its flight path.

The event also allowed the students to meet and network with employers and representative from various training organisations and professional bodies including the Institute of Mechanical Engineers and the Institute of Physics.

LIVERPOOL MATHS CLUB

maths INSPIRATION

L HS students head to the Royal Northern College of Music for annual Maths Inspiration lectures. Year 11 and 12 students from Lymm High School took part in a series of lectures recently aimed to inspire students by presenting mathematics in the context of exciting, real-world applications.

Held at the Royal Northern College of Music, and hosted by professional mathematician, Matt Parker, students listened to a number of engaging speakers talk about how they use maths in their working lives.

Rob Eastway, the puzzle adviser for New Scientist magazine and bestselling author of 'Why Do Buses Come In Threes?' and 'Maths On the Back of an Envelope', spoke about how some think maths is about getting a precise answer. Often appearing on BBC Radio 4 and 5 Live to talk about the maths of everyday, he explained:

"There's a vital type of maths - 'impure maths' - which is done on the back of an envelope, where the answer is only a rough approximation. His talk demonstrated how back-of-envelope maths can help with anything from landing a top job to working out the chance of Earth being invaded by aliens.

Aoife Hunt, who works for Movement Strategies, a consultancy that specialises in analysing the movements of people, also spoke at the event. Her talk demonstrated how professional consultants use GCSE and AS Level maths to understand the movement of crowds – whether at Wembley Stadium, Glastonbury or Heathrow Airport. Students discovered the unlikely connection between crowd flow and quadratic equations, and how computer games are being built to predict what you will do in an emergency.

Reader in Engineering at Cambridge University, Hugh Hunt, was the third and final speaker.

Awarded the prestigious Rooke Award for public promotion of engineering, Hugh is famous for his documentaries on Channel 4, including Dambusters - Building the Bouncing Bomb and Attack of the Zeppelins.

His research is in Climate Engineering and his talk addressed the mechanics of spin e.g. how spinning things such as gyroscopes actually work!

He gave insight into questions such as: 'Why does a spinning top stand up?' And, 'Why doesn't a rolling wheel fall over?'

The Maths Inspiration Lectures had a lot to live up to in name but they did truly inspire our students and staff about some very exciting and boundary pushing applications of maths in the real world.

We are looking forward to an equally exciting return visit next year!



TOMORROWS ENGINEERS



ear 7 students enjoyed a three-hour workshop on Tuesday 3rd December as Lymm High School welcomed Tomorrow's Engineers. The Tomorrow's Engineers programme, led by the engineering community, provides a platform for employers to work effectively with schools to inspire more young people to consider a careers in engineering.

Supported by two local STEM Ambassadors, students discovered what engineering was all about and what opportunities there are in pursuing engineering as a career.

The theme of the workshop was "Energy" and students took part in a number of different challenges and activities through the morning. Working in teams students were tasked with identifying some of the current energy challenges facing society including where we get our current energy sources from and how they may impact on the planet.

Students were asked to design an innovative and imaginative way that Lymm High School could be powered in 2050 and they came up with some very interesting ideas!

The final challenge allowed the students to work collaboratively in the design of a basic electric car that had to be operational and fit for purpose. Students had to consider the position of the wheels, how cog systems work, the need for balance and the streamlining of their cars. Once tested, students had to calculate how much charge would be required to travel the required distance.

OXNET

L ymm High School students considering the University of Oxford welcome OxNet coordinator Felix Slade.

Scholars from Year 10 and 11 along with their Year 12 peers welcomed the speaker from Oxford University on Wednesday 8th November.

Felix is one of the coordinators of the OxNet programme with specific responsibility for recruiting students from the North West.

The North West is currently one of the lowest represented regions at Oxford and part of Felix's talk helped to dispel some of the myths about studying there.

During the visit, students discovered how the collegiate system worked and what a typical day as an Oxford student would be like.

Students listened as he discussed the role of tutors and the seminar system which sets Oxford apart from many other Universities. After encouraging students to apply, Felix suggested ways in which candidates could strengthen their applications.

Felix also spoke to the students about the OxNet programme and what it would offer them in terms of preparation for University (more details below).

We are very thankful for Felix for taking the time to visit Lymm High School and look forward to welcoming him back in future.



THE OXNET PROGRAMME

OxNet is an Access initiative run collaboratively between participating colleges at the University of Oxford, led by Pembroke College, other Higher Education institutions across the United Kingdom, third sector organisations, and secondary schools acting as "hubs" in London, the North West and the North East of England. It is unapologetically academic in its focus, and has had significant impact in the local communities in which it has worked since 2008.

Each year OxNet runs a number of programmes to help prepare Year 12 students to embark on their higher education courses at academically rigorous universities such as Oxford. The programmes include Science, Humanities and Social Sciences, Modern Languages and Philosophy. Applications open on 29th November 2019 for this years' intake. We would encourage any interested student who is considering the University of Oxford as an option for further study to apply.

The championship has seen over 600 qualifying events staged throughout the UK and ROI, with over 22,000 junior golfers taking part and hoping to win a place in the final.

Back in June, Freddie came 2nd on the national Net leaderboard with a score of -13 at the Warrington Golf Club Open qualifying event.

His score made him one of four lucky net players to win one of the prized spots in the competition and through to compete in the 54 hole final on the prestigious North Course.
