## GCSE RESULTS DAY 2018

### Students celebrate achievements at Lymm High School after top grades!

ast year saw us achieve our best ever GCSE results and we are delighted to say that it looks as if we have managed to maintain that level of performance this year.

At least 81% of students have met the government's 'basics'

measure of 9-4 grades in both Maths and English, with 61% managing to secure 9-5 grades in both subjects.

At the top end, a very impressive 27% of students gained at least five 9-7 grades (equivalent to the old A\*-A

grades) with at least forty-five students gaining 9-7 grades in eight or more subjects.

Amongst so many success stories, special mention goes to those students who gained the very top grades of 8 or 9 in at

## A' LEVEL RESULTS DAY 2018



### Lymm High School celebrates excellent A' level results again!

S tudents, parents and staff also celebrated another excellent set of results in the sixth form over summer.

Headteacher, Gwyn Williams said:

"The picture is one of another set of really strong A' level results.

"When Ofsted visited us earlier this year, they said that our A' level students make some of the best rates of progress in the whole country and progress rates shown this year have risen even further, which is something we are especially proud of.

Once again, we have seen very high numbers of students achieving the top grades and the number of students who have been able to go off to the universities of their choice was fantastic. There were a lot of very happy people on results day and it was just lovely to see."

57% of all A' level grades were at A\*-B and 84% A\*-C.

The overall pass rate was over 99%. Fully twenty students secured straight A\* or A grades, a fabulous achievement in these days of toughened A' level

specifications.

There are far too many individual success stories to mention, but we must highlight the eight students who gained at least two coveted A\* grades. These were: William Caldwell, William Catlow, Rory Foster, Joseph Hassall, Pip Hyde, Hannah Leighton-Jones, Ellen Thomas and Matthew Warren. Hannah and Will Catlow are now heading off to study at Oxford and Cambridge respectively and we wish them all the very best there.

We also had plenty of success in vocational courses with well over half of grades awarded being at Distinction or Distinction\* level and a 100% pass rate.



### TOP MARKS FOR YEAR 10



f course, it wasn't just last year's Year 11 who were sitting GCSE exams in the summer: Year 10 students also sat English Literature. The idea behind this was that they would be able to devote all their energies to revising for this one subject in Year 10 and, if things went well, they would be free to focus on English Language in Year 11 as well as having one fewer subject to revise for at the end of the year.

As it turns out, everything went very much to plan and the students did superbly. 84% of them gained 9-4 grades (which was actually even higher than the Year 11s managed) and over 60% gained 9-5 grades. Six

students were able to secure grade 9s – the new highest grade and even more difficult to attain than the old A\*. For this fabulous achievement, our congratulations go to: Imogen Good, Leah Hodgkinson, Hannah Maudsley Barton, Katie Richardson, Olivia Walsh and Lucy Whitmore.

All in all, the year group seem to have taken a great deal of confidence from sitting their Literature exam early and, now that they know what a GCSE exam really entails, they are in the perfect position to approach the challenges ahead.

When asked about the results Miss Jones, Head of Faculty for English said, "We are so proud of the outstanding results attained by our Year 10 students who sat their English Literature GCSE.

"A special mention must go to those students who achieved grade 9s, their mature and conscientious attitude towards their English Literature qualification has set a wonderful example to their fellow students and we couldn't be more thrilled with their achievement.

"Year 10 students have worked incredibly hard, both in lessons and outside of school, and we are very pleased that this has been reflected in the grades that they have been awarded."

## GCSEPOD & @TASSOMAI

S eptember has seen the launch of two fantastic Apps offering extra support to our GCSE students – GCSEPod and Tassomai.

The launch of GCSEPod took place three weeks ago and all our key stage 4 students and been really impressed with it.

GCSEPod provides highly concentrated 3-5 minute bursts of audio-visual, expert-written learning which can help to reinforce and consolidate key GCSE topics covered in lessons. The App is available on and offline and is proven to increase students grades if

used regularly. The students are able to create bespoke playlists of content ready to view and learn off line at any time or can stream via mobile, laptop or desktop. Everyone has been hugely impressed with how much the students have embraced this opportunity and were amazed to receive a Bronze certificate for the school from GCSEPod as the students had watched over 3000 pods in three weeks!

Year 11 have also been introduced to the Tassomai App, this is unique to Science and offers low stake testing.

Tassomai is a way to avoid stressful cramming near exams by spreading the learning and revision throughout the year.

We are encouraging all students to just spend 10 minutes each day on the Apps.

In order to support students and parents, from half term, there will be a dedicated section on the website for revision support. We will also be offering a 'Help your child to revise' master class for parents after the half term holiday so watch this space for further information.



## MAKE YOUR MARK

four other candidates to be named Warrington's member of Youth Parliament eighteen months ago.

Now studying for her A levels in the Sixth Form, she has her sights set on a career in politics, continuing her campaign for more young people to get involved in political affairs and to drive change in Warrington.

As youth MP, Imogen helps

organise the youth council in Warrington and has run a number of campaigns throughout the past year and a half - including a mental health campaign aimed to remove stigmas surrounding mental illness.

Working with the youth council to create posters and displays for health centres around Warrington, Imogen has aimed to deliver a positive message about mental health, highlighting the point that one in four people presently suffer with mental health issues.

The youth council is now starting 'A Curriculum for Life' - a national campaign by Youth Parliament.

As part of the campaign, the youth council are currently in the process of making small educational videos about topics not currently included in the national curriculum.

These focus on themes such as; budgeting, politics, sex and relationships and how to handle a payslip, and it is hoped this campaign will prepare young people in Warrington for adult life.

Each year the largest youth referendum in Europe takes place and people decide what the Youth Parliament should campaign for.

The youth council is now encouraging young people to vote in the Make Your Mark ballot, the largest consultation of young people aged 11 to 18 in Europe.

The top five most voted issues

are taken to parliament where they are debated by members of Youth Parliament.

Whichever school or youth group gets the highest percentage turnout in the Make Your Mark vote will win an award from the youth council.

Imogen makes it clear that the youth council is open to anyone with an interest in making a change in Warrington.

She said: "You don't have to understand politics to come to our meetings. I didn't, I just wanted to change things for young people in Warrington.

Imogen remains in her position until March, serving two years and will debate again in November, visiting the House of Commons for a third time.

s we approach the first half term of this year, parents may be starting to consider how to keep their children occupied during their time away from school.


This year, half term coincides with the Manchester Science Festival which runs from Thursday 18th until Sunday 28th October.

### Lymm Sixth Form student wins Bronze medal at the UK School Games.

S tudent Jordan Jones took part in the games representing the North of England in the 1500 metres Steeplechase.

The 2018 UK School Games is a major multi-sport event for the most talented young athletes across the UK.

On Friday 31st August, more than 1,400 young athletes competed across 11 sports at venues across Loughborough University Campus.

In the steeplechase, Jordan Jones came third overall, winning a bronze medal in the 1500 metre race.

This is a fabulous end to an impressive 2018 track season for Jordan, which has seen him gain both County and Inter-County titles in the 1500 metres steeplechase and the

3000 metres in the under 17 age group.
