U nderstandably this is an extremely anxious time for many students with their GCSE and Alevel exams taking place.

EARLY CLOSURE

P lease note that school is open as normal on the 14th June.

The website at the start of the school year suggested we would be holding an open evening on this date and therefore closing early, but this is no longer the case.

UNIFORM POLICY

U niform policy can be a source of contention in every school, simply because there are so many different views on the subject. The more complicated a policy is and the more variations allowed, the more room there is for ambiguity, so it is our intention to keep things as straightforward as possible during the summer months.

When conditions are uncomfortable in school (something that depends on humidity, breeze and temperatures overnight as much as the actual temperature on any given day) we allow students to take blazers off and, if we feel it necessary, to remove ties and undo top buttons. Mrs Ryles-Dean is the person in school who typically makes the decision to allow these things and then emails all staff to pass on the message to students. These decisions are made on the day, and subject to the conditions within school at the time. We always allow teachers to use their discretion in allowing students to remove blazers in lessons, depending on conditions in that particular classroom.

Year 10 and 11 students will already know that we are allowing them to wear PE kit on days when they have external exams. This is because we know the Sports Hall can get very warm, especially when full of students. Students also know that they do not need to ask permission to remove blazers or ties during external exams.

In addition, when we are enjoying any nice summer weather it might be useful to remind students that the following suggestions are worth considering:

- Make use of the shady areas. We are fortunate that there is plenty of shade available around the school as well as the opportunity to stay indoors during break and lunchtimes. Students who choose to sunbathe or play football in the full sun for most of the break periods tend to be more likely to complain about the heat in the afternoon!
- Keep your refillable water bottle topped up. Students are encouraged to bring water bottles into school with them and to fill them up at breaks and lunchtime. They are allowed to drink water during lesson time, but please bear in mind that we do not usually let students leave lessons to get water.
- Girls are also reminded that they are free to wear plain black trousers if they find these more comfortable than tights on warm days.

If there are any truly exceptionally hot days, we will consider letting all students wear PE kit. However, we want to be very clear here; these will only be exceptionally hot days and not just normal summer weather. We would only anticipate needing to do this during a genuine heatwave.

We ask parents and students to bear in mind that there will always be differences of opinion as to what constitutes weather that is hot enough for adjustments to be made.

Whilst our aim is always to be reasonable, there has to be a balance between maintaining consistency of standards and making adjustments when really necessary. Thank you, as ever, for your understanding and support with this.

he popular event held on the school grounds returns again this June and is undoubtedly one of the biggest community celebrations in the school's calendar.

Visitors will enjoy a whole host of activities including traditional games, fairground rides, inflatables, zorbing and a number of stalls run by the school as well as community enterprises.

You'll find a range of music and performing arts, displays and presentations, including the opportunity to compete in Lymm's very own singing competition, 'The Voice'.

There will also be a staff sumo race, a coconut shy and raffles, and a range of refreshments available throughout the afternoon including a bar, hot food, cream teas, ice-creams and a BBQ.

"It's been a huge feat of organisation for everyone involved in the school community and we are so proud of how students, staff and local businesses have pulled together to create an event which will help provide our students and community with fantastic facilities.

FOODBANK SUCCESS

Lymm High School students helped contribute back to their local community by donating tonnes of food to their local Foodbank.

T he collection, a Sixth Form-led volunteering food drive before the half term break, urged students to collect as many food donations as possible.

The Trussell Trust runs a network of over 400 foodbanks, giving emergency food and support to people in crisis across the UK, where thirteen million people live below the poverty line.

The aim of the collection was to provide extra resources in

aid of the area's local Foodbank, who are experiencing a worrying rise in emergency demand.

The school as a whole, collected four barrels of food donations, with the collection proving to be a huge success!

GOLD IN VENICE!

Year 9 student Amy Jade Nelson has recently competed in the International Diamond Skate Trophy competition in Dollo, Venice.

he young figure skater won a gold medal in the competition, landing all her jumps in a beautiful programme despite the increase in technicality.

Sharing the rink in Venice with 140 other skaters from seven countries, Amy was skating for the first time in junior ladies' division, having earned her move up to the category when she won at the world championships last year.

She is now preparing to compete in the World Open Inline Figure Skating Championships this summer.

Amy trains regularly, before and after school and also at weekends. When asked about the upcoming competition Amy said, "It was such an amazing experience and I would like to thank my coaches Jane and Donna for helping me achieve my goals!

"Over the past three years I have completed numerous tests and competitions, skated at Ice hockey matches, been in Christmas shows, Easter galas and skated in the professionals on Ice tour.

"I also do inline skating which recently resulted in winning gold for Great Britain in the 3rd and 4th junior ladies' division in Dijon last year. I'm really looking forward to competing again in the world championships for Great Britain in July with all my skating friends"





WATER WARNING

There are many sites in Cheshire where on a hot day children are entering into the water surrounding Lymm, for example The Bridgewater Canal, The Bollin River, Lymm Dam and the river bed at Warburton. Cheshire Police have asked us to speak to parents/carers about the danger of going into open water after dealing with incidents of children in the locality.

With the warm weather and the Whit and summer holidays children and young people may be tempted to take a dip in open water to cool down. Please can you speak with your children to get the message across that rather than being a bit of fun, swimming in reservoirs, quarries, dams, lakes, canals, meres, weirs and similar bodies of open water is very dangerous and every year young lives are lost in tragic drowning incidents.

For awareness it has been reported that some children have become unwell and have had an allergic reaction to being in the local River Bollin suffering a rash and blisters and have had to seek medical attention.

Please see below from Cheshire Police highlighting the dangers around water safety for children and young people.

Beautiful but deadly: why reservoirs are best enjoyed from the banks.

We have 180 reservoirs across the North West, many in beautiful locations. We'd love you to visit your local site, but please, stay out of the water. Reservoirs may look inviting, especially on a hot day, but they are about the worst possible places to take a swim.

The freezing cold water can numb your limbs, while hidden currents and machinery can drag you under, even the strongest swimmers can quickly get into difficulty.

MASTERING YOGA



ur Year 9 and 10 Youth Health Champions are currently working with local Yoga instructor, Callie Meakin on a 6-session course of challenging Yoga.

The students want to strengthen their understanding of how the physical body and the mind work together to aid our overall wellbeing.

n Wednesday 16th May a group of 8 Key stage 3 girls attended a Cyber First Day at Priestley College. The event was organised by the Youth Fed to highlight IT careers and pathways and encourage more girls to enter this field.

The students took part in group challenges and discussions and listened to some engaging speakers talking about topics including the history of computing, e safety and the impact of mobile phones and social media.

The students were given the opportunity to do some hands on coding and programming with Python and met with industry experts and people who work in the Computer Science industry to find out what their daily jobs entail and how their careers have progressed. The day was thoroughly enjoyable and enlightening and the students gained a lot from their experience.

Junior Maths Challenge

This year Lymm High School has seen unprecedented success in the Junior Maths Challenge, with a large proportion of students who were entered gaining an award. This year we had five students in Year 7 and five students in Year 8 achieve a Gold award. Special congratulations must go to Zuza Konca in Year 8 who, not only achieved best in school and best in year, but qualified for the Olympiad – an accomplishment that only the top students nationally achieve. Zuza is the first student for some time to qualify for this prestigious competition. Charlie Exley - also in Year 8 – also gualified for a secondary competition - the Junior Kangaroo. Well done to both of them. The Junior Maths Challenge is an annual national maths competition that tests student's problem solving and reasoning skills.

STEM Careers Club

The final half term of this academic year also sees the launch of the STEM Careers Club. The Club will allow students to find out about a variety of different STEM Careers – some traditional and some in evolving industries. Each week a different career will be explored and students will watch a live broadcast with a professional who works in the science, technology or digital media industries. Students will complete mini challenges set by the interviewee and do their own research on the careers featured. They will also be given the opportunity to set questions each week in advance of the interviews. Future guests will include a Sugar Scientist, a digital entrepreneur and a Google innovator!
