

ARBORETUM VISIT

Year 7 scholars visited Staffordshire Memorial Arboretum last Tuesday as part of their project on World War One.

They completed a guided tour of significant World War One memorials including the Gallipoli Campaign and Shot at Dawn.

During the tour students learnt about the symbolism of the memorials such as the colours, structure and even the surrounding landscaping. For example at the shot at dawn memorial there were 306 posts that represented soldiers that had been shot for cowardice despite

suffering from shell shock that had been pardoned in 2009.

After their tour, students completed an act of remembrance at the Tank Corps memorial. This gave them time to reflect on the personal stories they had heard and on those who have made contributions in conflict up to the present day.

In the afternoon students participated in a group activity, investigating different soldiers from multiple fronts. From this, they constructed a presentation about their chosen soldier and delivered

their findings to the rest of the group.

This experience will now be used to help students create a piece of work inspired by their studies on World War One and exhibited at the Relationships Centre in Warrington.



THE MOST INSPIRATIONAL PERSON I KNOW

Scholar student Jade wins writing competition for essay on her most inspirational person.

As part of the Holocaust Memorial Day, Year 10 Scholars watched a live streaming by Mala, a Holocaust Survivor. Her story and delivery were inspiring and as such the scholars were then asked to complete an essay on 'The Most Inspirational Person I Know.' Students were asked to reflect on any person who inspired them, they could be a personal friend, it could be historical or someone famous but the essay needed to be written in an appropriate academic style. Students were asked to consider and explain the impact that that person had either on their own lives, or that of others.

We had some fantastic entries with a wide range of people, such as Tim Berners-Lee, the inventor of the internet, whose persistence and dedication to computing has impacted all our lives, particularly due to his philanthropic nature of providing this tool to the world for free. Other essays



were more personal and local such as Mr Dave Shipton, a local karate instructor whose perseverance, discipline and motivation inspires one of our scholars.

However, our overall winner was Jade Carlin, for her essay on Emma Watson. Jade was inspired by her favourite literary character in Hermione, from the Harry Potter series, however as Emma grew up, Jade's admiration also grew, admiring her confidence and motivation to make a

difference whether that be on equality or her courageousness as a UN Ambassador promoting education for girls in less privileged countries.

Chef Steven Turner with his Sous chef Will Stout came in 3rd place overall. Chef Pierre De Villies came in 2nd place with his sharing starter dish. Chef Darcy Whittingham and her Sous chef Emma Parkinson was crowned the overall winner of the competition. Darcy and Emma prepared a Trio of desserts for the competition.

Mrs Deane, Head of Food Technology said when asked about the competition, "Being given the list of ingredients as a base, it was clear to see that everyone had really thought about their dish and had prepared well. The atmosphere in food tech was great and the hard working attitude of every student was a pleasure to see."

MY LITTLE BROTHER

Student Zach inspires his form group to do their bit to support Cheshire Down Syndrome Support Group for World Down's Syndrome awareness day.

Student Zach is a polite friendly member of form 7ML and a big part of their form family!

Before the Spring Break Zach approached his Form Tutor Miss Pennack, and asked if he could present something to the rest of his class. He proceeded to show a picture of his younger brother and a presentation he had written.

It takes a lot of courage to stand up in front of a group of people especially when you're sharing something personal – but Zach was brilliant! Everyone cheered and the whole form were inspired to do their bit to support Cheshire Down Syndrome Support Group.

All students in the form made cakes for a bake sale, we sold out in a record breaking twenty minutes and we raised £125! A big well done to 7ML and a special thank you to Zach for his kindness, bravery and endless positivity!

My little brother is 5 years old, he loves street dance, pizza and music. He also has something called Down's syndrome. Down's syndrome is a condition that he was born with. It is caused by a third chromosome being present in the 21st pair. Chromosomes make you into the person you are. It means you are a combination of your parents however this extra chromosome means that you have similar features to other people with Down's syndrome.

This means also that he has some learning difficulties, floppy limbs and hearing issues. He is also deaf in one ear and needs to wear a hearing aid.

These problems don't seem to stop him being an annoying little brother and an amazing street dancer. He is in school and is learning to read and write. He is able to draw and paint and do all of the things other people can.

In fact people with Down's syndrome can work, get married, appear on television. There are now people with Down's syndrome appearing in adverts, soap operas and films. There are artists painting for the Royal family and even an Italian Mayor with Down's syndrome.

Today is World Down's Syndrome awareness day the 21st of the 3rd month. It is recognized by the United Nations and is important to families like mine as we can show how Harry can be like everyone else and is a star in his own right. Lots of people wear odd socks to show that even though they are different the socks are the same and do the same job. Also they look like the Chromosome patterns that cause Harry's Down's syndrome.

It can be hard sometimes as Harry is a little bit embarrassing, loud and doesn't care what he does (he also doesn't sleep!) but I wouldn't change him at all.
