


Form groups are now putting their charity thinking caps on to come up with clever ways to

THE HOUSE OF BERNARDA ALBA

'Brick up the walls and board up the windows, not even a gust of wind shall enter this house'

he 5 daughters of Bernarda Alba have been locked in their home in a small village in Andalusia for the next eight years of their lives to mourn the death of Bernarda's second husband. With an all-female cast, the play hones in on the issues facing women in this era. It explores themes of repression, passion, conformity, and studies the effects of men upon women with little freedom. Bernarda's cruel tyranny over her daughters foreshadows the stifling nature of Franco's fascist regime, which was to arrive just a few weeks after Lorca finished writing his play. Lorca's association with a number of intellectuals who belonged to the Communist Party of Spain and his homosexuality were to result in his assassination shortly after the outbreak of Civil War in July 1936.

We arrived at the play unsure



of what to expect, having only read the play in Spanish initially it was strange to hear the lines we all knew so well in Spanish, being spoken in English. Naturally, we had arrived with our own preconceptions and ideas of the character's personalities however watching a different presentation of the characters deepened our understanding of them. Additionally, it was interesting to see the presentation of characters outside of our classroom studies. Sign language and audio descriptions were cleverly woven into the production to become part of the aesthetic,, even adding a new dimension of characters. For example, the effect created by Angustias, the eldest and the fiancé of Pepe, and Adela the youngest and most suited partner for Pepe, being deaf and only using sign language to speak added to the intensity of their conflict which culminated into Adela's screaming at the end, a stark contrast to her silence throughout the play.

Being performed in the round allowed the audience to better connect with different characters and also highlighted the importance of the atmosphere in this work. The play itself has a very simple plot which further places significance on the influence of the atmosphere a key feature of the work. Around the theatre were lines from the play which described the setting, 'the white walls of the interior of the house of Bernarda Alba' a constant reminder of the foreboding nature of the work.

THE TEMPEST THEATRE TRIP

n Thursday 2nd March, 86 students visited the Grand Theatre in Blackpool to watch the Royal Shakespeare Company perform 'The Tempest'- Shakespeare's magical last play of fun, fantasy and sorcery.

Directed by Aileen Gonsalves, and aimed at 8-13 year olds the play is intended for 8-13 year olds as an introduction to Shakespeare.

The Tempest tells the story of the exiled Duke, Prospero, who, on a crazy island swirling with sounds, uses magic to create a home within the wilderness. As his beloved daughter Miranda falls in love with a shipwrecked stranger from their homeland, she rebels against Prospero's power, and he must risk forgiving those who betrayed him, or lose her forever.

Students really enjoyed the performance, especially as they have just finished studying the play in their English lessons, it was a great way to complete their learning of Shakespeare.

THE SNOW DRAGONS

his week, students put on a spectacular performance of Lizzie Nunnery's play 'The Snow Dragons,' presented as part of the National Theatre's Connections programme, as a project set up to encourage the development of talent and potential in young people.

Set in a rural Norwegian town, 'The Snow Dragons' tells the tale of eight children who have the mammoth task of becoming young adults. After a fairly routine day out playing in the forests above their town in the valley of a fjord, they notice that the town has been invaded by enemy soldiers and they know that they are next to be found. We see boys become giants and girls become warriors. We are shown the strength of unity in children and how, when required, they can be stronger than any adults. This story of saddening beauty has allowed the cast to get their voice heard just like the characters in the play. With a cast ranging from Year 9 to Year 11, the sense of community has been unmatched.

Former Lymm student & Director James Allen and cast have done an excellent job of bringing to life realistic characters in a somewhat mythical and whimsical "between world", redolent of Norse mythology but with a storyline horribly relevant The audience were asked to constantly today. question whether we were watching real events, a children's game, or fantasy and mythology. As the play progresses it becomes clear that the events are all too real and the elements of fantasy fade into the background in favour of the harsh reality of modern warfare. The performance was really poignant and what was fantastic was that the entire production has been directed, composed and coordinated by our students. A special mention also goes to the string quartet for a fantastic performance and whose music was the perfect accompaniment. Well done to all students involved.

BEAUTIFUL WORK

went to Auschwitz with 4 sixth form students in November. The enormity and gravity of the Holocaust really shocked me and I wanted to bring some of my experience into the classroom. Teaching the Holocaust within Religious Studies enables the students to look closely at the personal and ethical conflicts rather than just historical facts. During the year we looked at the impact and importance of remembering the Holocaust, as part of this students were given a 4 week project to create their own Holocaust memorials. I was overwhelmed by the thought, care and creativity that the students put into the project. They wrote poems,

created posters, drawings and even made 3D models. One which I found particular touching was by Frankie McGann, he created his 3D memorial from chicken wire, barbed wire, flowers and leaves. He wrote: 'The wire represents captivity, the barbed wire represents the pain and suffering, but the flower buds represents hope and new life, the flowers represents the respect and remembrance we have for those that died'. I am proud that my students have shown such respect and overwhelmed by the sensitive and beautiful memorials they have created.



ONLINE FREE MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING



The UK has among the highest levels of self-harming among children in Europe. It's thought mounting social pressure on children from factors including body image, social media and succeeding at school are leading causes, with some devastating outcomes for some children. For us as a school, protecting students well-being will always be a priority; however, research has shown that parents feel very isolated and have limited access to resources if they have any concerns. Charity SelfharmUK, who surveyed over 1000 UK parents online, is warning parents to take the initiative.

Project Manager Ruth Ayres said: "With more children than ever being admitted to A&E each year due to self-injury, it is increasingly important to discuss self-harm with your child.

"Parents might not feel they need to broach the subject but our survey shows the likelihood is that parents or their children know a self-harmer.

"We fear thousands of children are suffering silently because many self-harmers don't come forward."

A 2016 report showed A&E admissions for young-people selfharming have risen by 68% in the last 10 years and there has been a 70% increase in 10-14 year olds attending for self-harm related reasons over the last two years. Half of those who selfharm once go on to do it again.

To help parents discuss self-harm and emotional resilience, SelfharmUK and Virtual College have launched a free online course and resource pack designed to help them discuss this important issue.
