Five Lymm High School teachers challenged themselves to climb Mount Snowdon and raised more than £1,000 for the school's Pitch In! campaign.

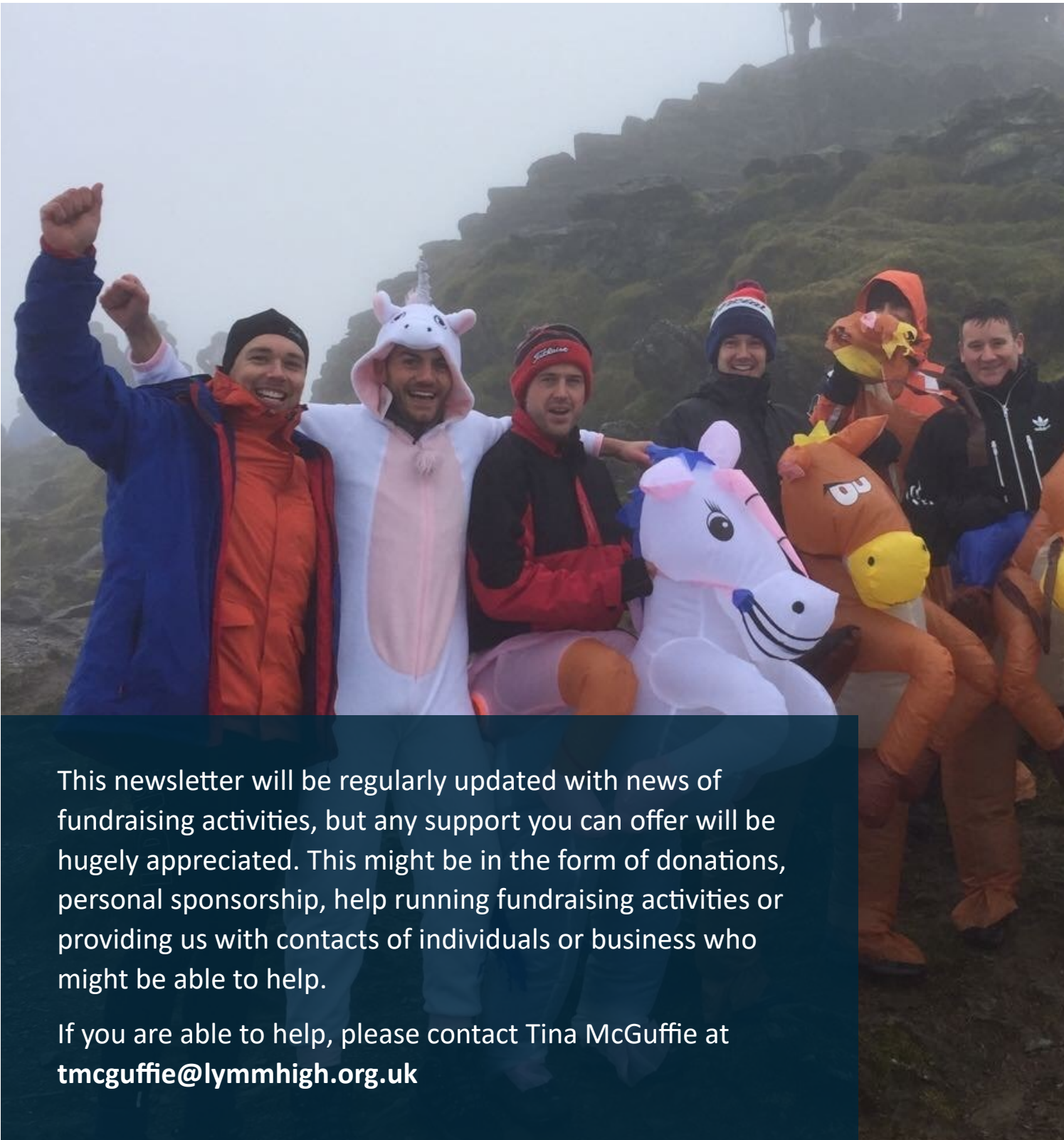
The five staff members put on the fancy dress costumes to climb Mount Snowdon in Wales, and battled through gale-force winds and

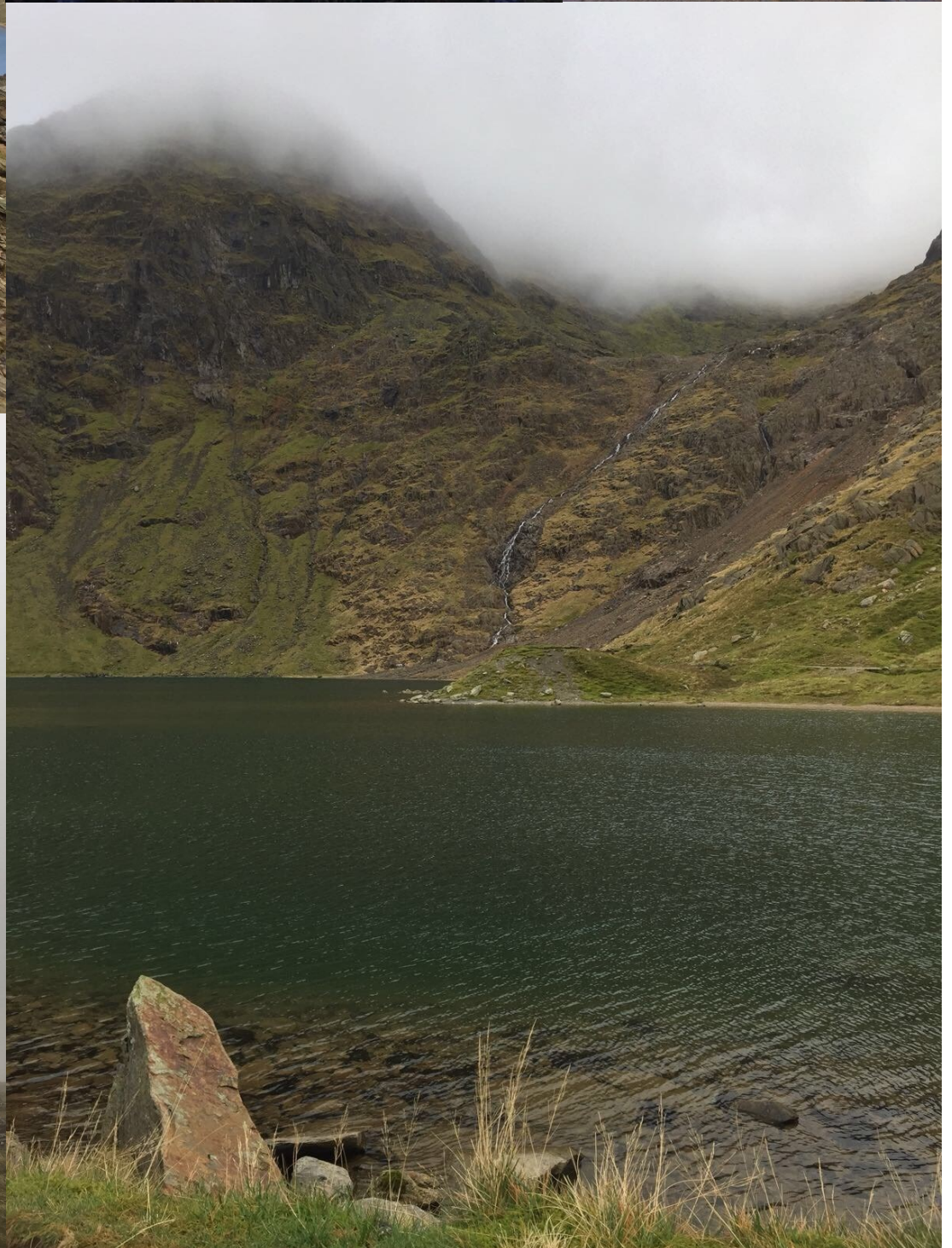
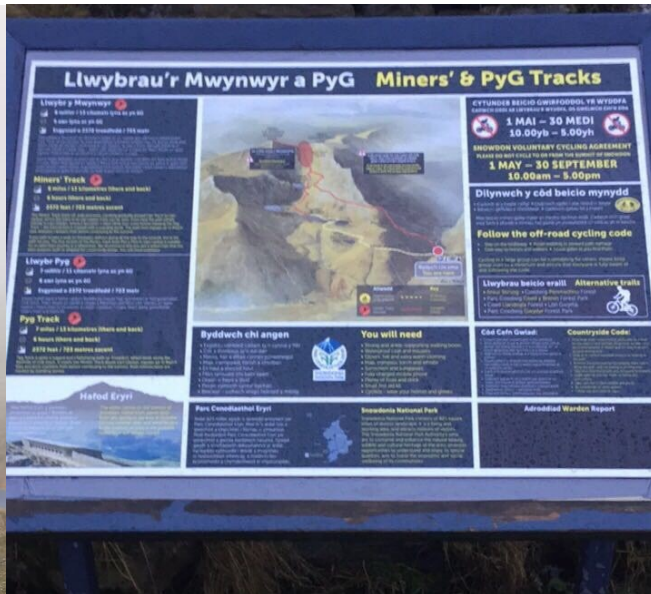

Last week students made some fantastic cakes with a Biology theme.

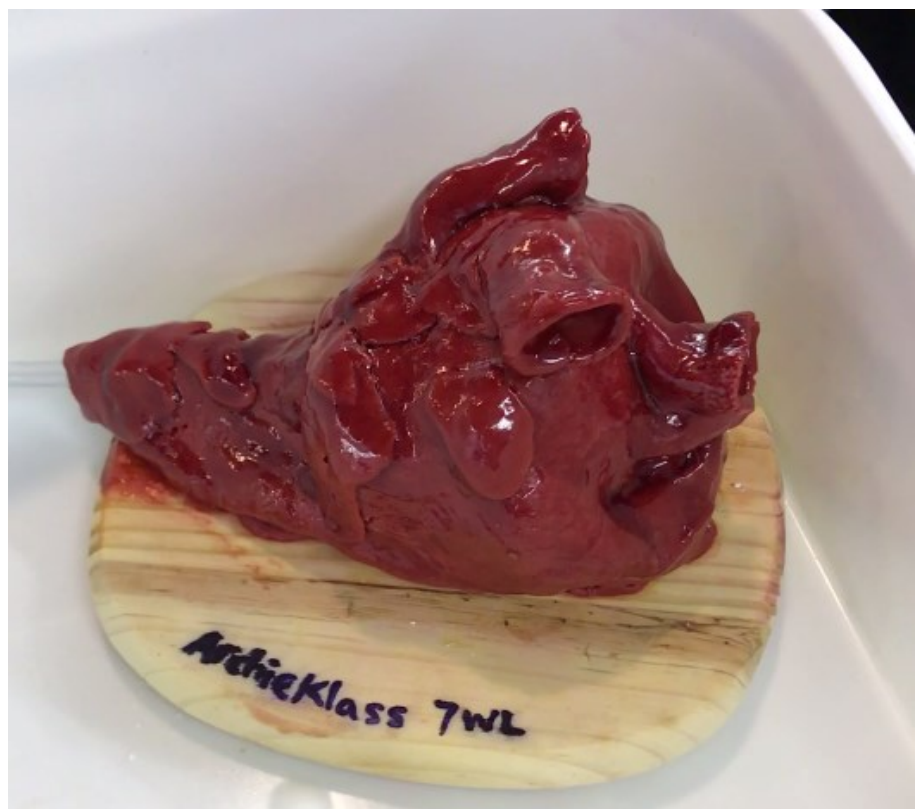
Their creativity and baking was put to the test by creating cakes that represented how the body works. They all chose very diverse areas to cover.

Archie Klass, the Year 7 winner and baker behind 'Beating Heart, certainly created a stir with his original design - it actually does beat!

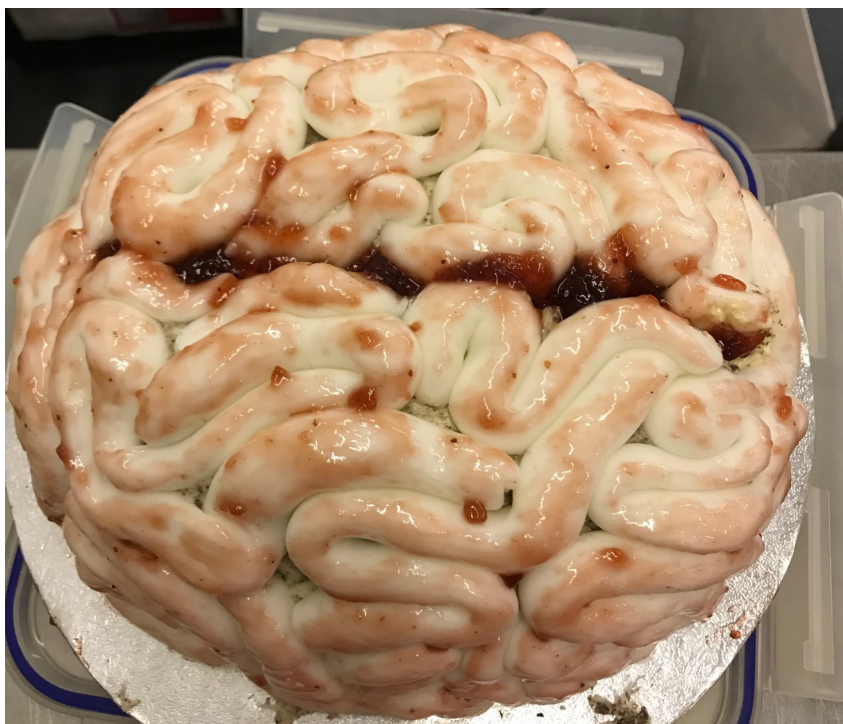


Yasmin White was crowned the winner for Year 8 with her amazing brain cake that Mrs Deane described as 'superb!'

FROM THE HEAD OF PE & SPORT

It has been an extremely busy start to the academic year for the PE and Sports Faculty. I don't think we have ever had a first half term with so many fixtures! I would like to thank all those members of staff in the school who have volunteered to run sports clubs and teams. In addition, I would like to thank the parents who have kindly offered their support. It is very much appreciated by the school and more importantly the children. Without the good will on offer it would be impossible to provide the range and depth of sporting opportunities that we currently do.

It looks like it's going to be another exciting year of sport ahead with many teams making promising starts. The current crop of Year 7 look to be full of talent, with some excellent performances in a variety of sports. The depth of talent we have in Year 7 boys football was evident when we beat St. Greggs 9-0 in the league on Monday and then fielded an entirely different team the following day, to

beat St. Monica's RC High School 3-2 in a nail biting National Cup first round tie. The 1st XV rugby team have already taken one step closer to retaining the Cheshire Cup by beating Calday Grange Grammar School. The girls football team's had two convincing wins in the national cup with the U13's beating Manchester Creative and Media Academy 14-0 and the U15's winning 11-0 against All Hallows, Salford.

At the start of September we had a number of students take part in a sport leadership training session. Many of these students have been utilising their new skill set by assisting in the organisation and running of the sports competitions we host for our local Primary school's afterschool on Mondays.

The Lymm High School team were outstanding in the first round of the Cheshire Cup, beating Wilmslow 10-1.

Meanwhile, the U15 girls team beat All Hallows Academy from Salford 12-0 and will now play Archbishop Temple School from Preston in Round 2. Our U18 team have also progressed on to Round 2 in the National Cup.
