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### LES MISERABLES

#### Lymm High School stages spectacular performance of Les Misérables

esmerising and simply brilliant – Lymm High school students enthralled the audience of parents, friends and teachers with a stunning performance of Victor Hugo's epic tale.

Many tried, and failed, to hold back tears as the curtain fell on the school edition of the hit musical. The final sold-out performance ended in a standing ovation for the impressive sixty-four strong cast of students aged twelve to eighteen.

Set in early 19th-century France, Les Misérables is the longest-running musical in the West End. Along with the twists and turns of the French Revolution it tells a gripping story of broken dreams and unrequited love, passion, sacrifice and redemption.

Performances from the cast were faultless; the key emotions of the story made all the more powerful by the sheer youth of the cast.

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Zac Green played the long suffering protagonist Jean Val Jean with intensity. Tom McFarland, in the role of young student Marius, was passionate, yet poised and

convincing in his performance, playing superbly alongside his stage love, perfectly-pitched voice of Eve Shaw, in the role of Cosette.

Providing the emotional torment of unrequited love, Eponine, played by Ella Worsley and Suzie Underwood, both delivered heart rendering performances of 'On my own'. As did Fantine, played by Aphra Proudfoot and Tabitha Ashcroft whose emotional renditions of 'I dreamed a dream' brought the audience to tears. Sam Anderson's gripping performance of the ruthless policeman Javert created a

powerful and sinister air to the tragic tale. And rousing the troops with passion was student Reece Connell as Gavroche.

characters. The couple expertly embraced the roles with a bit of cheek, allowing the audience a moment of humour before returning to the bleaker yet poignant moments within the story.

The chorus was superb and sang with confidence and ease; from the rousing 'Do you hear the people sing?', and 'One day more', to the mood-changing and melancholic 'Drink with me'.

The orchestra was well led by Head of Music, Mr Dominic Starkey, whose interpretations of the familiar, haunting, often spine-tingling and stirring pieces merely enhanced the sheer drama of the show.

Mrs Richards said that the show was a hit with the audience, who spoke about how much they enjoyed it.

"It's been a hard slog and six months of intensive rehearsals but I couldn't be prouder of the cast, crew and musicians. The performances by our talented students have been outstanding and we have had lots of wonderful feedback from audience members who were extremely impressed."

Gwyn Williams, Headteacher, added: "I have been amazed by the talent in our school at taking on such a complex production. The staff and pupils, have produced a brilliant show that would be fit for the West End!"

This has been a great team effort, with over 100 pupils and staff involved, and will be a production to remember."

Following this success Lymm awaits announcements for the next show to, once again, showcase all the talent the school has to offer.

## SANTA DASH



Hundreds of students donned red and white at Lymm High School last Monday to raise money for the school's Pitch In! Fundraising campaign.

he LHS Santa Dash fundraising event was held in the school grounds on Monday,
December 4. The whole school, including Sixth Form students and staff joined in the fun as runners ran, jogged or walked the 1 mile course around the school grounds.

Students were sponsored to wear Santa Hats and costumes for the dash.

Although there is not yet a confirmed fundraising total

due to sponsorship money still being collected, we are aiming to raise at least £5,000 through the event.

Assistant Headteacher and Santa Dash organiser Helen Ryles-Dean said: "Thank you so much to all the wonderful Santa's who took part on Monday.

"It was another fantastic fundraising event to raise funds towards our 3G Pitch bid and we were delighted to see the levels of support there are for the campaign from students, parents and people of Lymm.

"We're hoping to raise at least £5,000 from the event and it's only possible because of the enthusiasm of the students who took part.

"The event could not take place without all the sponsors, volunteers and staff that make it happen.'

Lymm High School would especially like to thank Lymm Rotary Club whose Santa kindly arrived on his sleigh to add some extra festive magic to the event.

The student santa's were treated to a Winter Wonderland themed Christmas market after crossing the finish line and completing the 1 mile course. As well as a number of Christmas themed stalls, the market included a chocolate fountain, glitter face painting, a Santa 'selfie' booth and hot Vimto to enjoy.

The Pitch In! fundraising project was launched at Lymm High School last month to build a brand new 3G pitch

and floodlighting at Lymm High School, to be used by students and the wider community.

The school are hoping to make an application to the Premier League/Football Association fund next year and have embarked on an extensive fundraising campaign. We are relying on fundraising events such as the Santa Dash and donations to raise the balance of the funding – approximately £100,000

### A SPANISH EXCHANGE



Sixteen students and two teachers embarked on an exchange programme with our partner school in Malaga, Instituto El Palo.

e arrived in Malaga in the afternoon after an early flight from Manchester Airport, and anxiously awaited the arrival of our exchange partners at their school. The following day we visited la Alhambra - the palace and fortress of the Moorish monarchs of Granada - with all our fellow exchangees and we were thoroughly educated about its historical significance and influence that it had during the time period. After spending the day in the city

centre of Malaga on Friday, our exchanges took us to see the famous switching on of the Christmas lights; people travel from all over Spain to watch this spectacular event, and we were incredibly lucky to be in Malaga at this certain time.

Over the weekend, we were able to bond further with our newly found friends, as we spent both days together enjoying the Spanish culture and showing them a part of our culture through playing games on the beach.

Our day on Monday involved shadowing our partners around school and participating in their lessons. It was incredibly interesting to see the similarities and differences between the way that we learn and the way that they learn. On our final full day, we visited the picturesque town of Frigiliana which consists of white buildings and narrow roads arranged in a methodical pattern before visiting the caves in Nerja; a five kilometre stretch of caves that were discovered by pure coincidence.

In the evening, we returned to school and celebrated the past week by delivering individual presentations which proved to be very emotional for many.


After waking up ridiculously early on Wednesday morning, we went to their school for the final time and said our last goodbyes before returning home.

#### **NEW YORK AND WASHINGTON TRIP**



ears 12 and 13 went on an amazing history trip to New York and Washington over October half term, which supported their studies of 'In Search of the American Dream: 1917-1996', which is a breadth study of American history including politics, the economy, culture and standard of living. The trip was busy, busy, busy with plenty of sightseeing in both New York and Washington.

On the first day students went up the Empire State Building, which is arguably the most iconic building in New York and showed students how important building projects were during the 1930s to help people get work during the Great Depression.

While in New York students also got to visit other iconic buildings and structures such as the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island (the centre of immigration to America), St Patrick's Cathedral, the New York Public Library and Rockefeller Centre.

We also took our time to appreciate the tragedy of 9/11 by reflecting at the memorial and pieced together what happened that fateful day in the museum, which humanised what happened with

personal stories of those in the Twin Towers and the Emergency staff who bravely headed inside the buildings to rescue people. After the museum we walked the highline, which is a disused railway line that has been turned into a series of gardens and exhibits artist's work.

Students also attended a Broadway show, 'Miss Saigon', which although had mixed reviews from our group was something that they could at least tick of their 'bucket list'.

After three days in New York, we took a change of pace and visited America's capital Washington D.C. This was picturesque and much quieter than many capitals students had visited before. We had a guided walking tour of Washington visiting The Library of Congress, the Lincoln Memorial and the Arlington Cemetery. Students also had the opportunity of visiting a series of museums within the Smithsonian Institute including the Holocaust Memorial Museum, Air and Space and American History.
