More of Gaudí's creations were on the agenda as they visited the Casa Batlló and also the Casa Mila, Antoni Gaudí's most iconic work of civic architecture due to both its constructional and functional innovations, as well as its ornamental and decorative solutions.



EUROPEAN YOUTH PARLIAMENT UK DEBATING COMPETITION



Congratulations are in order for Lymm High School's future leaders who secured victory in the European Youth Parliament UK Manchester Round of the delegate competition.

The European Youth Parliament is a unique programme whose mission is to inspire and empower young people to become open-minded, tolerant and active citizens. Young people from all over Europe come together at regional and national events to discuss current topics in a parliamentary setting.

Six Year 12 students took part in the regional finals on Tuesday 5th March. Mira Proctor, Imogen Walsh, Jack Henry, Joe Stewart, Cameron

Green and Ewan Murphy pitted their wits against other young people at Manchester to debate six key issues within Europe.

The judges were impressed with 'the team's ability to grasp complex academic issues' and the points they made were 'to a high standard, as they were eloquently expressed and rather succinct'.

The students performed fantastically well and qualified for the national finals in Liverpool later on this year,

where they will compete against schools from across the UK. In the competition they will try and secure a place in the International Forum where they will compete against students from other European countries.

GAINING GOLD

Lymm High School students achieve The Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award.

The first three students from Lymm High School for a number of years have just achieved their Gold Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Award.

After re-introducing the opportunity to complete the Gold DofE award the three Year 13 students are the first students in our 2017-18 cohort to achieve their gold award in only 18 months – an extremely impressive achievement!

Joe Harris, Jack Wadsworth and Sam Thatcher will now be invited to one of the royal palaces to formally receive their Gold award.

The Gold award is particularly rigorous and challenging: participants must complete sections on volunteering, skills and physical challenges, two separate five-day expeditions

and an additional 5-day Residential placement away from home. It is a very demanding but extremely worthwhile achievement and prepares students for the challenges ahead of them.

Facilitated by Get outside the Classroom, the school's expedition provider, the students completed their expedition in Snowdonia on extremely challenging terrain which included spending one night 'wild-camping' without the use of bathroom facilities.

Miss Dixon, Assistant Headteacher and the current leader of the scheme at Lymm, oversaw the award for the students.

She said: "The DofE Award has grown and grown here at Lymm over the last few years

as part of our aim to promote a culture of social responsibility, physical well-being, positive mental health and leadership.

"For these students to be the first to complete their Gold award with us since it has been re-introduced is fantastic, and it is testament to their hard work, perseverance and endeavour. We hope this will encourage more of our students to progress to the Gold award, which can be achieved irrespective of having participated at Bronze or Silver levels.

"Joe, Jack and Sam have shown just what you can do with the right attitude and support. A huge well done and we wish them a wonderful day at the palace when they receive their award"

MIXED MEDIA WORKSHOP

Lymm High School students have taken part in a creative media workshop with visual Artist Katie Musgrove.



The Visual Arts Department was delighted to be able to offer students the after-school mixed media workshop which took place on Tuesday 26th February.

Nineteen students ranging from Year 7 to Year 10 took part in the workshop led by visiting artist Katie Musgrove.

Katie is a visual artist based in the North-West who specializes in paper craft. Art students worked with Katie

investigating a variety of techniques such as stencilling, mark making, collage and image transfer to create a piece of their own artwork.

Students had the opportunity to discuss with the artist their career, studies and techniques whilst having fun with a range of new and alternative tools and materials. It also allowed students that are studying GCSE Art to learn new techniques which they can transfer and develop within

their own practice.

The Visual Arts department run a visiting artist programme to provide students with the opportunity to work with a range of artists developing their knowledge of different techniques, materials and processes. The workshops are designed to support the students' coursework portfolios and they also enable students to meet practicing professionals who are working within the creative industry.

A TRIP TO GENEVA



In February the Maths department led a group of thirty A' Level Maths and Further Maths students on a three day trip to Geneva in Switzerland to discover more about the applications of Maths in the real world.

The focus of the trip was a full day visit to CERN - The European Centre for Nuclear Research - and home of the Large Hadron Collider.

CERN began in 1954 as a European collaboration between 11 member countries to promote the advancement of nuclear understanding.

At this time it was known that the atom was composed of electrons and a nucleus containing neutrons and protons but there were still many unanswered questions about it.

CERN was established to help answer these and even bigger questions about the world around us. During our visit on 15th February the students discovered how CERN is still helping to answer some of the most fundamental questions; how did the Universe begin? What are the basic building blocks of matter?

Our visit to CERN was led by an English Physicist who had spent the last 30 years of his working

career involved with the accelerator projects at CERN.

The students gained a lot from sharing his personal experiences and finding out more about what contributions he made to the various projects he had been involved in.

Our guide was hugely passionate about his experiences at CERN and the value that the research has to the international scientific community. His passion and enthusiasm for Physics impressed our students immensely.

The Large Hadron Collider is the latest in a number of particle accelerators designed to help us understand more about the world we live in and is most renowned for the discovery of the Higgs Boson particle which was discovered at CERN in 2012.

Two of the scientists who led the project won the Nobel Prize for Physics the following year.

The LHC is the largest particle accelerator in the world and has a circumference of 27km. It is located up to 170 m below the earth's surface and spans an area around Geneva extending into both the Swiss and French countryside.

Its design, development and construction took over 20 years from an initial concept through to operation. Everything about the project was ground breaking.

It would require the largest electro magnets ever designed and would need a huge capacity for generating electricity in order to achieve the high energy levels required to produce the much needed proton collisions. This in turn would lead to extreme temperature differences in a very small volume and another challenge for the design engineers to overcome.


During the visit the students gained an appreciation of the technical and engineering challenges that were faced and overcome during the design and construction phases.

We learnt about how in order to discover more about our universe the next challenge facing the scientists and engineers at CERN is to develop a new accelerator capable of accelerating protons to even higher energy levels. This new accelerator would require a circumference of 100km and even greater design and construction challenges to be overcome.

The aim is to discover what anti matter really is composed of so we can get a better understanding of what is happening in space - Truly out of this world thinking!

The LHC itself is only part of the operation at CERN. At various points around the circumference, detectors are placed each with their own distinct experimental purpose.

We visited one of these detectors - ATLAS. On the outside of the building a schematic of the detector has been painted which gives you a perception of the true scale of the technology housed within. The ATLAS detector is a general purpose detector designed to search for extra dimensions, dark matter, and the Higgs-Boson particle.





The scale of the science and technology at CERN is awe-inspiring and the resourcefulness and problem solving skills of those involved in the projects really challenges your thinking.

Our visit left us feeling inspired and marvelling at the amazing things we don't still fully understand about the world. CERN was the undisputed highlight of our trip to Geneva and described by one of our students as a "true wonder of the world". It truly was an amazing place to visit.

During our trip to Geneva, we also visited the History of Science museum which chronicled the development of scientific instrumentation through the centuries. We saw at first-hand how sophisticated some early instrumentation could be but also how advances in technology have reduced the size and scale of many instruments.

Our visit also coincided with a special exhibition on simple machines. Understanding of which is crucial to both the Maths and Physics A' Level courses.

No trip to Switzerland would be complete without some chocolate tasting and we indulged with a trip to the Stettler Chocolate boutique.

The Stettler chocolate factory has been producing luxury chocolates since 1947 and is famous in Geneva as the home of the Pave de Geneve. We discovered the history of chocolate making and its association with Switzerland and how it was advances in technology that allowed chocolate to develop into the sweet treat that we still love today. We also took time to enjoy the beauty of Geneva with its position nestled on the banks of Lake Geneva.



We took in many of the sites of the city – The Palais de Nations, The broken Chair, The Jet d'Eau and Geneva Old town to name a few.

We took in the panoramic view of the lake and the City surrounded by the snow-capped peaks of the Alps from the bell tower of St Peters Cathedral and enjoyed the majesty of the Renaissance wall.

Science and Maths aside, Geneva had a lot to offer and we had a very memorable trip. Mrs Ramsbottom, Mr Mullin and I feel incredibly lucky to have spent an educational and enjoyable three days with a great group of 6th formers!

NORMAN BANNER RETIRES AS CLERK FOR LGST

Norman Banner, a recently retired consultant solicitor with FDR Law in Warrington and Lymm resident, stepped down as clerk to the Lymm Grammar School Trust in March, after over three decades in this voluntary position.

The Trust is the school's founding charity, and among other things it owns Ty'n y Felin and parts of the school site, and nominates some school governors.

Kieran Walshe, chair of the governing body, said: "Norman has an incredible record of service to the community in Lymm and Warrington, over many years.

"As well as his work for the

Lymm Grammar School Trust, he has chaired boards at St Rocco's Hospice and Warrington Hospital, and been involved in many other voluntary groups.

"We'll really miss his wisdom, knowledge of the school and its history, and sense of humour".

Born in Grappenhall, Norman attended what was then Lymm Grammar School as a student and he has lived in Lymm for many years.

In 2018, Norman was awarded an MBE and made an honorary freeman of the borough of Warrington, both for his service to the community.
