## ST MARY'S CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

## **BATH BOMB BONANZA**

December saw STEM Club get their hands (and E306) messy as we got stuck into making bath bombs.

This activity aims to help students explore the chemistry behind bath bombs. When dissolved in water, the reaction between the acid product citric acid and the alkaline product sodium bicarbonate releases carbon dioxide gas and produces a salt called sodium citrate.

"Our bath bombs may not be making it onto the shelves in 'Lush' just yet, but we all had a great time getting into the festive spirit", said Miss Farmer.





# KNITTING AND STITCHING


On Friday 18th November, Year 11, 12 and 13 Textiles & Fashion students visited the 'Knitting and stitching' show in Harrogate.

The show brings together hundreds of textile workshops, demonstrations, textile art exhibitions and stalls from over 200 of the leading specialist craft suppliers. This year's show was bursting at the seams with creativity and innovation! Students spent their time at the show gathering primary research, interviewing the exhibiting artists and designers, along with shopping for materials and equipment to support



their current Textiles & Fashion projects.

The Education Safeguarding Team have shared some helpful safety advice for parents around students walking to and from school.


## NSPCC guidelines

The following rules can help keep your child safe.

- Make sure they know their address and your telephone number by heart, in case they get lost or have to navigate home from somewhere new.
- If they have a mobile phone, remind them to fully charge it before leaving the house, and make sure they have all your contact numbers saved.
- Talk to them about road safety. They should always look both ways before crossing the street, and never be on their phone whilst crossing a road.
- Remind them never to accept a lift from someone they don't know, or let a stranger into the house. They should never give personal information away – in real life or online.
- Remind them that if they feel unsafe or uncomfortable at any time, they can call you or a trusted adult.
- If they ever feel like they're in immediate danger, they should call the police straight away on 999.

The NSPCC also advises that students plan the route they will use to and from school and not to deviate from this. Choose a route along public well-lit highways (that avoids empty streets and walkways) and where possible try to walk with a friend. Try to walk on the left side of the path furthest away from the roadside.

## GoodSam app



This software was launched in June this year to assist Cheshire Constabulary Control Centres handle emergency calls, in particular to assist callers who suspect they are being followed. The GoodSam app instant video capability allows the operators to send a link via a text message to 999/101 callers. Once the caller has allowed access to their phone they are able to live stream images to the call operator. The location of the caller is immediately conveyed along with their direction of travel and speed. For further information, <u>click here</u>.

## REMEMBERING FALLEN SOLDIERS

Last year, students at St Wilfrid's Primary School in Grappenhall ran a project to research the life and times of a fallen WW1 soldier that attended their school.

he team of students, led by Mr Chris Bent, a local historian, decided to enter a schools' competition, which was organised by the Western Front Association. "To everyone's delight, we were announced as joint winners", writes Mr Bent. They were awarded a prize of £500 last month and are going to spend it on a permanent memorial at the primary school for the fallen soldier, Thomas Fairhurst. His story will now be embedded into the school curriculum. In addition to the prize money, six students and Mr Bent were invited to the parade at the Cenotaph in London on Friday 11th November.

On Remembrance Day, the group met the Marshal for the event at 10am by the Cenotaph. They were then informed of what they needed to do during the parade, including the laying of a wreath, and performed a very brief rehearsal.

Mr Bent was fulsome in his praise of the students"Yesterday was a truly remarkable experience, one that none of us will ever forget. I was so incredibly proud of the children who demonstrated how much remembering our fallen matters to them. They were so respectful throughout the day, a real credit to our school."

Later in the day they were delighted to see themselves on the BBC 6 o'clock news. "Daisy and George were our wreath layers and their faces shown on the News show such solemnity and understanding. Quite remarkable."

They then enjoyed a special invitation from Major Robbie Wilmont of the Irish Guards to Wellington Barracks, which is not open to the general public. This is the home to all the Guards Regiments and the base for when they perform their public duties. A highlight







here was stroking the horse that led the procession at the Queen's funeral.

The final element of the day was a brilliant tour of Parliament, which was thanks to an invite received from Andy Carter's Parliamentary Assistant James Parker.

"It was a truly stunning day. I have no doubt all this will have enriched the children's studies", said Mr Bent. "What an experience, one they and their families who came to down to London will remember forever."

• Engaging in self-care. Taking time to do things that make you happy and listen to how you are feeling. It can be hard at this time of year but make sure you make yourself a priority.

• Set clear boundaries. Be honest with people about how you feel and what you feel comfortable doing. It is okay to say no if you don't feel up to something. Do what feels best for you!

• Have structure to your

days. It is great to have chilled days but also ensure you are getting some fresh air, are active and continuing to get up and follow your usual routine.

Spend time with people
 you love and who make
 you happy. Be gentle
 with yourself. Try not to
 put too much pressure
 on yourself and take it
 one day at a time!

These activities are all positive ways to support your mental health. However, it is also important to recognise when you may need some help and support.


Where's Wally? In fact, some of the students saw double as Sixth Formers dressed up as
