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# SCHOOL LEAGUE TABLES LHS COMES TOP

THE town's top secondary schools have been revealed after the Department of Education published league tables based on pupils' progress.

he official government league tables for 2016 were published this week and confirm what a strong set of results we achieved in the summer. In fact, on the key

new headline measures being used by government to judge schools, we are the top performing school or college in Warrington for both GCSE and A'level.

This is especially pleasing given that the new measures focus on the progress students make rather than simply raw exam scores.

ur intake is well above average in terms of academic performance at primary level and so we should always do well in measures of raw attainment (such as the numbers of students getting 5 A\*-C grades including English and Maths). However, the

progress
measures
published today
show that our
students have
made excellent
progress even
taking into
account their
high starting
points.

Our progress score of 0.20 at A'level is especially strong and demonstrates that A' level students made tremendous progress compared to similar students in other providers nationally. The official data puts us in the top 16% of all A' level providers in the country – and a long way above any other nearby school or college.

Similarly, at GCSE, our positive "Progress 8" score of 0.08 is the highest in Warrington and shows that our students have made more progress than would be expected nationally, taking into account their starting points.

# STUDENTS RECEIVE THEIR GCSE MOCK RESULTS

n Monday, we held a Mock GCSE Results Day for Year 11, where students received an envelope containing their results from their December Mock exams.

Congratulations to all students who achieved their target grade in any of their subjects - a great position to be in at this stage and we have even raised some targets as a result. The overall picture looks positive although, as ever, there is a lot to play for over the next few months.

All students should be attending any revision sessions that are on offer to them. Some of these are targeted at certain students; others are 'open invite' or 'drop-in' - these will go onto the school website in the 'Parent Communication' section in a couple of weeks' time.

Students should also have created their own revision timetable by now (a template will be on the parent



communication pages) and scheduled what revision they are going to do on each day, along with any other commitments they may have.

Whilst it's important that students continue with sport and social activities to maintain a balance, for many students these should be tailing off now as we begin the run in to exams.

As a general recommendation, students should be completing around two hours of homework/ revision per night, with slightly more at the weekend.

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## LYMM SPORTS STARS

This week we look at Lymm Sixth Form student Molly Clark who plays handball for England under 19's

I first played handball in a primary school competition run by Lymm High School which, after winning, motivated me to take up the sport when I became a student here.

Our Lymm team became national champions three years later, where I caught the eye of county coaches. I climbed the ladder of county to regional to national participation in 2014, allowing me to participate in the Partille Cup in Sweden, the Viking Cup in Scotland and the Generation Cup in Denmark for England U16s over the next few years. I've always loved the fast pace and the exiting and physically demanding nature of handball, and from my experiences abroad I've made teammates and friends for life.

My most recent international tournament was held in Liverpool, where I represented England U19s against Australia and Scotland U21 teams. Winning this Tri-nation Cup was a huge accomplishment for England Handball, especially as all funding to our NGB has been cut from Sport England. I scored 8 goals and earned 3 more international caps over that weekend, and loved playing in front of a home crowd so my family, club coaches and teachers could come watch me compete at the highest level.

From being the reason I originally started playing handball, the school has been incredibly supportive with any of my achievements or disappointments in sport.

The PE staff make sure that any successes are recognised and congratulated across school and, being sportspeople themselves, understand and help with time management, especially since I am in my final year of A levels. Playing netball at county level, I have found a balancefor my two sports' training, gym sessions and matches, along with my



education and some social and family time too. My routine is intense but the benefits are definitely worth it.

This year my priorities are mainly my A' level grades to help me get to the University of Durham or Birmingham to study Biomedical Sciences. However, assuming I remain injury free, I intend to take a gap year before starting my first year of my degree.



I am currently a member of GB women's handball squad but, due to limited funding and resources, there isn't a major future for the sport in Britain. Therefore, in my gap year I am going to train and play at a sports academy in Denmark: Idrætshøjskolen Århus. Potentially this could lead to a professional contract. However my main aim, having just been selected for

England U19s, is to improve my skills and learn as much as possible about the sport, which I can transfer and teach to my national teammates back home, helping Britain grow as a handball nation.

Sport as a whole has enriched my life with countless experiences, skills and friends that otherwise I would have never have received. I highly

recommend participation in any sport to everyone at Lymm, as they too could become as lucky as me.
