Dear parents and carers,

It's been a long term, but we've made it! I hope you are a little more prepared for Christmas than we are in my own home, but are also looking forward to spending some quality time with loved ones. As always, we've been holding our Christmas assemblies in St Peter's Church this week – one of my very favourite traditions of the school – and they have certainly helped to build up the Christmas spirit.

I am always grateful to parents and carers for the support you show the school, but I particularly want to thank everyone for the financial contributions over the past couple of years that have allowed us to engage in two very significant projects recently. Firstly, we have finally been able to refurbish the PE changing rooms. This is something that we really would like to have done years ago and, as you'll see from the photographs in this newsletter, students will now be changing in surroundings that are

infinitely more pleasant and spacious than before.

At the same time, we've been able to replace the old gym floor, which was getting dangerous. Some of the money for this joint project came from a grant we were able to secure from a one-off pot of money the government created out of the 'sugar tax', but we still would simply not have been able to carry out the work were it not for the money raised in the year or so before we started the Pitch In campaign - most of which came from parents. I want to thank the PTA in particular for all the fund-raising activities that they led to make this happen; you have been fantastic.

Secondly, thank you so much to everyone who has supported Pitch In so far. As you'll see elsewhere in the newsletter, we raised another £18,000 from the Santa Dash this time, which is a phenomenal amount. Whilst we haven't yet hit the £100,000 target, this latest push has convinced me that we will get there before the end of the year so I now feel able to submit our bid to the Football Foundation.

We are putting the final touches to the bid at the moment and, if it hasn't already been submitted by the time you read this, it will be very shortly. Most of the surveys have been done, the planning permission submitted and a detailed business case created so we shall now be keeping our fingers crossed that the bid is accepted, whilst continuing to try to raise the rest of the money.

LIGHTS OUT WEEK

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LYMM HIGH SCHOOL

ecently there has been a lot of talk in the local and national press about the increasing threats on our environment.

Threats like plastic use, fast fashion and diesel consumption are increasing the rate of global warming and climate change and creating even bigger consequences to our way of life. In April, more than 40 companies including Coca-Cola and Asda, signed up to the UK Plastics Pact in a bid to cut plastic pollution over the next seven years.

These companies alone are responsible for more than 80% of plastic packaging on products sold throughout the UK. Indeed, 99.75% of all plastic coffee cups do not get recycled. As a nation of coffee drinkers, in 2011, 2.5 billion coffee cups were thrown away throughout the year.

At Lymm High School, we think that protecting our environment and being socially responsible citizens is an important part of our school and local community. That is why a small group of eco-ambassadors have set about making it their mission to achieve the Bronze Eco-Schools Award the end of this school year.

Eco-Schools is a globally recognised programme ran by Keep Britain Tidy that empowers pupils to improve their environmental awareness, develops leadership skills and has the possibility to generate financial savings for our school.

Since the start of the year both myself (Harry) and Georgina Powell have formed a committee with the goal of achieving the Bronze ecoaward for the school, and in subsequent years the Green Flag Award.

So far, the committee has conducted an environmental review, during which we identified that we need to improve the how healthy the school is, the schools energy expenditure, and its waste/ litter quantities.

This week, we have been conducting our 'Lights Out' week, with the goal of reducing the school's energy consumption by turning lights off when possible, ensuring computes and their monitors are switched off and keeping windows shut to reduce our heating usage.

We firmly believe that these minor actions will not only benefit the environment but the school due to the reduced costs associated with running the school like this, thereby increasing departmental budgets so teachers can supply their students with everything they need.

We will be running this scheme periodically throughout the year so that eventually every week is a 'lights out' week without needing to be told.

In the New year we're looking to get involved with Walkers crisp packet collection, a nationwide recycling scheme, in hope to help clean up the school and reduce our waste.

Please ensure your child has now done this in all three sections. If students do not do this and have chosen an activity that is not an approved one, the danger is that we cannot sign it off at the end, delaying their completion of the award.
