This day is arguably one of the most important days in the school calendar, a day when students, staff and members of the school community


remember the Founders of the school, and value their legacy.

LHS MASTERCHEF 2019

ymm High School students went head to head in a hard-fought final of this year's MasterChef-style competition, which tested their collaborative and culinary skills against the clock.

In joint third place were students Fiona Millar and Sophie Blears, for their Zingy Sweet and Citric Shortbread dessert, as were Jessica Warwick and Jasmine Clews for their 'Guilt-free Fruit Burst Tarts.

The runner up in the competition was a simplistic but sumptuous Oreo Mug Cake Dessert, created by student duo Emily Sherwin and Eve Whittingham.

However, the food this year was of such a high standard that the winning title was claimed and shared between two entries. Matilda Bode-Hey and Kate Redmond were crowned MasterChef winners for their Traditional Sticky Toffee pudding and Amelia Grant and Lily Johnston also claimed the champion title for their Filo Pastry Salmon with New Potatoes and Salad entry.

NATIONAL ENTERPRISE CHALLENGE 2019

DofE 2019

A huge well done to all Lymm High School's intrepid, Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Award students, who have successfully completed their final qualifying expeditions this year.


B ronze DofE students completed their expeditions over the course of two days in Malpas, Tattenhall and Kelsall, whilst the school's Silver DofE students undertook a three-day expedition in Llangollen, near Carrog and the Llandegla Forest.

Students aiming to achieve their DofE Gold Award took on the more mountainous area of Trefiw over a challenging four days.

Assistant Headteacher and DofE organiser, Miss Dixon, commented on the students' endeavour and determination to achiever their awards.

"Some of the expeditions were extremely hot, or wet, so it's a huge credit to participants for being so well prepared with the equipment they needed and for demonstrating such resilience whilst out there."

"We are extremely proud that so many of our students signed up this year; over 220, including 160 students in Year 9 on Bronze!"



















Dofe NEXT STEPS

If your child is interested in participating in 2019/20, letters will be available in September from Student Services in the following year groups: Bronze for Year 9, Silver for Year 10 and Gold for Year 12.

S tudents do not have to have achieved a DofE award previously to sign-up for Silver and Gold level. However, if they've already started their Bronze or Silver award they must have completed it, be able to demonstrate that it has been signed off from 'eDOfE' and provide all their evidence, including the certificate and badge, before they can pay/sign up for 2019/20.

If you are interested in finding out more at this stage, please check out our DofE website where you can view last year's prices, letters and information. This includes a useful 'Frequently Asked Questions' document: http:// www.lymmhigh.org.uk/enrichment/duke-of-edinburgh/

For our DofE students, the next steps are to:

- Complete the Skill, Volunteering and Physical sections.
- Request that your 'Assessor' completes the Assessor Report which can be found in your DofE booklet (make sure the dates the Assessor writes in match the ones you put on eDofE or it cannot be signed off).
- Scan the completed Assessor Report onto the computer and upload to eDofE. Click 'Add Evidence' and choose 'Other' to search for your scanned document. Mrs Hill, located in the school shop, can help scan reports in where help sheets are also available.
- Press Submit and James Hellmers (Get Outside the Classroom) will sign the section off (he checks any 'alerts' on submitted reports approximately every fortnight).
- School then sign off the overall award, before being able to issue you with your DofE certificate and badge.
- If you experience any difficulties with any of these steps, or have lost your login details, please visit Mrs Hill in the School Shop.

NCS SILVER CHAMPION AWARD

LHS to receive National Citizen Service (NCS) Silver Champion School status for the contribution and involvement of their students.

CS is a part-residential youth programme taking place out of term time, which develops the skills and confidence of young people. Their 'Champion School' statuses of Gold, Silver and Bronze are awarded according to the percentage of students from each school who participate in the NCS Programme during the school summer holidays.

Lymm High School has been selected to receive a NCS Silver Award as 24% of the current Year 11 cohort have signed up to attend the three week programme this summer.

Mr Tony Scott, Head of Year 11, said, "We are extremely proud that this year we gained the 'Silver Award' to recognise our commitment and engagement in the NCS programme. This is an amazing achievement of which our students can feel very proud."

"In addition to making a significant impact through volunteering, the experience will be a great opportunity for them to develop their leadership, communication, teamwork skills and awareness of their local community."

"We hope that as many students as possible in next year's Year 11 cohort will sign up and continue the good work."

The NCS will be launched again with our new cohort of Year 11 students next year. We hope that we can continue with high numbers and aspire to beat this year's 24% and go on to receive the Gold Award.

A TRIP TO THE BATTLEFIELDS

n the weekend before the anniversary of the Battle of the Somme (1st July to the 18th November 1916), in which 19.240 soldiers lost their lives on the first day alone,

Year 8 went on a tour of the First World War battlefields of France and Belgium. Students learnt about the heroic actions of some of Britain's Pals battalions – whole streets of men and young boys who went to war to fight and die alongside one another.

This included learning about the 11th East Lancashire battalion, known as the Accrington Pals, which suffered heavy losses. Of the 720 men who went into action on the first day, 584 became casualties.

Students also visited a preserved First World War trench, exploring some of the tunnels dug by soldiers and used to hide from enemy fire over 100 years ago.

Lochnagar Crater was also a highlight of the trip as well as student Lucy Quayle being able to find the grave of one of her relatives.

Students behaved impeccably, asked many thought-provoking and carefully considered questions and showed the utmost respect to the brave men who lost their lives, on both sides, during the First World War.



LHS STUDENT WORK EXHIBITED AT ROYAL ACADEMY



Lymm High School student Georgia Platt has been selected to exhibit her artwork at the Royal Academy of Art's Young Artists' Summer Show.

eorgia, who has just finished Year 11, has been selected as one of only 139 young artists to have artwork exhibited both online and at the London gallery.

Her work 'Fragments of memories' was chosen from over 6200 artworks submitted for consideration for the show.

The Young Artists' Summer Show will be online from 10th June to 31st December 2019, and a selection of these artworks will be on display at the Royal Academy from 13th July to 4th August 2019. This is the first ever Young Artists' Summer Exhibition and saw the nation's students, aged 7-19, encouraged to submit their artwork and take part.

Teacher of Art, Mrs Taylor, spoke on her student's success:

"As you can imagine this is a huge achievement for Georgia and we are so pleased for her! As a department we are incredibly proud to be selected from over 6,200 artworks is a real accomplishment!"

Students Grace Bradley and

Jaimie Fletcher were also shortlisted for their pieces, which again is a great feat from so many entries.

ARTIST WORKSHOP WITH RYAN GAUGE

The Lymm High School visual arts department hosted a two-part workshop earlier this month with practicing ceramic artist Ryan Gauge.



R yan delivered two fantastic ceramic workshops, with part one focussing on the construction of a flower pot/vase from clay and part two allowing students (and staff!) to decorate their fired pieces with ceramic paints.

The students' designs were then taken to be glazed and re-fired by artist Ryan, with students delighted with their finished pieces!

This was a brilliant opportunity for students to work with and learn new techniques from a practicing artist, using a material they may not have used before to create a piece of their own.

The visiting artist programme runs to provide students with the opportunity to work with a range of practitioners to develop their knowledge of different techniques, materials and processes.

BERLIN TRIP 2019

At the beginning of July, twenty-three Lymm High School students started a five day trip to Berlin.

he group, consisting of Year 9, Year 11 and Year 12 students who are all currently studying German, spent the week visiting the city's famous monuments and improving their language skills! Highlights of the trip included a tour of the Olympic Stadium, a visit to Checkpoint Charlie, the Reichstag and the Jewish Memorial; as well as a trip to the top of the iconic TV Tower in the centre of Alexander Platz.

On the final evening of their stay, students sampled traditional German food, including, of course -German sausages! The students really enjoyed Berlin in the beautiful sunshine and were a credit to the school throughout the duration of their visit. NEA GEOGRAPHY TRIP

A VISIT TO THE PEAK DISTRICT

ore than 170 Year 10 students brave the elements for Geography Field Trip in the Goyt Valley.

Last week Year 10 Geographers went on a fieldtrip to the Peak District National Park at the southern end of the Pennines.

Learners investigated how the River Goyt changes along its course, by measuring the width, depth, velocity and bed load in the river.

Despite regular attacks from the local midges and some horrendous weather, the intrepid geographers managed to collect all the data they needed and returned triumphantly back to school.

RPE TRIP TO POLAND 2019

The Religion, Philosophy and Ethics trip to Poland is a once in a life time experience.

Arriving in Krakow, students and staff braced themselves for a day of remembrance, reflection and regret with a trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau.

Visiting Auschwitz, students were respectful, considerate and moved by the camps and museum; the tour providing an insight into the innocent lives of those that spent their last few days there.

During the visit there was also plenty of opportunity to explore the city and Krakow's beautiful main square, lots of ice creams were eaten and students had a wonderful time!

This trip is always very popular with students; really filling the gap between in and outside classroom learning, bringing humanities subjects to life and developing students' social, moral, cultural and spiritual awareness.

WOMEN IN STEM

Lymm High held its first networking event to mark International Women in Engineering Day.

The event, held on Thursday 20th June, aimed to provide female students at the school the chance to meet with female STEM professionals and learn more about the opportunities available to them within STEM industries.

During the event, the girls learnt about their work personality types and discovered some of the types of STEM jobs that might match their personal skills and attributes.

Keynote speaker for the evening was Professor Marielle Chartier – a Particle and Nuclear Physicist at the University of Liverpool who also collaborates on the ALICE experiment at CERN.

CERN, the European Organization for Nuclear Research, is one of the world's largest and most respected centres for scientific research.

Speaking of her work there, Professor Chartier explained to students about what happens at CERN, the types of data they collect and analyse, and what the ALICE experiment involves; giving students an insight into what secrets of the universe, studying and understanding Physics, can unlock.



She is, she admits, hugely passionate about Physics and inspiring all young people to engage more with the study of it – at GCSE, A' level and beyond.

Students were also joined by other guests – Mrs Deborah Samuels, Dr Kirsty Holden and Mrs Emma Hutchison – who all offered different backgrounds in STEM.

In a lively and stimulating discussion, students discovered what these current STEM professionals had studied, how their careers progressed and what their current jobs in the industry entailed.

It was a great chance to find out about the variety of roles open to them, should they wish to pursue further studies in STEM subjects; and led to a conversation about the role of women in STEM and how we can inspire more girls to consider pursing scientific and technical qualifications.

The aspiring STEM students were left with a thought-provoking comment from guest Deborah Samuel, who currently advises CEO's within the industry of architecture.

"Stem is about finding answers in the world and who doesn't want to look at the world around us and understand and fix it?"

Lymm High School would like to thank all the guests who gave up their time to help enrich students' experience and understanding of STEM in the workplace.

HS2 WORKSHOP

STEM professionals working on the HS2 project deliver inspiring STEM workshop at Lymm High School.

Lymm High School was delighted to welcome a number of STEM professionals to school on Wednesday 17th July.

Currently working on the HS2 project, the Government's proposal for a new high speed north-south railway, the guests led a fun and interactive day of STEM workshops for Year 7 students.

Sixty young STEM enthusiasts participated in the day-long workshop, where they learned about STEM careers and took part in a number of team challenges.

Students engaged in practical engineering and design challenges and learnt about the skills required to build and manage aspects of their own high-speed rail network. By means of an introduction, participants were asked to reflect on the types of jobs that existed within STEM industries, considering the key skills and attributes (STEMpowers) they would require to be successful in these roles.

Exploring the attributes of four STEM professionals in particular - a civil engineer, environmental adviser, customer experience designer and a buildings information management analyst – students were encouraged to take on the role of one of these individuals in the first task of the day.

The design-led challenge tasked students with designing a railway station of the future; requiring them to produce a design brief that would consider the needs of all consumers, take into account the environment, provide a sustainable design and encompass changing technologies.

The Year 7s learnt that large infrastructure projects such as this, are many years in planning and take a long time to be fully constructed and realised.


Gaining an understanding of how difficult it is to plan for the future and the unknown, the young learners discovered the importance of creativity in ensuring designs are future-proofed.

After developing fully-annotated design sketches that communicated all aspects of their ideas, the challenge concluded with some very eloquent and confident presentations as each group introduced them to their peers.

The second main challenge of the day involved building a prototype tunnel structure that would be lightweight, strong and withstand the application of an external force. With a limited number of resources in order to complete the brief, students engaged passionately with the task and there was a palpable sense of excitement as each group's tunnel was tested.

Predictions were made as to whether the tunnels would withstand the application of the external forces, with innovative and interesting designs being trialled. Visitors from the HS2 project were very impressed by the passion that the students demonstrated throughout and how impeccably behaved they were.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable day for all involved and an opportunity that we hope to be able to offer more students in future!

All students at Lymm Sixth Form complete at least one week's worth of work experience during their time in Year 12, with many students also deciding to take on volunteering positions throughout their studies.
