
CLIMBING HIGH FOR THE CHRISTIE

n Sunday 12th March, Alice Norton completed the Beetham Tower Run challenge in aid of The Christie Hospital. The challenge involved climbing the 46 floors, 798 steps to the top of the building!

The Year 7 student is the youngest competitor to complete the run, which is usually open to over 16s only. Alice completed it in 7.34 minutes, finishing 26th out of 100 participants. She was also the sixth fastest female – and given that her legs are a lot shorter than the adults – this was a fantastic achievement.

The team she ran with have raised over \pounds 1800 for the hospital so far with donations still coming in.

GLOBAL EMPATHY WEEK

APPRECIATING ART

Last month, a group of 24 students who study Art, 3D Design, Catering, Photography or Fashion set off by train to London St Pancras International to board the Eurostar to Paris.

The purpose of the trip was to gather primary research and to experience a wide range of Art and Design settings in a new city environment.

Miss Simms writes: The trip was a great success. Every single student fully embraced the 4 days we had in Paris, and were unphased by the massive amount of walking we did each day!

Students spent time completing observational sketches in their sketchbooks, gathering primary research and inspiration in the galleries and museums, as well as taking plenty of photographs to document the trip.

Visits included some of Paris's most renowned galleries and museums such as the Louvre, the Musée d'Orsay and the Louis Vuitton Foundation, as well as food tours and tastings around a traditional French food market and the Museum of Chocolate.

We had a jam packed itinerary carefully planned by Miss Simms. Each day was full of visits to exciting museums, galleries and famous landmarks. Amongst the scheduled visits to galleries and museums, staff and students enjoyed the free time to explore, admiring the vernacular architecture whilst sampling the Parisian cafe culture of espressos, crepes and a favourite of the food department, the croque monsieur!

My personal favourite visit on the trip was to the Louis Vuitton Foundation, an iconic building designed by world renowned architect Frank Gehry. The building rooftop offered incredible panoramic views of the city and the Eiffel Tower. The inside was just as spectacular with galleries containing the work of Claude Monet and Joan Mitchell.

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SWIMMING SUCCESS

Several students are excelling at swimming outside of school. A few have recently returned from international swim camps during February's half-term.

ear 7 Jasper de Glopper is in the top 15 fastest swimmers in his age group and is getting quicker!

At the Cheshire County Racing competition last month, Jasper was rated the 14th best boy in England. He also attained eight Personal Bests (PBs), a Cap for under 12 males, three silver medals and four bronze medals. This is a massive achievement! Especially, when considering what long days they are. Typically, a race day will start around 7.30am, with a 15-minute warm up and dive practice. There are then two or three races, which can go on until 5, 7 or even 8.30pm at night.

Jasper attended a swim camp in Fuerteventura, along with fellow Lymm High students Bria and Talia Coxon. All completed their 60km challenge over the week (in 23 hours).

In early March, Jasper had another amazing weekend at the Wirral Europa Swimming Gala. He ended up with 12 PBs, six gold medals, four silvers and two bronze.
