MATHEMATICAL MASTERS

Students in both Key stages have been very successful in the UKMT National maths challenges this year.

Back in February, students from Years 9, 10 and 11 participated in the Intermediate maths challenge and were awarded 11 Golds, 52 Silvers and 72 Bronze Certificates. Alex Smith scored best in Year 9, Alexander Davies scored best in Year 10, and Ben Liput scored best in Year 11.

Bella Beardmore (Year 9), Alex Smith (Year 9), Alexander Davies (Year 10) and Adam Miller (Year 11) then competed in the follow-on Kangaroo Maths Challenges with Alex Smith achieving a Bronze certificate, and Alexander Davies receiving a Gold certificate. Ben Liput (Year 11) took part in the Maclaurin Maths Olympiad and was awarded a merit certificate. In May, students from Year 7 and Year 8 sat the Junior maths challenge. They were awarded 14 Gold, 39 Silver and 50 Bronze Certificates.

Mitchell Matthews and Jack Waring were Best in Year 7, Elliot Yeomans scored best in Year 8 (and Best in school).

Alexander James, Mitchell Matthews, Jack Waring, Chloe Williams, Matty Fawcett, Sam Martin, Sullivan Stewart and Elliot Yeomans all qualified for the Junior Kangaroo; and Alexander James, Matty Fawcett and Elliot Yeomans received a

Bronze Certificate, with Sam Martin scoring Silver and Best in School.

A successful year indeed! Well done to all our brilliant mathematicians!





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In the first week of June, 89 lucky Year 8 students were able to enjoy Lymm High School's long-running Battlefields trip to France and Belgium.

The trip is a precursor to the World War I (WWI) unit, which starts early in Year 9, allowing the students to gain knowledge of this period of history. They visited many historical sites and paid tribute to former Lymm High School students buried in Commonwealth War Graves.

Belgium bound

On Thursday 5th of June, excited students began the first leg of the trip to Hull, leaving school at 3pm. Once in Hull, they boarded the overnight P&O Ferry, *'Pride of Rotterdam'*, to the Dutch seaport. Students particularly enjoyed an all-you-can-eat buffet dinner before returning to their cabins. Some were lucky enough to have an ocean view. In the morning, many awoke a little earlier by usual standards – continental time – to enjoy another all-you-can-eat buffet breakfast.

On disembarking into the beautiful Dutch sunshine, students then travelled by coach to Ypres, Belgium. There, they visited the In Flanders Field Museum where they immersed themselves in an interactive experience. Some individuals were able to make the journey up to the top of the tower on Cloth Hall, where they could enjoy breathtaking views of Ypres.

Cemetery visits

Afterwards, students visited Tyne Cot cemetery to remember British Soldiers. The cemetery offered students a moment of reflection to consider the impact and implications of war on so many young men.

This was then followed by a trip to the German Cemetery Langemark, offering students an appreciation of the losses suffered on both sides of the war. Langemark, an old cemetery to the south of Ypres, was surrounded by oak trees, the national tree of Germany.

After check-in and dinner at the hotel, students made their way to a past favourite of former Battlefields trip attendees: the Belgium chocolate Shop 'Leonidas'. Students took advantage of the generous 'Special offers for Lymm High School students' and loaded up.



The group then made their way to the centre of Ypres, where every night since 2nd July 1928,

the people of Ypres remember the fallen under the Menin Gate, where many soldiers began their journey east to the battlefields of Ypres Salient never to return. There, they experienced the Last Post Ceremony of Remembrance for the fallen soldiers of World War I, whose bodies were never recovered. Lymm High School students also had the opportunity to lay a wreath in remembrance of the fallen at the end of the ceremony.



Then, it was time for an early night, ready for a full day of history tomorrow.

Fields of battle

Early on Saturday, the group left for Sanctuary Wood, a preserved WWI trench. Found at the end of the war when a farmer returned to his land, the trenches were left perfectly preserved with many artefacts, such as shells, still being found at the site every day. Students could experience the realities of trench warfare and



travel along a tunnel connecting the reserve and support trenches to the communication trenches and dugouts.

Students then visited Essex Farm Cemetery, where there are 1200 WWI servicemen



buried or commemorated, of which 103 are not identified. This allowed for the students to further appreciate the sheer scale of war, and the young men affected. Essex Farm is one of the most visited sites in the Salient, due to its association with famous poet John McCrae, author of *In Flanders Fields*.

Vimy Ridge

Students then stopped at Vimy Ridge, the location of a crucial battle in WWI. At the sight of the battle is a Canadian war memorial and visitor centre. This battle was significant to Canada because of how many losses the country suffered there. At the visitor centre, there is a perfectly preserved site of a tunnel dug by troops and used to blow up trenches behind enemy lines from underneath. There were many challenges in this endeavour, including the lack of space and light to operate in the tunnel, and the task of concealing the tunnel's presence from the opposing side.

Students went into the tunnels to experience their conditions whilst learning about



the crucial Vimy Ridge Battle. A short coach ride away on a road surrounded by roped-off areas, known as the 'zone rouge' (areas deemed too dangerous and contaminated with unexploded bombs for human habitation), students arrived at the Vimy Ridge Memorial. This impressive structure is made from white limestone, is surrounded by zone rouge, and serves as a reminder of the Canadian lives lost in the war.

After paying their respects, the group made their way to the Lochnagar Mine Crater. This is the site of the beginning of the Battle of the Somme on 1st July 1916, when the allies detonated a bomb planted under German lines. The explosion could reportedly be heard in London and the 91m-wide crater can still be seen today. Students were able to view the impact the war had on the region and the marks it left, a constant reminder of those lost.

Fitting Farewell

On their final day, the group set off to Thiepval: a memorial to 72,191 British and South African troops with no known graves. The memorial and its visitor centre highlighted the realities of recovering the fallen in places of battle, demonstrating how not everyone gets to have a grave to remember them by.

After a wonderful trip the group set off for Calais. The students were lucky to leave on an earlier ferry, getting them back to Lymm 2 hours ahead of schedule. Trip leader, Mr Wilde, was straight on the coach intercom, ready to give spontaneous history quizzes on subjects that would be tested in the upcoming KS3 exams.

After a long coach journey, the group arrived in Lymm, having completed the long-running Battlefields trip. An event they were sure to remember for many years to come.
