CARE HOME CREATIVES

On Tuesday 11th July, a group of students spent the morning at Cheshire Grange.

Working with the residents, our students got their creative juices flowing creating a piece of art to reflect the Lymm area. They used specially made stencils, created by our Art department, which depicted local landmarks. There were also lots of floral and water-based stencils so they could create their own 'Lymm scene'.

The colourful canvases can be seen on page 1 and will be on display at Wednesday's Founders' Day church service. They will then be displayed in school to remind staff and students of our important links with the community.

Upstairs on the 'Dementia Floor', the students were given a really poignant, insightful overview of dementia and what it's like for those living with it. They were informed about how it occurs, and how it can affect people in different

ways. They were also explained the value of a routine to people with dementia. The students were so respectful and listened intently throughout, asking really thoughtful questions.

Mrs Edge and Miss Carrington accompanied the students and were really quite moved with how well the young people interacted with the residents. The care home staff also commented on how caring the Lymm High students were and said they were a credit to the school.

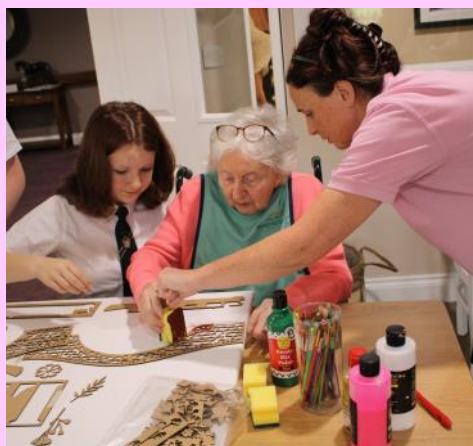

YORKSHIRE SCULPTURE PARK

CAREERS EDUCATION AT LYMM HIGH SCHOOL

During the course of the year students have accessed careers education through tutorial times, Drop Down Days and assemblies.

Whilst there has been a wealth of activities, we are aware that parents may not always find out about exactly what your child has accessed. We therefore hope that the following information gives you a brief overview.

This year we launched our Unifrog platform to all year groups and students have begun to explore this during Form time, completing various activities, quizzes and searching for careers they may be in-

terested in. We have also shared the labour market information for our local area ([see here](#)) to advise students on those industries likely to be in demand in the future.

Students in Year 9 have had a number of additional careers sessions to support them with their option choices, including subject-specific assemblies, CV masterclasses with employers, stereotyping in the workplace activities with employers, and ensuring all students have an

awareness of the different pathways (i.e. apprenticeships, vocational education, A' Levels and T' levels). The 'Take my Child to Work Day' in December was a huge success, [read more about this here](#).

Year 10 students took part in a Post-16 Choices Day on 6th July (see p.11). This involved a mock interview with an employer and talks about studying A' Levels (from Lymm High School), T' Levels (from Priestley College), Vocational

courses (from Warrington Vale and Royal College) and Apprenticeships from an ex-student and our Careers Advisor. Please do ask your child about this as the earlier they begin to consider their options after Year 11, the more support we can put in place for them.

In addition to the activities mentioned above, our Year 11 students have had additional assemblies on Apprenticeships and had access to our Careers Advisor for one-to-one appointments. Details of what was discussed during this appointment can be found on your child's Unifrog account,



please ask them to show you this under their 'Interactions.' Our Sixth Form students have been well supported in making decisions about their futures through visits to both the University of Liverpool and Chester University, a number of talks from apprentices from a variety of industries, taking part in mock interviews; and for those keen to pursue competitive apprenticeships, we took part in a mock assessment centre. Work experience, which took place in June, was a highlight for many of our students: this really has shaped some of their decisions and provided them with an insight into the world of work. Each week we share numerous careers events in *The Sixth* bulletin, [find a sample of this here](#).

Earlier this year we also asked you for your views on our careers provision. Thank you to those of you who kindly took the time to complete this. We have used this feedback to inform our careers provision next year, but we thought it worthwhile to draw your attention to the following:

- **Careers website** – [found here](#). Checking this regularly will allow you to see an overview of our programme, keep up to date with our careers events, labour market information, and to find apprenticeship vacancies. There is also a reminder of how parents/carers can access the Unifrog platform ([see here](#)). The Unifrog platform has a

huge number of resources, including the different options available for young people, how to find an apprenticeship, searching for university and Apprenticeship courses/vacancies, and information about a wide variety of careers. A reminder that if your child has had a careers appointment, the notes of this can only be found on their Unifrog account (see details above). Please do ask them to show this to you and please do not hesitate to get in touch if you need further information. If

you haven't yet accessed this platform, please do have a look.

- **Careers Programme 23–24.** For the next academic year we will share the Careers Programme with you during our Information, Advice and Guidance (IAG) sessions at the start of the year, allowing you a deeper insight into what to expect throughout the course of the year.
- **Parental support.** We were delighted that there were a number of parents who, on the survey, shared they would be happy to support us in

the future, thank you! If you are willing to help, please do get in touch with Mrs Hughes (lhughes@lymmhigh.org.uk) and we will add you to our parent database, which thanks to your support, is growing rapidly!

We hope this gives you an overview of our current provision. If you do have any queries, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

Social Tips

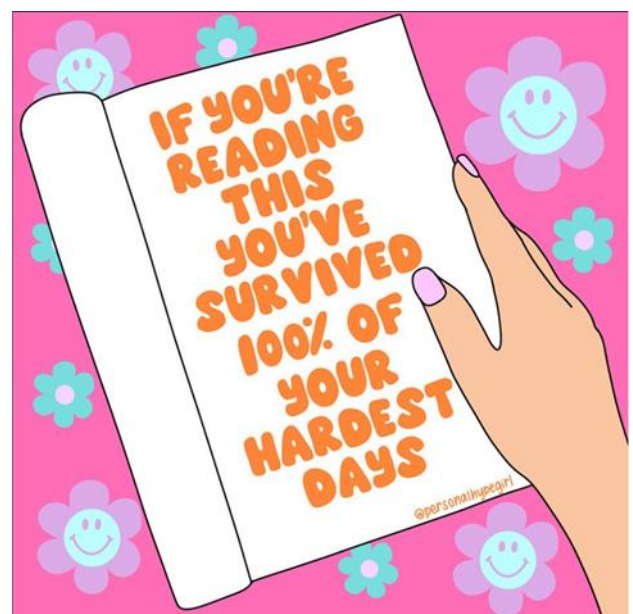
- **Have a picnic with friends.** Enjoy a meal outside. This can be an easy way to get some fresh air and sunshine, and shake up your daily routine.

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DOFE SILVER & GOLD EXPEDITION

Forty Year 10 students and 18 Year 12s have successfully completed their Duke of Edinburgh qualifying expeditions at Silver and Gold level.

The hot weather and humid conditions certainly made it challenging, particularly at the start. The students were walking around Llangollen and Carrog – a beautiful part of Wales – but one that is also hilly and challenging as you'd expect on the Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award expeditions.

“I don't think any student would say they found it easy, but then again there is a reason why the Duke of Edinburgh's Award is so prestigious and highly thought of”, said Ms Dixon. “That said, our students were amazing, a true credit to

themselves and the school”. This was most evident when the students had to show extremely



high levels of resilience, teamwork and determination to get to the end.

Of particular note was an email sent by a parent of a student from Helsby High School who Lymm High shared a campsite with; her daughter had been left quite alone because of a dropout by her friend during the expedition meaning she was now the only girl at her school. Without being asked, our students approached her, invited her to join their group where she did yoga and socialised for the remainder of the expedition – a true testament to the kindness and social responsibility our students routinely show in everything they do. “We are extremely proud of them all and look forward to signing off their Duke of Edinburgh’s Award.”

Next steps

We ask that Silver students get their assessor reports completed, scanned as PDF files onto eDofE (they can do this using the school print-

ers) by the end of the summer term (students should not take photos of assessor reports as they cannot be read). If they can do this sooner, it is likely they will receive their certificate and

badge before the end of term, otherwise they will receive these in September.

For Gold students, we ask that the volunteering, physical and skill sections are signed off in the same way by the end of the summer term if students have finished them. If not, we ask that they do it as soon as possible so that we can celebrate their completion before they leave Year 13. If any Gold student is having difficulty with their residential section, please ask them to see Ms Dixon as soon as possible.

PARAMEDIC PATHWAYS

As part of the careers awareness programme for Health and Social Care we had a Paramedic visit Lymm High to deliver some training. Scott, from Northwest Ambulance Service, came into school on Monday 3rd July and delivered training to 40 Year 10 students and 15 Year 9 students who will be starting the BTEC Level 2 Health and Social course next academic year.

Scott spoke about the different pathways into becoming a Paramedic and advocated the Level 2 and Level 3 courses we run at Lymm High School as supporting access to careers in Health and Social Care. He demonstrated CPR using a high-tech resuscitation manikin and students then took part in replicating these skills used as a Paramedic. The ECG machine was used to look at heart rhythm.

Students commented on how engaging and passionate Scott is about his role in the NHS and how helping people on a daily basis is so rewarding.

When logging onto the site for the first time enter the setup code 'uksecondary', followed by 'Lymm High School' from the drop-down list. Type in your usual school email and password to access your individual account. Details of how to access Sora can also be found in the Independent Learning Centre pages of the [school website](#).

All Sora downloads are free and can be borrowed for 14 days (and renewed if necessary). The formats and fonts of most books can be changed to suit individual reading needs and a dyslexia-friendly font is also available.

Take some time to explore and find a book ... maybe a graphic novel, a modern mystery, or a sporting biography. There is a full range of genres, styles and formats to choose from along with collections in Ukrainian, Chinese and Welsh to try.

The Visual Arts and Technology faculty celebrated their end-of-year exhibition on the evening of Wednesday 28th June.

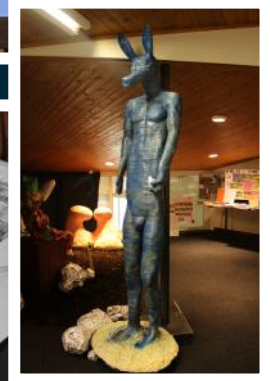
The exhibition extended to both the Lower Hex and Upper Hex, with even more space to exhibit the vast amount of exceptional work produced by students this year.

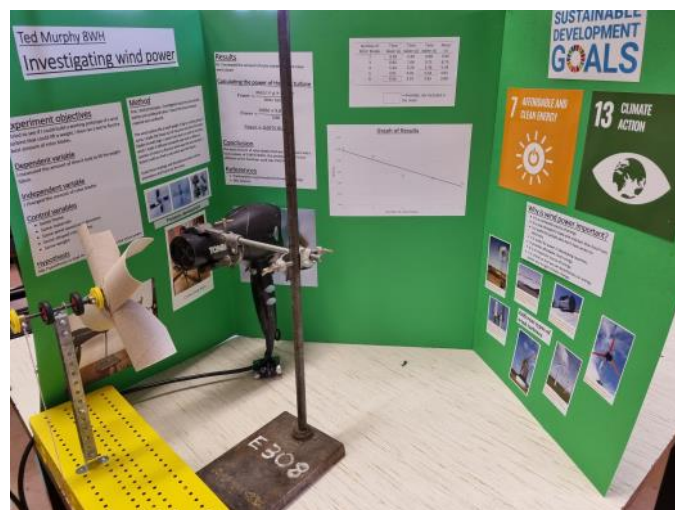


SCIENCE FAIR

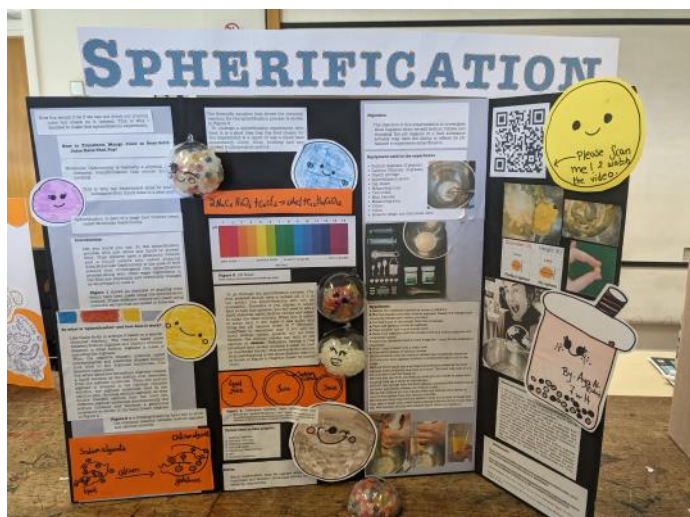

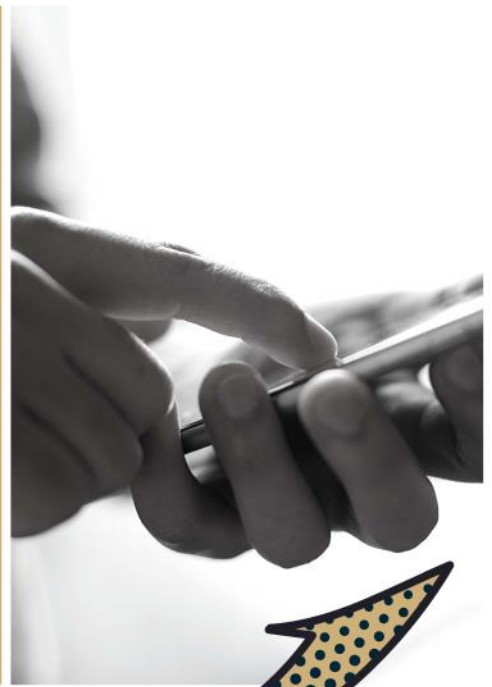



TAKING PRIDE

As part of Pride month, our students undertook LGBTQ+ related activities during Form time and Life Programme sessions.

Pride is celebrated every June to commemorate the 1969 Stonewall riots and aims to achieve equal opportunities for people of all sexual orientations/gender identities. Even if you are not a member of the LGBTQ+ community, pride in one's identity is important for everyone. While the gay rights movement does precede Pride Month, it has also become a well-known annual celebration of LGBTQ+ rights that dedicates itself to: *The uplifting of LGBT voices, celebration of LGBT culture, and the support of LGBT rights.* Traditionally, at this time of year there are parades, protests, drag performances, live theatre acts, memorials and celebrations of life for members of the community who lost their lives to HIV/AIDS.

History of Pride Month

The Stonewall riots occurred in June 1969 when patrons of the Stonewall Inn, fed up with constant police harassment and social discrimination, engaged in physical conflict with the police officers that had been raiding the bar and manhandling patrons. The angered protestors attempted to set fire to the Inn, where the police, prisoners and a *Village Voice* journalist had barricaded themselves in. Everyone from inside the inn was saved and the flames were doused, but protests continued for 5 more days. Though this incident didn't start the gay rights movement, the Stonewall riots were a turning point for LGBTQ+ activism, with the

first Pride parade taking place on the 1-year anniversary of the riots, and the first UK Pride parade on the 1st July 1972.

The importance of Pride Month

Pride Month can be especially important for teenagers and young adults as it is vital that everyone feels comfortable in their identity and feels free to express themselves without judgement. As young people, we may be confused or possibly worried about how our sexual orientation or gender identity may be perceived; therefore it is important to create safe spaces to combat feelings of alienation. Sexual orientation or gender identity shouldn't be a marker of indifference, but rather a celebration of who we are. Students that are not members of the LGBTQ+ community should aim to be as inclusive and supportive as possible and celebrate the achievements and progress that the community has made throughout history.

How to celebrate!

You can celebrate Pride in almost any city in Britain: Manchester Pride takes place from 25–28th August, and Liverpool Pride is on 30th July. Within school, we also have Pride

Club every Monday and Friday. This is run by Miss Tunstall in A210.

We're huge City fans and have a season ticket for the Etihad so it feels very special to be asked to join the wheelchair squad in their treble winning year".

On Tuesday 4th July, the athletics squad competed in the annual Warrington Schools Championships.

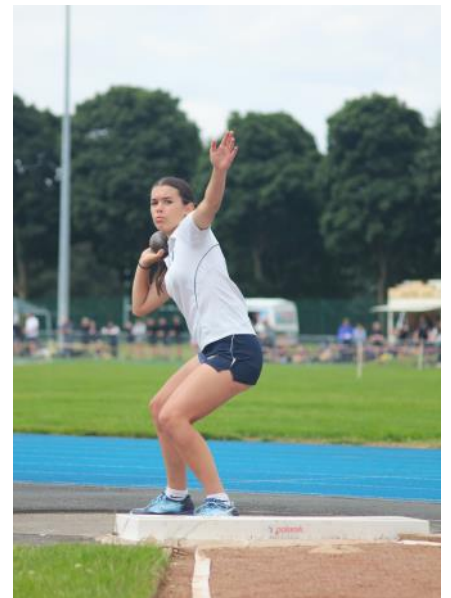
Every student played their part and there were some amazing individual performances on the day. Most notably, Year 10 Jack Marwood broke the Warrington Schools' record for the 1500m.
