# WE ARE AN ECO-SCHOOL

Lymm High has been awarded an International Eco-Schools Award for excellence in improving environmental learning and performance.

hat a great start to the new school year! This international accreditation recognises the amazing work our Eco-Committee has done in making Lymm High more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness in fellow students.

Mr Williams thanked the Eco-Committee for all their hard work. "It's great to get the award and even better to know how much progress we've made in this important area."

The Eco-Schools programme was established in 1994 and is now delivered in more than 70 countries across the globe. More than 1 million pupils attended an Eco-School in England in 2022–23.

Students at Lymm High first formed an Eco-Committee, then collaborated with Mr Hayes and our Estates Manager, Mr Hendrie, to

conduct an environmental review. To assess how ecofriendly Lymm High was, they reviewed everything from biodiversity within the school grounds to how students and staff travel to school. Building on their findings, students then planned a year of action designed to advance their school's green credentials and improve their local environment.

The Eco-Committee chose three Eco-Schools' topics to concentrate on: Biodiversity, Energy and Waste.

### Biodiversity

The Biodiversity Eco Reps built a bug hotel on the school field to increase the variety of local flora and fauna. This was made out of pallets, old bricks, dead leaves and foliage. They



also oversaw the planting of an orchard on the school grounds, near Spud Wood, and prepared a flower bed next to one of the school yards ready for wildflowers to be planted.

### Energy

The three main aims of the Energy Eco Reps were to:

- Reduce energy use
  - Reduce energy waste

• Change mindsets The school's lightbulbs are progressively being replaced with LED ones to reduce overall energy usage. In addition, passive infrared sensors are now operational in Sixth Form areas. The heating system has also been refined and a new pool cover in the Leisure Centre is further helping school to save energy.

Some of the Energy Eco Reps have agreed to be 'Power Rangers' and remind teachers at the end of Period 5 to switch off electrical devices and close windows.

Further plans to reduce energy are also being investigated, and include solar panels, pipework insulation and electric-vehicle charging points.





### Waste

The Waste Eco Reps are investigating options for the recycling of food, paper, batteries, plastic bottles and books at school. Ideas for recycling stations around school are being looked into, and teachers will be encouraged to recycle by having dedicated boxes in their classrooms.

The recycling of school uniform and sports kit is another project for the Waste Eco Reps. Second-hand uniform is now available from the school shop. Mr Hayes said: "I am so proud of the students' passion on environmental issues. The maturity and vision they have demonstrated during meetings with Mr Hendrie has been fantastic to see. The students communicated their initial findings in a series of Hall assemblies earlier in the year and laid out their plan of action. They have shown persistence and determination to implement these ideas and it is wonderful to see the school becoming a more ecofriendly environment. I am looking forward to their forthcoming environmental

review and seeing what areas they are going to focus on this year."

Eco-Schools England Manager, Adam Flint, said: "The Eco-Schools Green Flag award is an internationally recognised symbol of high environmental standards. The pupils and school staff that earn the award deserve immense credit for their hard work, determination, and creativity. Their passion for protecting our planet is an inspiration to us all."

# BEST EVER EXAM RESULTS

ymm High has been celebrating another excellent set of exam results this summer. In fact, the A' Level results for our Year 13 students were the best set of post-16 results the school has ever had!

Mrs Jennings, Head of Sixth Form, said: "This is the cohort who didn't sit GCSE exams because of Covid, which means they missed out on the benefit of the experience of sitting public exams – so the whole process has been even more nerve-wracking than normal. I am so proud of the way they have handled everything and just delighted to see them doing so well."

Despite fears in the press about pressure on university places, nearly all Lymm High Sixth Form students have already secured places at their preferred universities. This includes very high numbers heading off to the most pres-

"A' Level results today are the best that Lymm High School has ever had." tigious institutions, including Oxbridge, and onto the most competitive courses, such as medicine.

Mr Williams, Headteacher, said: I'm simply delighted for the students. They have not had an easy time of it, and so to come through and post results like these reflects incredibly well on them; they really do deserve all their success. I'm also delighted for their teachers, who have worked incredibly hard to navigate all the changes and uncertainty surrounding exams over the last few years. The impact of Covid on

national results over the past three years means that we need to be a little careful making direct comparisons but, taking into account that we have returned to pre-Covid patterns across England, A' Level results today are the best that Lymm High School has ever had. Given that outcomes in the Sixth Form have been consistently excellent for some years now, this really is quite an achievement, and everyone involved deserves huge congratulations."

A week after the A' Level results, Year 11 students collected exceptional GCSE results.

As was the case for Year 13, the impact of Covid means that this Year 11 cohort have had to face far more than their fair share of challenges in tackling their GCSE courses. "Overall, Lymm High School continues to perform at a level that very few schools across the country are matching."

Mrs Feast, Deputy Headteacher, said: "I am incredibly proud of our Year 11 students and the outcomes that they have achieved. They have been a real pleasure to work with and I wish them all the very best with their next steps."

Mr Williams, said: "We are delighted to see another set of truly excellent results. Year 11 had a lot to live up to and they certainly haven't let us down!" The disruption to exams as a result of Covid over the last few years means we need to be a little careful making direct comparisons with previous years (at least until more national data are available) but, whichever way we look at them, this is another great set of results. For example, getting on for 40% of all GCSE grades were at grades 9-7 (i.e. at least grade A) and 35% of individual students scored 9-7 grades in at least five different subjects. Almost 85% of students picked up 9-4 grades (i.e. C and above) in at least five subjects and 60% gained at least one grade 7.

Overall, Lymm High School continues to perform at a level that very few schools across the country are matching.

# GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP

Last term, the Geography department took 230 students over four days to complete some physical geography field work on the River Goyt in the Peak District.

The purpose of the trip was to meet with the AQA GCSE Geography specification requirements. Students were investigating how the River Goyt and its valley changed with distance down stream (from source to the mouth). They investigated:

- how the river bed load changed with distance down stream
- how the valley gradient changed with distance down stream, and
- how the river velocity changed with distance down stream.

The trip was a great success with around 60 students and five staff members attending each day.

# THE WINDRUSH GENERATION

October marks the start of Black History Month. Understanding our history and culture is an important part of our social responsibility as a school. Over the course of the next month, students will learn about the UK's black history, discuss race in sport, and hear from lower school students about their passions and interests in relation to black history. Below is an article summarising our first black history assembly. Written by Sixth Former, Amy Deeks, it tells us about the Windrush Generation and their impact on UK history.

he British Government faced a rather bleak situation in 1945. The Second World War had ended but so many British citizens had died during the war that the workforce was severely depleted; this meant that Britain would face a very difficult recovery process. Its solution was the

'Nationalities Act' which allowed people living in the Commonwealth, former British Empire, to live and work in the UK. Many hundreds of Commonwealth citizens answered this plea for help but the people most famous for immigration to the UK in the late 1940s are the Jamaican nationals. In 1948, 1027 passengers boarded the 'HMS Empire Windrush' ship in Jamacia. Its destination was Tilbury, Essex.



Between 1948 and 1971, half a million people from the Caribbean settled in the UK. They became known as the 'Windrush Generation'.

The positive impact of the Windrush Generation on Britain was huge. The NHS had been set up the same year as the HMS Windrush docked in Essex and the Windrush Generation filled essential roles in that service. Their contributions meant that British citizens have been enjoying free healthcare for over 70 years. The Windrush Generation brought their own culture with them which permeated into British culture. This includes food, such as jerk chicken, and music, such as Ska and Reggae. However, many people from the Windrush Generation suffered constant racism and discrimination from their more ignorant neighbours.

It would not be uncommon when walking down a high street in the 1950s to see signs on windows stating 'No Irish. No Blacks. No Dogs'.

In 1971, the British Government issued the 'Immigration Act' which gave people from the Commonwealth living in Britain the right to stay permanently. Despite this, information came to light in 2018 forming what would become known as the 'Windrush Scandal'.

The British Government had



### kept no record of the people from the Windrush Generation who had been allowed to live in the UK. Worse still, they had also destroyed the landing cards of the original passengers of the Windrush. This meant that many people had no proof they were British citizens and therefore had no rights to healthcare, work, or housing. In all, 83 British citizens with lives, homes and

families in the UK were

wrongfully deported.


In 2018, the then Prime Minister Theresa May apologised on behalf of the British Government for the appalling treatment of the Windrush Generation and proposed a compensation scheme. However, this is still not the end of the story as the Windrush Scandal still often comes up in Government and was debated as recently as January 2023.

Since the scandal first broke, people of all walks of life have shown support for the Windrush Generation and their amazing positive impact on Britain has not been forgotten.

Since 2018, the 22nd June has been 'Windrush Day', marking the seventieth anniversary of HMS Empire Windrush arriving at Tilbury Dock.

# OPERATION TYNNY

The renovation of Ty'n-y-Felin is underway.

K nown as 'Tynny', this Anglesey-based outdoor learning centre has been used by Lymm High for many years, and occupies a very special place in the hearts of many current and past students, teachers, parents and others. Stage 1 of its renovation work started in September and will run to the end of October. This will involve:

- Complete renovation of the amphitheatre.
- Replacement of all doors on the external shower block.
- Removal of inoperative white goods.
- Removal of the pump set in preparation for new pumps/ management system.
- Replacement of macerators in accessible toilets.
- Making the external store ready in preparation to become an external drying room.
- Replacement and commission of a new fire alarm.
- Replacement of the plant room and girls' toilet fire doors.

The aim is to reopen Tynny in Spring 2024. We'll keep you updated!
