Nathan is getting used to being recognised in Stoke and having fans shout out his name. And this is set to continue following his debut appearance for England's Under-19s squad in the three UEFA U19 Euro qualifying matches.

Tell us about yourself:


I'm Mr Newns and am the new Assistant Head of Mathematics, looking after Key Stage 4.

I'm 41 years old and have been teaching for 20 years. I live locally with my wife, two children and a cat. I'm a keen Warrington Wolves and Manchester United fan and in my spare time I enjoy running and any activity which involves being outside.

Why did you enter the teaching profession?

I think Mathematics is the finest subject you can study and I

can't think of anything better than teaching maths all day! Working with young people constantly challenges me and each day is very different to the last. I enjoyed school tremendously and wish to help each child have the same positive school experience I was awarded!



What degree course did you take?

I decided to apply to Manchester University to study for a degree in Maths and loved each and every day! I stayed at Manchester to complete my PGCE in Secondary Mathematics. It wasn't until I studied maths at degree level that I realised the size and scope of the subject.

What are the best and worst parts of the job?

Watching a pupil's confidence and enjoyment of maths grow is easily the best part of the job.

Working with exam classes towards that final exam gives a real thrill of chase and challenge! Being a Form tutor is a real privilege too; I have been very spoilt with such a wonderful and diverse group of people in my Form!

Perhaps the worst part of working with young people is when they make a poor decision, but each and every day is a fresh start and a new chance to make a positive change.

Tell us about yourself:

I'm Miss Dunne. I am in my eighth year of teaching maths and have recently been appointed Assistant Head of Mathematics, looking after Key Stage 3. This means I am lucky enough to oversee all Years 7, 8 and 9 students in terms of their mathematical learning.

I am 28 years old, have a Cocker spaniel, and once did a sky dive.

Why did you enter the teaching profession?

I knew I wanted to work with, and inspire, young people. I have a great interest and love for maths and wanted to share that. I also wanted to be the teacher I never had, and always try and see my students as people first and foremost, then learners second.

What degree course did you take?

I studied towards a Pure Mathematics degree, and took a specific interest in statistics. I find it very interesting how data can be interpreted, the process behind decision making, and how extensively it is used in real-life maths!



What are the best and worst parts of the job?

The best part of my job is getting to work with all the wonderful people that I do. I get to be a part of people's learning, see their confidence grow and watch how they progress to young adults! The worst part about my job is having to give detentions. I would much rather time be used effectively!

PHOTOGRAPHIC LIVERPOOL

On Tuesday 3rd October, Year 11 students who study Fine Art and/or Photography set off to Liverpool to explore the city and its galleries.

The trip began in the Walker Art Gallery, in which the exhibitions were fantastic for both our Photography and Fine Art Students. The exhibition 'Photie Man' showcased a vast selection of work by documentary-style photographer Tom Wood; and the John Moore Painting Prize showed a wide range of contemporary British painting, displaying work from artists from all over the UK.

Students completed a variety of tasks inside the gallery, searching for their favourite pieces and discovering new and exciting artists that may inspire their own practise. After exploring the Walker Gallery, students walked from one side of the city to the other, photographing and sketching from observation along the way, gathering vital primary research for their current coursework projects.

"It was an excellent week that helped to reassure young people in our community that they are not alone with their mental health!"




AUTUMN PHOTO COMPETITION

had to solve and we determined it to be a gun shot to the head.




We really enjoyed this workshop and hope to do something similar in the future!

We had to measure and identify face bones and use the size guide to determine the height of the victim. Next, we used a banana chunk to do a DNA extraction, which was then incubated, before being assessed on the level of skill of the DNA.


Then, using anthropology we attempted to identify the ethnicity of the victim based on the skull. The cause of death was the next thing we







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
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CAPTURING OUR WORLD

Congratulations Noah! He wins a 3-in-1 smartphone camera lens kit and a trophy.


2nd Place: Ned Martin (8TL)




















On Saturday 7th October, the U15 and U16 netball teams travelled to The Grange School to play in the Cheshire Schools' Tournament.

Nathan Lowe spoke to us about his football career since leaving Lymm High.

How did it feel when you got the England call-up?

The England call-up came as a surprise really. I was overwhelmed when I was rung by the Under-19 manager, and he confirmed to me that I would be involved and laid out the plans for the forthcoming week. Only when I turned up to London on the first night did I fully understood the magnitude of the situation and it was a great feeling.

What was the atmosphere like in Montenegro with the England Under-19s squad?

The atmosphere at the games in Montenegro were good, especially the first game against Montenegro; however, I had played in front of a lot more fans for my club, so it wasn't as daunting as you'd expect. It was weird being able to hear my teammates talk on the pitch as they are normally drowned out by noise from the fans.

How did the rest of the squad receive you into the team?

I was nervous and didn't talk to many people at first but then as the week progressed, I gained confidence and started to put myself out there more. Even now after the camp has ended I still stay in touch with some of the players.

How did it feel when you were told to warm up the first time?

Believe it or not, I wasn't actually that nervous to come on as I had watched the game and just wanted to get on the pitch so when they told me to warm up it didn't really affect me.

Were you nervous walking onto the pitch?

After my first few touches of the ball, I had settled into the game

and then from there I realised it was no different from any youth team game, just at a higher standard.

Which was your best game?

I did play a part in all three games of the Euro Qualifiers coming off the bench, getting 30 minutes in the first (Montenegro), 25 minutes in the second (Wales), and 15 minutes in the third and final game (Austria).

How long have you been at Stoke City?

I've been at Stoke City since the age of 10 and have progressed through the ranks steadily until the age of 16 when I started to kick on and play above my age group consistently.

How did you juggle training and school work?

It was hard trying to balance my school work and football over the years, however I made sure to make time for my studies after training.

What does a standard day now look like?

My standard day now is quite a tricky one as I'm often required by three different age groups (U18, U21 & 1st team). My typical day starts at 8.15am and ends at 4.30pm as that's the scholars report time. However, the 1st team's day is a lot shorter with report at 9.30am and finish at around 1/1.30pm.

I normally train with the 1st team in the morning and then after lunch, we sometimes do gym work. When I get little snippets of time, and for a whole day on Wednesday (when the 1st team are off), I try and box off some education.

I live in 'digs' in Stoke during the week, which is basically me living with two other teammates and a family who gets paid to look after us. Since my family house is only 40 minutes away, I often come back to Lymm midweek for the night and most weekends.

What's your best memory so far at Stoke?

I have made some great memo-

ries in my time at Stoke, with most coming in the last year since I signed as a professional. Naturally, making my debut at 17 in the Championship and the FA Cup against Premier League opposition Brighton are up there; and obviously scoring my first professional goal 12 days after turning 18, to win the game 3–2 in the 89th minute was special. My full debut in the Championship was also a big milestone.

Do you have any fond memories of Lymm High School?

I loved my time at Lymm High School and I have very fond memories from Years 7–11. At the end of Year 11 I was excited for my new challenge as a full time professional but after a while I started to realise how good I had it at school. That's not to say I'm unhappy with my career choice, I'm definitely not; however, I sometimes do wish I could go back in time and relive all those happy memories.

What were your favourite subjects?

My favourite subjects at school were Business Studies, Maths, French and GCSE PE, mostly because I was alright at them but also because I had a passion and enjoyed studying them. I got decent enough grades in all of the subjects I took for GCSEs but

I found it a lot easier to spend hours revising these subjects that I particularly liked.

What football team do you support?

Growing up I was a Manchester United fan because of my family. This was unpopular amongst my friends when we used to live in Hertfordshire but it was much easier to support them when we moved up to Lymm.

Do you play FIFA?

Yes I occasionally play the new FIFA but only for playing with my mates on pro clubs. To be honest I typically prefer shooting games as I enjoy them more and I'm probably better at them.
