CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL


St Mary's Christmas community tree festival is an annual event which the Visual Arts & Technology faculty love to be involved in.

Two of our Ukrainian students entered a poetry translation competition called the 'Stephen Spender Prize'. They had to translate a poem from their own language into English and explain a little bit about the poem, any difficulties they had in translating the poem, and give a little bit of background to the poem/poet.

Year 9 Sofiia Kladko received a participation certificate for entering the competition.

Year 11 Taras Shalaiev received a commendation for his poem. He describes his winning work below.

ina Kostenko is one of Ukraine's most prominent poets. Her poems often explore deep emotions and complex human experiences.



I enjoy reading Lina Kostenko's poems because they depict Ukrainian culture, language and history.


I chose a poem 'Scary words if they are silent' for translation. In the poem Lina Kostenko shows the meaning of the word in human life and emphasis that words, like clots that absorb people's joys and pains. "One cried with them, and suffered, was in pain...." The poet's philosophical reflections on words create the image of a lyrical hero who expresses his thoughts on the problem of choosing necessary words.

I faced several difficulties translating the poem from Ukrainian into English due to the linguistic differences between the two languages.

So, firstly, I had to find equivalents in English that captured the poetic essence of Kostenko's original words while still preserving the intended meaning.

Secondly, rhyme and rhythm: Ukrainian poetry often relies on rhyme schemes, meter and specific rhythmic patterns. Translating these elements from the original poem into English while maintaining the poetic integrity of the original work was challenging for me. For example, in the original text, it sounds "Everything is repeated: both beauty and ugliness"...But the word "ugliness" isn't appropriate in rhythmical pattern so I have changed the word into "darkness". Or for example, I was trying to find the rhyme to the word "souls", so I had to change the original "aphids" into "knolls" because it's more suitable in cross rhyming.

Certain words, phrases, or symbols in Ukrainian carry specific cultural connotations or emotional weight. I tried to find some equivalents in English without losing the original flavour of the poem. I hope I managed to capture the essence and beauty of Lina Kostenko's work in English.



Scary words if they are silent

Scary words if they are silent when they suddenly all lurked, when you don't know how to start them, 'cause all the words were someone's else.

One cried with them, and suffered, was in pain. To start with them and end with them... Billions of people and words remain, but you have to pronounce them first!

Everything is repeated: beauty and darkness. Everything was there: asphalt and knolls. Poetry is always as a unique loveliness, some immortal touch to the souls.

Year 9 also met a number of different employers this term in our 'Insight to work' carousel. Students loved hearing about such a variety of industries, we are very grateful to the number of parents who gave up their valuable time to do this, thank you!

To finish the term, Year 9 will have an assembly from UTC Warrington to outline the opportunities available.

Year 10 and Year 11

Year 10 and Year 11 students started the year by reconnecting with the Unifrog platform and preparing to attend the Careers Fair held at Warrington Youth Zone in October. Students have also revisited the labour market, considering the opportunities available in our local area.

Students have also considered what is a career and reflected on their own career journey.

Year 11 students have also considered their Post-16 choices, attended our very own Sixth Form Open Evening, and should have now completed their Post-16 Intentions on Unifrog. To finish the term, Year 11 will have an assembly from UTC Warrington and also a lunch time drop-in session from Trafford College.

Key Stage 5

Year 12 have considered the following topics this term: how to be aspirational, an introduction into employment, and part-time work. Students have been on a number of visits including to Liverpool University and the Safe Drive Stay Alive event where they heard first hand about a variety of jobs in the public sector.

A number of students took part in our visit to Parliament and a Criminology day. We have also had an external speaker on the topic of International volunteering.



Year 13 students have spent much of this term focussing on completing their applications to UCAS and apprenticeships. We are delighted so many of them are already receiving offers and invitations to interview.

Students have looked at CVs, attended a mock interview, and prepared for attending a mock assessment centre. We have had a number of external speakers including Gap Year options from Yipiyap and International volunteering. An ex-student also visited to discuss their experiences of an apprenticeship.

Students across all year groups contributed to the installation by drawing, painting or printing their very own poppy during the days leading up to the 11th November.


"They worked extremely hard during break and lunchtimes to fill the reams of paper with poppies", said Miss Simms.

YEAR 9 AT WORK

To support Lymm High's Careers Education (see p.10), Year 9 had the opportunity to experience the world of work at school and with friends and family.

he aim of the experience was to inspire students' exploration of different careers, expand their networks and open their eyes to the exciting opportunities available to them. The Gatsby Foundation '*Good Career Guidance*' Report states that good career guidance is critical if young people are to raise their aspirations and capitalise on the opportunities available to them.

Gatsby Benchmark 5 states, 'Every pupil should have multiple opportunities to learn from employers about work, employment and the skills that are valued in the workplace. This can be through a range of enrichment activities including visiting speakers, mentoring and enterprise schemes.' The aim of our 'Take your child to work day' was to provide students with the opportunity to engage with employers in a meaningful way and experience the world of work first hand.


During their placement, students were asked to complete a booklet containing a number of activities. These included finding out what the business does, how many people the company employs, what happens if someone has an accident at work, what the perks are for working for that company, and the skills and qualifications needed. Students were also given the opportunity to 'quiz the boss'.

Students who remained in school also benefitted from workshops and talks from a range of em-



ployers, including:

- **Navy Submarines** delivered an assembly on life in the Navy.
- Adobe delivered a graphic design workshop.
- **Jacobs Engineering** set a group task to build a tower out of paper cups and skewers.
- Liverpool Institute of Performing Arts delivered a drama workshop.
- **Fire Service** talked to pupils about working in the fire service and showed them uniforms, equipment and replicated how it feels to find your way through a smoky room (with blindfolds on).

Rainbow International work alongside customers who have had fires, floods, water damage etc. Lucas spent time with the administrator answering calls, booking jobs and updating the work board. Sienna was sat with the Manager and printed PAT tests off after the technicians had been out to the job and added them to the customer files (they took hours). They then worked through all the emails to book staff holidays.

"Both Lucas and Sienna enjoyed the variety that the day brought and learnt that no two jobs are the same", said Lucas's Mum.

Lucas told us he enjoyed understanding how to book jobs at work. He said the worst thing were the calls every minute! He was surprised at how busy they are in a day, and he learned that working can drain you!

Sienna told us, "I enjoyed my work experience day because I got to find out what the commitment you have to have to be in a working environment. I also got to do jobs on the computer in the office and I learnt different things. Also I enjoyed getting to know what work is like and you have to be very calm with it."

Ben Matthews accompanied his Mum to Clare & Illingworth Opticians.

The best part of Ben's work day was talking to people; he said there wasn't a worst part! He was surprised at how hard his Mum worked and said that he learned new communicating skills.





Áine McAfee went to work with her father, Dr Sean McAfee, who is a Consultant Anaesthetist at the Wrightington, Wigan & Leigh Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. She was unable to go to the operating theatres but went to the Education centre where there are training aids including a high-fidelity simulation mannikin and an anaesthetic machine. She was able to learn about the role of an Anaesthetist in looking after patients during surgery and in resuscitation of critically unwell patients. She got to insert an Intravenous cannula into a training arm and perform laryngoscopy and tracheal intubation on the mannikin. She also learned how to assess a collapsed and unresponsive person, recognise cardiac arrest and commence Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Dad said, "I think Aine really enjoyed getting to do some practical skills and learning what the job is about. I think she feels my job is more interesting than she previously thought! She is considering a career in veterinary medicine where the vet will have to perform the roles of multiple specialist doctors including anaesthesia and surgery."

Judah Anthony accompanied his Dad to **Tyrepress / WhatTyre.com** who publish magazines and websites about tyres and wheels. Judah spent the day learning about what the company does, researching possible news items, and writing a text box full of facts to accompany an article about the Tesla Cybertruck.

Dad said, "It was great seeing Judah use his initiative and Judah had a full insight into what it takes to work for a full day!".

Grace Murry went to work with Mum at **Myerson Solicitors** in Altrincham, an acclaimed law firm that provides commercial and private client legal advisory services to businesses and individuals nationwide.

Grace spent time with the admin department creating planners and binding documents for the conveyancing team. She also spent time in the Commercial Department (Mum's team!) where she was able to see how they take client instructions and use these to amend and draft documents. Grace learnt how they use different technologies to plan and manage tasks, create colour-coded mark-up documents and log time spent on files and matters for billing.

ond year as a Solicitor Apprentice at Myerson. She learnt what the apprenticeship scheme involves and how we support students through their 6 years of study and training at the firm to become fully qualified lawyers. Grace also enjoyed going out to lunch and seeing the various teams' Christmas decorations (or lack of decorations in some teams!).



Harry Daintith accompanied his Uncle at **Fresenius Kabi**: a global healthcare company that specialises in lifesaving medicines and technologies for infusion, transfusion and clinical nutrition.

Harry spent the day with his Uncle in the Technical Services department in their modern and dedicated Repair Centre. He worked on an Amika Enteral Feeding Pump supported by an Engineer who stripped the pump down and replace any planned preventative

parts and completed a service via the dedicated device software. He also worked on a Rythmic PN+ IV pump used for infusing nutrition intravenously where he followed the process of how to change a maintenance kit and take it through a service. Harry also worked on a Agilia SP MC Wifi Syringe Driver used to infuse drugs intravenously where he followed the process to replace the battery and complete a full service via dedicated device software. Harry enjoyed the practical side of the day working on different equipment for different therapies.

Sofiia Kladko went to work with her Dad at Saica Paper.

roles and looked at how the company creates, designs and markets websites. They looked at IT systems for client management and merchant services and they discussed design and production. Mum thinks that Ella would probably say lunch was the highlight of the day – as they had a business lunch at Warrington market! Ella confirmed this was true and said she had learnt that she doesn't want to do this job in the future and wants to have a more active role. Isabelle Sharp went to work with her father Dr Andrew Sharp in the **Harris Research Centre** at the University of Liverpool based at **Liverpool Women's Hospital**.

She spent the day with the <u>Children Growing Up in</u> <u>Liverpool (C-GULL) birth cohort study</u>. This study looks to recruit women in their first pregnancy and follow them up into their later lives and the lives of their children. In this



way we should be able to understand better the personal, societal and environmental factors that influence child and adult health.

Isabelle spent her day with the call centre and lab teams and saw a woman being recruited to the study by the research midwives. Dad said, "I think Isabelle enjoyed being out of the school setting to see what real work looks like especially the lab parts, which I think suited her quite well. For me it was a great opportunity to show my daughter some of the things I work on and introduce her to the excellent team I work with. Also, hopefully, she was enthused about working in a scientific/medical environment for the betterment of women, their children and society."

KEEPING YOURSELF WELL AT CHRISTMAS

You are never alone and there is always support available. Find out where and how to access support over the festive period.

e know that Christmas can be a hard time for a lot of people. It may even have a negative effect on your mental health. This is normal and lots of people share this feeling – it is okay not to be okay! Therefore, we wanted to highlight how important it is to do things that take care of your mental health and wellbeing over the Christmas period. This might include:

• Engaging in self-care. Taking time to do things that make you happy and listen to how you are feeling. It can be hard at this time of year but make sure you make yourself a priority.

- Set clear boundaries. Be honest with people about how you feel and what you feel comfortable doing. It is okay to say no if you don't feel up to something. Do what feels best for you!
- Have structure to your
 days. It is great to have
 chilled days but also ensure you are getting
 some fresh air, are active
 and continuing to get up
 and follow your usual
 routine.
- Spend time with people you love and who make you happy. Be gentle with yourself. Try not to put too much pressure on yourself and take it one day at a time!

These activities are all positive ways to support your mental health. However, it is also important to recognise when you may need some help and support. You are never alone, especially at Christmas. If you are struggling, please speak to an adult you trust or contact a helpline. Over Christmas you can access the following helplines and services:

M ax Davies started his motorsport journey back in January 2022 visiting his local karting track at Teamsport in Warrington where he won numerous local events and competed in the British Indoor Karting Championship.

At the start of last year, the Year 11 student decided to take his first major step into competitive motorsport and apply for a National Outdoor Championship called Club100.

Club 100 select 120 drivers from the UK each year to compete in their championship. Max was chosen from thousands of applicants to race in all eight rounds of their 2023 season.

Throughout the season Max has competed against some of the most talented drivers in the country, competing at race tracks all across the UK.

Being accepted into Club100 was Max's first major achievement, only 12 months after beginning his karting journey it provided him with the ultimate platform to progress within the sport. In his Rookie season he is currently placed 17th in the UK and the top three in the Rookie driver standings.

In the 2023 season, Max also entered the Total Karting Zero Northern Championship – A fully electric karting championship ran by Rob Smedley, ex F1 Ferrari Race Engineer. Max was placed in 2nd in the overall championship after five rounds and earnt a podium finish in four of the five rounds. In November 2023, Max realised his biggest achievement to date and was selected to take part in one of most renowned owner driver karting championships in the UK called Super One. This is a championship where Lewis Hamilton, Llando Norris, Alex Albon, George Russell, Zhou Guanyu, and Jenson Button all raced before starting their F1 careers.

In addition, Max has also been selected by a race team to join them throughout the 2024 season where they will support his development and provide race day engineering support during each round. This is by far his biggest opportunity to date and he can't wait for the season opener in April 2024.

This year Max was fortunate to receive sponsorship from a business in Wales who have supported him through 2023. He is now seeking sponsorship for 2024 and looking for local businesses to become a part of his motorsport journey.


CHASING THE CUP!
