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### **INSPIRING AUTHORS**

On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> January, the English department were delighted to welcome best-selling author Sophie Anderson into school to give a talk to Year 7 students.

S ophie wrote our Year 7 novel, *The House with Chicken Legs*, which students have been studying since October and this offered them the chance to hear firsthand from the writer.

It was a real privilege to get to hear from the author herself about what inspired her to write the novel and her journey with creative writing.

Year 7 represented the school brilliantly and listened

attentively to Sophie's talk, which also included some information about how the publishing process works.

At the end of the session, students were able to ask any burning questions that they

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


had about the novel or becoming a writer. Sophie provided advice to aspiring authors, and gave her own opinions on the characters in *The House With Chicken Legs*.


# AFRICA CALLING

We are delighted to be launching a partnership with a school in Kenya.

S ocial responsibility is at the heart of everything we do. We strive to develop a sense of kindness, tolerance, integrity, and empathy to shape our students into socially responsible citizens at school and in their lives beyond Lymm High.

Therefore, we are proud to announce the launch of our very own Afritwin: a longterm partnership with a school in Africa that we are incredibly lucky to now embrace as part of our own community, writes Miss Tunstall.

Our mission is to work, collaborate and grow with a school where we can make a



real change. To achieve this, our partnership has been established through the help of African Adventures: a unique travel company partnered



with over 20 schools in developing areas of Ghana, Kenya and Zanzibar. Through careful consideration, they have skilfully matched the strengths of our school with St Trizah: a school that is still in its early stages of growth.

In a developing area of the country, St Trizah is a school in Kenya, which provides a free education and daily meals to 220 students between the ages of 3 and 17, from pre-primary to secondary level. The school was



founded in 2009 by Yuvenalis Mokua and has 15 classrooms. St Trizah used to provide an education to both day and boarding students, but after it relocated to a new plot of land, the boarding school closed, and St Trizah now operates solely as a day school.

This exciting, long-term partnership will involve a variety of events, activities and continued support all year round for many years to come. We aim to build a long-lasting connection where we learn about St Trizah and their culture, whist fundraising to make an invaluable difference to a community across the world beyond our school walls. Education is a powerful tool that can transform lives and communities. Unfortunately, many children in Kenya face significant barriers to accessing quality education. By fundraising for St Trizah and spreading awareness at Lymm, we can contribute to breaking down these barriers and providing opportunities for countless children to learn, grow and build better futures.

Our unique school trip to Africa will give our students the opportunity to take their learning beyond the classroom and develop new skills, whilst contributing to real change in a developing community. For students currently in Years 10–12, a trip to visit St Trizah is running for 13 nights from 13th July 2025. This exciting opportunity will allow us to see the true impact of our fundraising, embrace the community and immerse ourselves in their culture. Whilst on the trip, students will partake in teaching English to the students, coaching sports, and building much needed classrooms and facilities. Beyond the volunteering, there are also opportunities to see the natural beauty of Kenya, learn the local dialect and take cooking classes in Kenyan cuisine.

Well done to everyone involved!







### ENTERPRISING STUDENTS

During the last half term KS3 business and enterprise students researched and gathered ideas for products to sell at their Christmas Market.

T he initial task was to produce a business plan; this had to be handed to Mrs Worrall or Miss Peacock where it could be checked and discussed with the group. If the business plan was agreed the pupils were given a budget of £10. They had to research and source their materials within this budget and if they needed to borrow more they had to present to the staff why they needed an additional loan. To reduce the risk of making a loss students had to produce a financial forecast that outlined their total cash outflow and predicted cash inflow; to do this they had to complete market research with their peers.

Students have spent a lot of their own time gathering their materials and have worked hard to put their products together. They have also designed and created their marketing



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posters which have been shown on the school bulletin.

B210 has been a hive of activity every Monday lunchtime and Mrs Worrall and Miss Peacock are incredibly proud of the hard work and resilience that the pupils have shown over the last term.

"The children were amazing and the items they had made just looked fantastic", said Mrs Worrall.

"In total, they have made around £400 profit which is just amazing! They have all put in so much hard work and lots of their own time outside of school to ensure they have the best product possible; I am so proud of their effort."

# LIFE DRAWING WORKSHOP


On Tuesday 12th December, the Visual Arts department welcomed artist Brian Raymond from Creative Art Courses Manchester into Lymm High to run an after-school life drawing workshop.

The workshop focussed on observing the way that fabric drapes over the human body. The artist gave students great insight into the different ways that fabric drapes and how, with the careful application of tone, this draping can be represented through drawing.



The 2-hour workshop was a great challenge for the GCSE and A' level students who attended. Their levels of concentration whilst completing each of their 10–15-minute drawings were very impressive. They used only a stick of charcoal and a piece of fabric to blend, which for some students was a brand new material and way of working.

Miss Simms said: "All students who attended the life drawing workshop from Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 produced some amazing observational drawings. All students thoroughly made the most of the time that they had working with a practising artist from outside of the school environment. They asked questions and showed keen interest in his knowledge and experiences."
