


duced World Book Day books or as a £1 contribution to the price of a new book.

PIANO MAN'S PAIN AND PROGRESS



aniel Wilsher is known to many as a finalist on Channel 4's hit show 'The Piano'. He is also an awardwinning mental health speaker and entrepreneur. He is the founder of Damaged Goods Co., co-founder of LivEdX Learning Ltd, and has worked with hundreds of schools across the UK.

At Lymm High, Daniel took students on a journey through his life while exploring ways they can take action to create hope in their own lives. He recalled his upbringing, involving the loss of his father at an early age, his battle with drugs and alcohol, bouts of depression and anxiety, and how therapy helped him.

"It is my aim to ignite and inspire a fierce curiosity in the inner workings of whoever hears my story, while providing practical tools to help regulate emotion in times of need, helping them deal with life's inevitable ebbs and flows a little easier

tudents recently embarked on a History and Religious Studies trip to Kraków and Auschwitz, deepening their understanding of the Holocaust and its historical significance.

The group flew from Manchester to Kraków, arriving at their city centre hotel late on Thursday 13th March.

Friday was a packed and emotional day. After an early buffet breakfast, students travelled to Auschwitz-Birkenau, where they met their incredibly knowledgeable tour guide and embarked on a guided tour of the concentration camps.

The visit aimed to enhance students' historical knowledge, particularly supporting their Year 9 module on Nazi Germany. Witnessing the site first-hand gave them a powerful insight into the horrors of the Holocaust.

"The students were great during our tour, listening intently to the stories and taking in everything there was to see", said Trip Leader Miss Barnes. "They were clearly moved by what they had experienced and engaged in some really thoughtful conversations."

In the afternoon, the group visited the Wieliczka Salt Mine, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Over the course of a 2-hour guided



tour, students explored the stunning underground tunnels, chapels and chambers – they then discovered that they had only seen 1% of the entire mine!

After a long day, the group walked through Kraków's Old Town before enjoying a traditional Polish meal at a local restaurant. It was a perfect way to reflect on the day's experiences and immerse themselves in Polish culture. With tired feet and full stomachs, the students returned to their hotel rooms for a well-earned rest. All were exhausted, but enriched, by the day's profound and unforgettable experiences.

LIFE DRAWING

On Tuesday 25th February, Lymm High students had the fantastic opportunity to take part in a clothed life drawing session led by Brian Raymond from Creative Courses Manchester.

The session was open to all GCSE and A' Level students and was focussed on drawing a life model draped in fabric. Students were tasked with observing and capturing how the fabric interacted with the body underneath. The challenge lay in understanding and representing how the fabric folded and creased, and how light and shadow can be applied. This required students to pay close attention to detail and apply their knowledge of anatomy, proportion and tone.

Using only charcoal, chalk and putty erasers, students worked on large-scale observations, refining their skills in mark-making and shading. The restricted use of tools pushed the group to focus on the core elements of drawing. The use of putty erasers allowed for effective application of light and shadow. Brian Raymond guided the students throughout the session, offering tips on



technique and how to approach their drawings.

The session was an excellent opportunity for students to step outside their comfort zones and tackle a subject that many had not experienced before. It was a fantastic and challenging session.

The Art department would like to thank all students who participated in this inspiring session and hope that it was a memorable experience that will no doubt influence their work moving forward.







BRAIN DAY

On Monday 10th March, we had the privilege of hosting Dr Guy Sutton, Director of Medical Biology Interactive, for



a captivating neuroscience tutorial.

he event offered Psychology students a unique opportunity to explore the wonders of the human brain, learning from one of the most engaging experts in the field.

The morning began with an insightful session on The Working Brain. Dr Sutton delved into essential topics such as basic brain anatomy, nerve cells, synapses and brain-computer interfaces. Students were particularly fascinated by the discussion on innovative methods of studying the brain, ranging from open brain surgery to advanced neuroimaging techniques. Additionally, Dr Sutton touched upon groundbreaking research on making human brain tissue in the lab

and how neuroplasticity can be influenced by everyday factors like sleep, smartphone use and vaping.

Following a short break, students participated in *The Dissected Brain* session, which featured a remarkable handson experience with a sheep brain dissection. This segment not only enhanced their understanding of brain anatomy but also explored fascinating concepts such as hemispherectomy – the removal of one hemisphere of the brain – and the extent of brain loss a person can survive.

The final session, *Mind*, *Brain* and *Crime*, focused on the biological and social interactions in crime. Dr Sutton provided valuable insights into the relationship between mental

disorders, criminality, and how brain damage from conditions like brain tumours or traumatic brain injuries can influence aggression. The students appreciated how these complex topics were broken down in an accessible and thought-provoking manner.

The tutorial concluded with a Q&A session, where students eagerly engaged with Dr Sutton to deepen their understanding of the topics discussed.

This event was an incredible experience, providing invaluable knowledge for aspiring psychologists. A special thank you to Dr Guy Sutton for inspiring our students and offering them a glimpse into the fascinating world of neuroscience.

ARTIST WORKSHOP

On Monday 3rd March, the Visual Arts department were thrilled to welcome back Ian Murphy, an artist known for his stunning mixed media pieces.

lan ran a full-day workshop with Year 9 students considering Fine Art as one of their options for next year, as well as current Year 10 Fine Art students. This workshop, which we run annually, is always a highlight for the department due to its fast-paced nature and exciting use of materials and processes.

lan Murphy is a highly regarded contemporary artist whose work focuses on the intricate relationship between architecture and space. His practice often blends drawing, painting and collage to explore the structure and form of buildings and urban landscapes. His pieces are rich in texture and detail, with a particular emphasis on layering materials to create depth and movement. For our students, working with lan was a unique opportunity to engage with an artist whose work they had already been studying as part of their current architecture project in Year 9.

Throughout the workshop, students had the invaluable chance to see Ian's work up close and ask him questions about his artistic career, the techniques he uses, and his creative processes. For Year 9 students, in particular, it was a brilliant way to deepen their understanding of Ian's work and gain insight into how they could incorporate similar techniques into their own projects. The real challenge of the workshop came in Ian's



approach to creating art. He encouraged students to work on four pieces simultaneously, just as he does. This method allowed students to explore multiple ideas and techniques at once, pushing them to think creatively and develop their skills.

The students threw themselves into the challenge with enthusiasm, producing fantastic outcomes across the day. Their engagement was remarkable, and it was inspiring to see how they embraced lan's techniques, working on multiple pieces with a sense of purpose and excitement. The use of mixed media allowed the students to experiment with different materials, from paint and charcoal to acrylic paint and tissue paper.

The Visual Arts department would like to extend a huge thank you to Ian Murphy for his time, energy and expertise, as well as to all the students who participated. We are confident that the skills and techniques they learned during the workshop will inspire their future projects and help them to develop their artistic practice further. We look forward to seeing how the students apply these new approaches as they continue their studies in Fine Art.


WELLBEING TREE




the competition next time it comes around."

Year 7 students have recently taken part in a fascinating trip to Norton Priory to learn about life in Medieval times.



Ituated on the edge of Runcorn, the site is home to a Medieval church and is the most excavated monastic site in Europe. It was founded in 1134.

Over the course of the day, students took part in a Medieval medicine workshop, an archaeological dig, a guided tour of the priory ruins, and the 12th century undercroft with beautiful vaulted ceiling. Students were also able to look at a huge range of artefacts some of which date back 900 years and included mosaic floors, stone coffins and even a skeleton.

"Norton Priory staff commented on how engaged and inquisitive our students were, with lots asking questions and wanting to learn more about the Priory", said Mrs McGahey.


Finlay Yeomans has been part of Wigan Warriors youth programme for 4 years.
