Once all the clue answers had been revealed, students had to count the number of letters in each answer and calculate a sum to reveal the number of letters in the winning name. If they calculated correctly, they would have three possible names to guess from, and the clues embedded into the instructions



provided could be used to reveal the final answer.

Over 70 students took part in the challenge testing their observational and problemsolving skills; and although a knowledge of mythology was helpful, all puzzles could be solved by reading the instructions and helpful hints, and by working through them methodically.

Well done to all the students involved, and huge thanks to the staff who supported this prestigious event.



On Tuesday 22nd April, the History faculty arranged for theatre company *Voices of the Holocaust* to visit Lymm High School.

he actors performed their play 'Kindness:

A Legacy of the Holocaust' to Year 9
students. The company came and transformed the Main Hall into a theatre with a full set, costumes and lighting rig!

The production is a ground-breaking testimony-based play that humanises the story of Susan Pollack, a Hungarian Holocaust survivor. By witnessing the narrative unfold before their eyes on stage, it was hoped that students would become active participants in a journey of empathy and enlightenment, fostering personal growth and deepening their historical understanding of the Holocaust.

The company performed a very powerful play for 1 hour and then hosted a post-performance

question-and-answer session to further enrich students' experience, providing them with a platform for reflection and dialogue.

"Students in Year 9 have been studying the Holocaust over the past half term, so this provided an excellent extra-curricular opportunity for them to engage with testimonies of survivors and to develop their understanding of the Holocaust further", writes Miss Howard.


The play showed Susan's early life as a child being brought up in a Jewish family in Hungary and then showed how Anti-Semitism and persecution escalated over time until she and her family were transported to Auschwitz-Birkenau. The play then showed true stories of Susan and other survivors and how they managed to survive the camp through acts of kindness. The play ended with the liberation of the camps by the Allies and described how different characters went on to live in different countries across the world as they tried to rebuild their lives.

The Director of the play, Cate Hollis, then ran a Drama Workshop in the afternoon with 20 Year 9 students who have chosen GCSE drama next year. Working with a range of stimuli - music, props, poetry and paintings students were taken through a variety of processes to begin shaping a thought-provoking performance. Students explored how to make meaning and to move away from narrative / naturalistic performance towards something 'elegant, beautiful and powerful' as the Voices of the Holocaust production is so often described. Students had a very valuable experience working with a real theatre director and the Drama teachers were full of praise for their participation in the workshop.





POLO CHAMPIONS WIN GOLD


Year 10 Nieve Folkes played in the Nationals last weekend with Liverpool U17s.
