

VICTORY IN EUROPE

On Thursday 8th May, students celebrated the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe by undertaking a series of challenges set by the History department.

E Day marks the day that the Second World War came to an end in Europe. To help Lymm High commemorate this important anniversary, a number of

activities, displays and events were planned.

A World War II (WWII) exhibition was set up in the Atrium, which included various artefacts and photographs.

Posters and a 'factual treasure hunt' around school highlighted our school community's connection to WWII, including some amazing family stories from staff.



Key Stage 3 students were set a 'VE Day Challenge' with a range of creative tasks to complete at home. These included:

Task 1: Plan a VE Day Party

Street parties were common to celebrate the end of war.

Alex Smith (9TL) helped to organise a street party on his road. Eve Wilks (7AL) attended the High Legh community celebrations of VE Day at the local church. There were drinks, food and music, and it ended with the lighting of a beacon.



Harley Yates (7AL) decorated his front garden for VE Day celebrations on his street. Summer Pollard (8AH) attended a VE Day street party.



Task 2: Bake using WWII rations

Rationing was introduced in Britain on 8th January 1940 and lasted until 4th July 1954. Rationing was a means of ensuring the fair distribution of food and commodities when they were scarce due to the war. Students were invited to choose a rationing recipe, make it and see how it tasted.

Various students took part, including Nell San Martin (8TL), Clara San Martin (9AL) and Xavier Staveley (7AH) who all made carrot biscuits. Chloe and Sophie Williams (7ML) also made carrot biscuits and a ration apple crumble, which were both really tasty!

Lisa (7AL) and Emma
Thornton (9AL) also decided to bake carrot biscuits. They said: "They turned out more of a rock bun than a biscuit!
But despite being made with the ration amounts, they didn't taste too bad at all! Not quite as sweet as biscuits today, but the flavour of the carrots made up for the rationed sugar."

Tobias Robinson (7AL) followed two ration recipes to make scones. He said they actually tasted alright! Sophie Bennett (7ML) made ration lemonade. Harry Bisson (7AL) had a go at baking the VE Day soda bread, and Alana Whelan (8TL) made a cake to celebrate VE Day. Matty Fawcett made wartime biscuits.



Task 3: Say Thank you

Students were invited to design a poster or write a card of thanksgiving explaining why they are thankful to those who lived and fought during WWII. These wishes of thanks extended to the soldiers, the women who worked in munitions factories, the spies who made operations possible, engineers, the politicians who plotted the country's moves, the children who were separated from their families, the medical staff at home and abroad, the people who were key workers who were committed to their essential roles, and many more.

Emmy Scoffin (8TL) made this colourful poster thanking the soldiers.





Task 4: Make your own bunting

Bunting was commonly used to signal a celebration. Students were tasked with making their own special VE Day 80 'Great British Bunting'.

Sara Bibby (7AL) designed and sewed her own VE Day flag to put up on our school display. This can be seen on our front cover. Ginny Wong (7AH) designed and coloured some beautiful 80th Anniversary bunting, which we have hung in the school's Atrium. Ella Hibbert (8TL) also designed some colourful bunting for her house.

Oliver Hughes (8AL) also made some special VE Day bunting to celebrate the 80th anniversary.


Task 5: Interview someone who was at the original VE Day

If students know someone who lived through the war, they were encouraged to meet up with them, call them on the phone, or use FaceTime or Zoom to interview them about their experience, both of the war, and of VE Day itself. We had a tremendous response to this task, with some amazing documents, presentations and posters being produced.

Laila Chappell-Steele (7ML) interviewed her Great Grandma, Margaret Smith, who is now 100 years old! Lizzie Cumming (7DH), Sophie Speakman (7DH) and Ethan Collier (7AH) interviewed their Grandmas about what they remembered about living through the War, VE Day, and their family's involvement in WWII.

Lilly McCarthy (7AL) found out that her Father's Dad, Fred, joined the army at 16 after lying about his age. Lilly's Mum's Dad, James, was captured by the Nazis and survived the death march after being a prisoner of war.

Will Ransby (8AH) made this VE Day poster about his Great Grandad who served in WWII.



Tima Harbovskyi (9AL) made a fascinating poster about his Great Grandma and Grandpa who both served in Ukraine and Eastern Europe. Tima is thankful for their sacrifice and bravery and sees them as true heroes and inspirations to him.



Rhys Marrington (7AL) found out that his Great Grandpa was a 1st officer, and his ship was called the SS Breedyk. In September 1942, the ship was attacked by the Nazis. The captain of the ship died but luckily his Great Grandpa and a few other people on the ship survived. They were then in a lifeboat for 10 days before being rescued.

Mason Castle (7AL) found out that his Great Grandad was an admiral in the Navy during WWII.

Oliver Mitchell (7AH) interviewed his Grandad, who is now 97, about what he remembered about the War and VE Day.

The Maths department organised lessons on World War II code breaking methods.



The English department looked at the power of poetry and songs in war. Year 7 considered how growing up during a war changes one's sense of identity. They then analysed two Vera Lynn songs as 'poems' that convey solidarity and unity. Year 8 considered how journalists played a role in the war, and also created an article reporting on the VE Day celebrations, inspired by some footage from the time.



The **RPE department** planned a lesson looking at the Quakers and Pacifists in WWII.

The aim of this was to share a religious group the students may not get a chance to study in school but also to recognise even religious pacifists still contributed in a very meaningful way to what led to VE Day.



B ug hotels benefit lots of minibeasts and insects such as ladybirds, bees, spiders and woodlice. Our Biodiversity Eco Reps had made their initial Bug hotel out of pallets, old bricks, dead leaves and foliage.

Our Year 7–9 students spent the afternoon of Wednesday 7th May working on Bug hotel version 2 behind the 3G pitch. "The old one was 4 years old, and was looking a bit worn out", said Dr McCombs, who heads up the Biodiversity Eco Reps. "This one is actually a bit of an upgrade. We used an old speaker cabinet, with loads of nooks and crannies already in it, which is really helpful for woodlice and ants. We cut up an old pipe, which is a good habitat for spiders. The bottom layer has some logs and bricks, which are perfect

for slightly larger animals like hedgehogs."


