MAKING A SPLASH!

Lymm Leisure Centre is undergoing an exciting period of development after suffering setbacks due to the Covid pandemic.

I n 2020, the Leisure Centre was unfortunately put in a position where staff reductions were needed and therefore opening hours were affected. This meant the centre had to drastically reduce its hours available to the public from 7 days a week down to 4 weekday evenings and weekends only.

The team has felt incredibly appreciative of their standing, as many pools have been forced to close altogether considering the same circumstances, writes Leisure Attendant and Swimming Teacher Jenna Ashall. Even before the pandemic, leisure centres, and particularly swimming pools, were in a vulnerable position. The latest figures from Swim England state that: '500 swimming pools have been lost since 2010, totalling a massive 34,859 square metres of water space. Of all the pools lost in that time, almost half (42%) have been lost since 2020.'

The team at Lymm Leisure Centre, with the help and support of Lymm High School, have been working hard to move onwards and upwards and regain their accessibility to the community of Lymm and they have achieved an awful lot over the past 5 years.

Firstly, as of August 2024, Lymm Leisure Centre has managed to clear its debt and become profitable again. To have been able to do this with limited opening hours has been a huge achievement and has meant that we are now able to put some funding into developing and modernising the centre.

You may have noticed some physical developments at the centre: new branding and signage, photo displays on the pool windows to easily identify the pool space, new flooring throughout the corridors, and new dry-side changing rooms. You'll also soon be seeing the first phase in the development of the pool-side changing rooms, beginning work at the end of June 2025 with the women's changing area.



There has also been a plethora of operational changes at the centre, further highlighting its development and modernisation. We have introduced a <u>fresh new</u> <u>website</u> that includes a new online portal where you can manage memberships and bookings. To add to this technological advancement, there is updated Technogym equipment in the gym, which means you can enhance gym workouts with an online app.

In 2024, in an effort to really embrace the community, the centre showcased the first of what will be many annual fun days, raising money for local causes (see p.23). There has also been an upturn in clubs and classes available to the community at the Leisure Centre, including half-term provision for local children. And as swimming is at the heart of what we do, Lymm Leisure Centre has also offered extensive pool time and swim teaching to Lymm High School and local primary schools to help

develop their swimming and water safety skills, offering more regular weekly pool space than previous years.

There have been more opportunities for Lymm Sixth Form students and the local community to become qualified in the leisure industry as well. We've had more RLSS National Pool Lifeguard Qualification courses run than in previous years, introduced the STA award, as well as certificate courses in teaching swimming and first aid.

The latest development has been the introduction of a new member of staff, which means that the centre has now been able to achieve a major milestone of broadening the opening hours back to the community again. From July 2025, the centre will be operating a new timetable, which includes Monday–Friday mornings sessions for gym users and swimmers. Morning swimming, in particular, is something that we have not seen at the centre since before the pandemic. To celebrate this milestone. Lymm Leisure Centre will be offering a promotional 'Comeback Swim Pass'



throughout July – £10 all you can swim for one month!

The staff at Lymm Leisure Centre feel extremely proud of all they have achieved over the past 5 years and are excited for what the next few may bring. They would like to offer their thanks to the local community and Lymm High School for all their support as these achievements wouldn't be possible without them.

MAPPING THE LANDSCAPE



On Monday 19th May, 45 Visual Arts students set off on an inspiring 3-day residential trip to Ty'n-y-Felin in Anglesey.

T he theme of the trip was 'Mapping the Landscape', and over the course of the visit, GCSE Fine Art, Photography and/or Textiles & Fashion students created a wide range of experimental artwork to support their GCSE coursework.

Day One: Inspiration from the landscape

The trip began with preparations, as students researched the work of artists Mark Powell, Anna Atkins and Lorraine Brown – whose unique approaches to landscape and material provided influence for the theme of the project.

• Mark Powell is known for his detailed

biro drawings, often created on vintage documents like old maps and letters, offering a blend of history and fine detail.

- Anna Atkins was a pioneering 19thcentury botanist and photographer who used cyanotypes – a photographic printing process that produces a rich blue image – to document plant life.
- Lorraine Brown creates layered, mixed media landscapes that combine stitch, drawing and collage, which provided perfect inspiration for the final outcomes of the trip.

Armed with their sketchbooks and cameras, students spent the afternoon walking to the nearby beach to gather inspiration. They completed observational drawings in their concertina sketchbooks, collected natural objects such as shells, seaweed, feathers and flowers, and took numerous photographs to bring the landscape back to the centre with them.

Back at the centre, students completed their sketchbooks with a focus on showing their creative journey, setting the stage for their final piece: a circular, mixed media artwork inspired by their surroundings.

Day Two: Art, adventure and exploration




The second day was a perfect mix of adventure and art. Students rotated between an exciting watersports session (including coasteering and kayaking in the breathtaking bay of Rhoscolyn) and workshops led back at the centre by Mrs Taylor and Mrs Collins.

In the art sessions, students experimented with:

- Cyanotypes: a photographic technique where objects are placed on special lightsensitive paper and exposed to sunlight, creating vivid, shadowy prints.
- Monoprinting: a form of printmaking using ink, rollers and oil pastels.

These techniques allowed students to build a wide range of elements to include in their final mixed media compositions, experimenting with texture, tone and collage. The day ended on a high note with the group gathered around the fire pit, reflecting on the day and toasting marshmallows. An idyllic end to a fun-filled and creative day.

Day Three: Bringing it all together



On the final morning, students worked with Mrs Taylor, Miss Anderson and Mrs Collins to pull together all of their individual elements into their final pieces. They added finishing

touches using pen, paint, oil, pastel and even stitch, bringing together everything they had produced over the 3 days.





To celebrate the work produced, students took part in a mini exhibition, walking around the classrooms to view each other's final pieces and appreciating the different styles and interpretations of the landscape.

The trip concluded with a celebration, and awards were given to students whose creativity, bravery and positive attitude had stood out: Sam Morris, Jessica Minnery, Halle Lomas, Hayfa Mohamad and Abi Craig.

A huge well done to these students, and to the entire group, who embraced every part of the trip with energy, open-mindedness, and a willingness to try new techniques outside of their usual art, photography or textiles work.

This trip was not just about making art work: it was about stepping out of comfort zones, connecting with nature, and building memories that will last forever.

We can't wait to see how this experience shapes their GCSE projects in the months to come!


BUDDING RESEARCHERS




HONOURING OUR STUDENTS

These boards are updated every 2 years, and we are pleased to say that the latest boards have just been unveiled in the Atrium.




DREAMS OF A GENERATION



COMING TO A SCREEN NEAR YOU....



The Technology faculty would like to wish all four students the best of luck with the competition. As you can see, they have created some stunning designs!


