GCSE AND A'LEVEL RESULTS

Students and staff celebrated excellent exam results over the summer.

Results Day on Thursday 14th August. School opened early so that the nervous wait could be over as soon as possible, and students entered Sixth Form at 8am.

The Lower Hex was soon filled with excitement, and students and staff celebrated another excellent set of post-16 results.

Amongst the many highlights, Laam Chow secured an incredible four straight A* grades, closely followed by Sofia Ottiwell, Jamie Lo, Novi Ma and Charlotte Masters, all of whom picked up three A* grades or equivalent.

GCSE students lined up to
get their results on Thursday
21st August. And once again,
they were superb!

Mr Williams said: "We are delighted with our GCSE performance again this year. The Year 11 cohort have been wonderful throughout their time at the school, and we are so pleased that these results will set them up so well for whatever steps they are taking next. All the smiles we've seen this morning on the faces of the students are thoroughly well-deserved - as indeed are the smiles on the faces of all the parents and carers who have provided such brilliant support."

"Although we've become quite used to seeing such strong results over the past few years, we try very hard to avoid any complacency. It's therefore really pleasing to see the success continuing and to know that these results will keep us right at the top in terms of performance across the North West."

What is especially positive again is the consistency of the results. The headlines are certainly very impressive, but Lymm High staff are even more pleased with what sits behind them. All the bigger

subjects have performed exceptionally well, as have students from all groups and different academic starting points.

"This kind of profile of results only comes about as a result of sustained hard work and I thank and congratulate everyone involved", said Mr Williams.

87% of students managed to secure grades 4 and above in both English and Maths, with 69% securing 5 or above in both key subjects. Fully 33% scored grade 7 or above in both. In fact, well over 40% of all GCSE grades came in at grade 7 or higher.

Standout students included Daisy Nurse who scored a scarcely believable ten straight grade 9s. Daisy was closely followed by James Leung, Ben Liput and Frankie Littlewood with nine grade 9s.



Wednesday 8th October, 6-7pm Lymm High School, Main Hall


Join us for tips, advice and guidance to support our Year 7-13 students' wellbeing.

At the start of September, our Scholars set off bright and early for a 2-day visit to Oxford, writes Miss Cucuz.

A fter the long journey, our first stop was the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, where students took part in an Evolution workshop – complete with some very lively cockroaches! This hands-on experience brought their science learning to life, allowing them to see natural selection and adaptation in action.

From there, we headed to the Pitt Rivers Museum for a

thought-provoking Colonial Voices session. Students examined artefacts from colonial India and discussed the way history is represented in museums. This linked directly to their history studies and encouraged them to think critically about perspectives, power and the importance of diverse voices in telling the past.

The afternoon offered a change of pace with punting

along the river, giving students a chance to see the city from a new angle, before an atmospheric guided ghost walk through Oxford's streets. This not only brought the city's history to life but also inspired students to think about the role of storytelling and folklore in shaping our understanding of the past.

Day two was spent at our partner college, Pembroke. Students enjoyed a guided tour, gaining a real insight into university life. A special exhibition in the library introduced them to rare manuscripts and books, while a memorial scavenger hunt encouraged them to engage actively with the college's history, including links to J.R.R. Tolkien. Lunch in the historic dining hall, kindly provided by the college, gave them a real taste of academic tradition. We rounded off the trip with a game of croquet on

the lawn, which was both a fun challenge and a classic Oxford experience!

The trip provided an invaluable opportunity for students to broaden their horizons, connect their classroom learning with the wider world, and see first-hand what university has to offer. It was both academically stretching and great fun, and we are grateful to Pembroke College and all involved in making the visit possible.

Fortunately, Ben made the cut so could relax for a day, be taken on a river cruise to see the course, see some sights and have a short practice swim before the main race.

On the day of the race, there was an opening ceremony, followed by press photos and interviews.

Up against Olympians and World Medalists, 37.6°C heat at 7am, strong, unpredictable currents, Ben put in a strong performance to cross the river (approximately 1800m). He made it in 13 minutes, finishing 19th, which was within prizemoney rankings. Many







competitors failed to cross as the current pulls them down the river and they are then collected by boats waiting vigilantly.

This was a phenomenal experience and a tremendous achievement. Very well done, Ben!

ucy Glover and Cam Nyland represented Great Britain in Shanghai, China, at the World Rowing Championships in the women's double sculls. Featuring almost 900 athletes from 56 nations, the championships included 23 boat classes over 8 days of action from 21–28th September.

In the second heat of the women's double sculls on Monday 22nd September, Lucy and

Cam finished 5th. They then went on to compete in the event's B final on Friday 26th September, finishing 11th overall.

As well as both attending Lymm High School (1 year apart), Lucy and Cam both started their international careers at Warrington Rowing Club.
