Antony Cotterill: Resilience and sporting excellence

Tuesday 4th November

We are lucky to have Antony Cotterill, British wheelchair tennis player, visit school to talk with the High School and Sixth Form. Students wishing to attend should go to the Main Hall at the start of either Period 1 or Period 2. The talk is 30 minutes.

Antony is an inspiring example of resilience and sporting excellence. After a life-changing neck injury in 2003, he discovered wheelchair tennis during rehabilitation and quickly rose to the top of the sport. Competing in the quad division, Antony has achieved a career-high world ranking of No. 5 in singles and No. 4 in doubles, winning over 40 national and international titles.

Among his major highlights are victory in the 2016 Wheelchair Doubles Masters and helping Great Britain secure the 2017 World Team Cup gold medal. He has also proudly represented his country at both the Rio 2016 and Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games. Antony's journey from injury to international success demonstrates remarkable determination and serves as an inspiration to athletes everywhere.

Students find their voice at ARTiculation Discovery Day

A group of our Sixth Form students had the opportunity to take part the ARTiculation Discovery Day at the Whitworth Gallery, Manchester – an inspiring event designed to develop students' confidence in public speaking and deepen their engagement with visual art. Hosted in partnership with the national ARTiculation programme, the day brought together students from across the region to explore the gallery's exhibitions, take part in dynamic workshops, and learn how to analyse and present artworks in a thoughtful and compelling way.

Throughout the day, our students engaged in guided activities that sharpened their observation skills, encouraged critical thinking, and challenged them to articulate their ideas clearly and confidently. They worked collaboratively, explored artworks in depth, and practised presenting their interpretations to peers – an experience that many described as “eye-opening” and “empowering”.

The ARTiculation programme is renowned for encouraging young people to find their voice – not just in art, but in how they see and understand the world. This experience also prepares students who may wish to take part in the national ARTiculation Prize, a prestigious public speaking competition focused on art and visual culture. Internal school heats for the competition will take place in school in the near future, in advance of the regional heats back at the Whitworth gallery in February.

We are incredibly proud of our students for representing the school with such enthusiasm, curiosity and courage. Opportunities like this not only enrich their appreciation for the arts, but also equip them with valuable transferable skills in research, communication and public speaking.

Senior Maths Challenge: Sixth Formers shine with gold awards!

The competition, which brings together the brightest minds from across the country, is no easy feat. Students were tasked with solving a series of challenging mathematical problems that tested their problem-solving, logic and critical thinking skills. From intricate puzzles to time-pressured questions, it was a true test of their mathematical ability.

We are thrilled to announce that Ben, Louis and Toby earned Gold awards, a remarkable achievement that places them in the top tier of the competition. A special mention goes to Ben, who qualified for the Gold British International Mathematical Olympiad (GoldBiS)! This is an outstanding achievement, as it means he will be representing our school in the next level of national competition, where he will face even more complex mathematical challenges.

The Senior Maths Challenge is part of a series of prestigious mathematical competitions, with the Senior Kangaroo and BMO1 (British Mathematical Olympiad 1) coming up on **Wednesday 19th November**. These competitions offer a chance for students to showcase their mathematical skills on a national stage, with the very best going on to compete in international Olympiads.

Taking part in these competitions not only boosts problem-solving abilities but also encourages students to think creatively, work under pressure, and push the boundaries of their mathematical knowledge. Being part of these challenges is a valuable experience, providing recognition for students' hard work and dedication.

Black History Month

We close October with an assembly led by our student body. Ryan Chakavarika has kindly agreed to include his Black History Month assembly speech in this week's bulletin. The theme for Black History Month this year is 'Standing Firm in Power and Pride' and in assembly we looked at how we use music to educate about black power. Here is Ryan's speech. As I'm sure you agree, it is a brilliant example of both power and pride in our community:



Black History Month Assembly – Inspired by *“Black”* by Dave



“When you hear the word Black, what comes to mind? Pain? Struggle? Strength? For me... it's all of that and more.”

“Black is beautiful, black is excellent. Black is pain, black is joy, black is evident.” – Dave

This month isn't just about celebrating Black history it's about understanding the story. The truth. The pain behind the pride.

Dave said:

“Black is growing up around your family and making it, Being forced to leave the place you love because there's hate in it.”

When I heard that line, I felt it. Because sometimes, being Black feels like carrying a story you didn't even write but being judged for every page of it. You walk into rooms and feel eyes on you before you even speak.

Your skin isn't just colour it's history. It's assumptions. It's everything they think you are before they know who you are.

“Black is so much deeper than just African-American. Our heritage been severed, you never got to experiment...”

That reminds me that being Black isn't one story: it's Africa, it's the Caribbean, it's the UK. It's languages, ancestors, and memories, some taken from us, some we're still reclaiming.

“But black is bein' strong inside and facin' defeat, Poverty made me a beast, I battled the law in the streets.”

Black History Month



Being Black means being powerful enough to keep going when the world tells you you're not enough. It's seeing greatness in places others overlook in how we dance, speak, laugh and create.

I see that same strength in my family, my friends and in myself.

We carry the lessons of those who came before us in silence, in strength, in pride.

Music has always been the heartbeat of Black history. When people couldn't speak freely, they sang.

From the spirituals of slavery songs like "*Wade in the Water*" to the blues of pain, the jazz of freedom, the soul of hope, and the hip-hop of protest.

Artists like Nina Simone, Bob Marley, Tupac, and now Dave turned struggle into sound. Every lyric carried truth every beat carried resistance.

Because music connects us. It doesn't see race or colour only feeling. And maybe that's the point: we're all different notes in the same song. The melody only works when we play together.

But the truth is we can't heal alone. The pain of one group is the pain of us all. And if we keep seeing colour before character, we'll never see humanity.

Black isn't something that separates us – it's something that shows us the beauty of difference. We all bleed the same, laugh the same, dream the same.

We don't need to be colour-blind we need to be colour-proud and human-united. Because being Black is my story but unity is all of ours.

"Black is the colour of my true love's skin. The best things in life come from within."

This Black History Month: Listen. Feel. Understand. Unite.

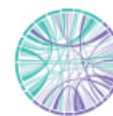

Applications close: 30th November 2025

Applications are now open for the 2026 MSC Medicine Residential Summer Schools. These fully funded programmes offer an excellent opportunity for Year 12 students to explore what it's like to study medicine at university – at no cost to them. The summer schools provide a practical and engaging experience of medical education through hands-on activities, online learning, and expert-led sessions. Students will:

- Experience what it's like to be a medical student
- Learn about a wide range of medical careers
- Receive support with university applications, admissions tests and interviews
- Build confidence and meet like-minded peers
- May become eligible for contextual admissions at some medical schools

The programmes are designed for students from underrepresented backgrounds, particularly those with limited access to medical outreach. Students can apply for residential or commuter places depending on what suits their circumstances best.

Some programmes include compulsory online sessions before the main residencies in Summer 2026, so it's important to check dates carefully.

The Sixth Form UCAS Deadline is Tuesday 4th November 2025

Meeting the Sixth Form Deadlines

Your application will be submitted to school once you've clicked 'PAID AND SENT'.

- This does **not** send your application straight to UCAS.
- It first goes to Mrs Hughes, who checks it carefully.
- After that, it is also checked by **Mr Mullin (Head of Year)** and **Mrs Neesam (Head of Sixth Form)**.
- The **checking process takes up to 2 weeks**, before Mrs Hughes sends your application to UCAS.

This Internal deadline is important so there's time to spot any mistakes and make sure everything is ready to go.

UCAS deadlines and reminders (II)

References

Before you submit, please make sure you've spoken to your referee about what courses you're applying for. This helps them write the best possible reference to support your application. You should already have done this, but if you haven't, your reference will not be written and ready for Mrs Hughes to send your application to UCAS.

Predicted grades

Your predicted grades are entered on to your UCAS application by Mrs Hughes after you have submitted your application to school – these will be communicated to you prior to when your application needs to be completed – more information about these will be given in assembly and to parent/carers via letter in due course.

Key things to remember

- We have over 200 applications to process, and each one takes up to 2 weeks to check.
- Your application will only be checked after you have 'PAID AND SENT' it to Sixth Form.
- Applications are checked in the order they are submitted – so the earlier you submit, the earlier yours will be processed.
- Avoid these [Common Mistakes](#), or this will delay your application.
- If errors are found, your application will be sent back to you to correct.
- Please do not submit your application to Sixth Form until you have completed all sections fully.
